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OVERVIEW

The Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Government of India owes its origin to the Department of Sports, which was set up in the year, 1982 at the time of the IXth Asian Games in New Delhi. During the International Youth Year 1985 it was upgraded to the Department of Youth Affairs & Sports. On 17th May, 2000, it became a full-fledged Ministry. The Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports has been bifurcated into two separate Departments namely, Department of Youth Affairs and Department of Sports, under independent charge of two separate Secretaries, with the overall charge of a Union Minister of State (Independent charge) with effect from 29th April, 2008.

India has the largest Youth population in the world. To optimally tap their constructive and creative energies, the Ministry pursues the twin objectives of personality - building and nation building, that is, developing the personality of youth and involving them in various nation-building activities. The Ministry has also recognized "Adolescents" as an important segment of the Youth. As most of the issues concerning the Youth are the functions of other Ministries/Departments, like Education, Employment & Training, Health and Family Welfare etc., the role of the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports is to act as a facilitator and catalytic agent. A National Commission for Youth was set up to recommend to the Government measures to tackle effectively the problems faced by the youth of India, with particular focus on youth unemployment. The recommendations of the Commission have been considered and two new schemes (i) National Programme for Adolescents and Youth Development (NPYAD) (restructured scheme) and (ii) Panchayat Yuva Krida Aur Khel Abhiyan (PYKKA) have been introduced in the Ministry during the 11th Plan.

Sports promotion is primarily the responsibility of the various National Sports Federations, which are autonomous. The role of the Government is to create the infrastructure and promote capacity-building for broad-based sports as well as for achieving excellence in various competitive events at the national and international levels. The Ministry's schemes are geared towards achieving these objectives.

CONFERENCE OF STATE MINISTERS OF YOUTH AFFAIRS & SPORTS

A Conference of State Ministers of State Governments and Union Territories was held on 9th July, 2008 under the Chairmanship of Dr. M.S.Gill, Hon'ble Minister of State (Independent Charge of Youth Affairs & Sports) at Vigyan Bhawan, New Delhi to discuss various issues relating to Sports and Youth Affairs with State and Union Territory Governments.

There was a very encouraging response with almost all State Ministers/State Secretaries of Youth Affairs and Sports attending this conference. On this occasion Department of Sports introduced the new scheme of Panchayat Yuva Krida aur Khel Abhiyan (PYKKA).

ORGANIZATION

SECRETARIAT

The Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports is functioning under the overall guidance of a Minister of State (Independent Charge), Youth Affairs & Sports.

In April, 2008, the Ministry was bifurcated into the Department of Youth Affairs and the Department of Sports, each under the charge of a Secretary to the Government of India. There are 3 Joint Secretaries in the Ministry. Joint Secretary (Youth Affairs and Administration) looks after matters concerning Youth Affairs and Adolescents, Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS), National Service Scheme and the work relating to General Administration. Joint Secretary (Sports) looks after the work relating to Sports Authority of India (SAI), Lakshmibai National University of Physical Education (LNUPE), various National Sports Federations and other Sports Schemes like Panchayat Yuva Krida evam Khel Abhiyan. Joint Secretary (International Sports Division) looks after matters concerning the Commonwealth Games 2010. The work relating to Accounts & Audit is under the charge of a Joint Secretary & Financial Adviser who looks after the work of this Ministry in addition to his duties in other Ministries. The Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports has at present a sanctioned strength of 219, comprising 37 Group 'A' posts, 78 Group 'B' posts (21 Gazetted and 57 Non Gazetted), 74 Group 'C' posts and 30 Group 'D' posts. The Organizational Chart of the Ministry is at **Annexure-I**.

REPRESENTATION OF SC/ST AND OTHER BACKWARD CLASSES

There are 33 personnel who belong to Scheduled Castes (2 in Group 'A', 14 in Group 'B', 7 in Group 'C' and 10 in Group 'D'), 7 belong to Scheduled Tribes (4 in Group 'B', 3 in Group 'D') and 10 are from Other Backward Classes.

SUBORDINATE OFFICES/AUTONOMOUS ORGANISATIONS

Department of Youth Affairs

This Department has one subordinate office i.e the National Service Scheme (NSS) and two autonomous organizations viz. Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS), New Delhi; and Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development (RGNIYD)(deemed University since October, 2008) Sriperumbudur, Tamil Nadu.

Department of Sports

This Department comprises:

- (A) **Sports Division:** It looks after the sports activities of the Department except issues relating to Commonwealth Games 2010.
- (B) **Commonwealth Games-2010 Division:** A separate Division was created as per recommendation of Group of Ministers on 25.10.2004 to look after matters relating to preparation of Commonwealth Games 2010.

Following autonomous organization function are under the administrative control of Department of Sports:-

- (i) Sports Authority of India (SAI), New Delhi
- (ii) Lakshmbai National University of Physical Education (LNUPE), Gwalior, Madhya Pradesh

- (iii) National Anti-Doping Agency (NADA)

ALLOCATION OF BUDGET

The total budget allocation for the Ministry for 2008-09 was Rs.1111.81 crore (BE), comprising Rs.890.00 crore on the Plan side and Rs.221.81 crore on the Non-Plan side. RE for 2008-09 is Rs.1593.00 crores comprising of Rs.1311.00 crore on the Plan side and Rs.282.00 crore on the Non-Plan side. For the year 2009-10, the total budget estimate is Rs.3,073.00 crores (BE) comprising Rs.2,699.00 crore for Plan and Rs.374.00 crore for Non Plan. The details are given at Annexure -II.

PROGRESS MADE IN IMPLEMENTATION OF THE OFFICIAL LANGUAGE

Official Language Unit of the Ministry performs the duties of the nodal agency for Official Language Hindi among the divisions/ sections and Subordinate Offices/ Autonomous Bodies of the Ministry. In this Unit, there are One Dy. Director (O.L.), one Senior Hindi Translator and three Junior Hindi Translators who translate Annual Report, Outcome Budget/ Performance Budget, agreements, Notifications, Resolutions, General Orders, Circulars, Memorandums and Parliament Questions etc. to promote the use of official language Hindi in official work bilingually. The Ministry has been notified under rule 10 (4). Four Sections of the Ministry have been specified for the use of Hindi. In the Ministry all Name Plates, Notice Boards, rubber stamps, seals, letterheads etc. have been prepared both in Hindi and English. Letters received in Hindi are invariably replied in Hindi.

There is an Official Language Committee under the Chairmanship of Joint Secretary (Admin). The main function of the committee is to promote the use of Hindi in official work to be dealt with the Ministry and remove the obstacle in this regard. The untrained officials are regularly given training in Hindi typing/stenography. In this period, the officers of the Ministry, to ensure the progressive use of Hindi and its effective implementation, had inspected Subordinate/Autonomous offices. To achieve the target fixed in the Annual Programme prepared by Official Language Department, effective efforts are being made by the Ministry and its Subordinate/Autonomous offices and will be continued in future also. Hindi Fortnight was celebrated in the Ministry from 22nd September to 3rd October, 2009. The Hindi Advisory Committee has been formed in

the Ministry and its meetings had been held in the month of September 2007 and February 2008 and follow-up actions are being taken on the decisions taken in the meeting.

VIGILANCE CELL

Vigilance Machinery during the period functioned in the Ministry under Shri Sailesh, Joint Secretary who has been designated as the Chief Vigilance Officer who deals with the vigilance cases. Each autonomous organization and subordinate office in the Ministry has its own independent unit to deal with vigilance cases. The Vigilance Awareness Week was observed in the Ministry from 3rd to 7th November, 2008. A pledge was taken by all the officers and employees of this Ministry. During the week, procedure for making complaints under Public Interest Disclosure and Protection of Informers' Resolution (popularly known as Whistle Blowers' Resolution) was widely circulated. Banners and posters were displayed giving vigilance slogans during the Vigilance Awareness Week. The need for efficiency and transparency in public spending was emphasized. The systems, procedures and the avenues available for redressing the grievances of citizens were also explained.

COMPLAINT COMMITTEE ON SEXUAL HARASSMENT OF WOMEN EMPLOYEES

In pursuance of the directives of the Hon'ble Supreme Court in their judgment in the case of Vishakha & Others Vs. State of Rajasthan & Others, a Complaint Committee has been constituted under the Chairmanship of a lady Director in the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports to look into the complaints of sexual harassment of women employees in the Ministry. A complaint received by the Committee during last year is presently in the final stage of its hearing. No fresh complaint has been received by the Committee during 2008-09.

PUBLIC GRIEVANCES

A Public Grievances Cell exists in the Ministry for redressal of public grievances. It supervises the implementation of the various guidelines issued from time to time by

the Department of Administrative Reforms. This Cell functions under Director (Admn.) who has been designated as the Nodal Officer for Public Grievances.

INFORMATION AND FACILITATION CENTRE

The following facilities are available at Information and Facilitation Centre:

- Policy documents like National Youth Policy 2003 and National Sports Policy, 2001
- Schemes of the Ministry.
- Booklets/Pamphlets/News letters released by the Ministry and its Subordinate Office/Autonomous bodies.
- Directory of addresses of state level and district level offices of NYKS.

In addition, petition/complaints/suggestions and application under Right to Information Act (RTI), 2005 are also received at the Facilitation Centre.

INITIATIVES THROUGH INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY DURING THE YEAR 2008-09

Executive Video Conferencing System (EVCS) over NICNET: In order to carry forward e-governance as a practical, cost-effective and efficient tool, the EVCS based on NICNET have been installed in the Ministry by NIC to enable holding meetings with Secretaries to the Govt. of India & Chief Secretaries of States/Union Territories through effective and faster mode of communication. EVCS is an integrated system with LCD display screen and a fixed camera with integrated microphone and speakers. It is equipped with Advanced Encryption Standards (AES) to ensure secrecy and confidentiality of communications.

PYKKA-MIS: Ministry has availed the services of NIC for preparation of Management Information System on Panchayat Yuva Krida Aur Khel Abhiyan scheme. PYKKA-MIS is a web-enabled on-line system that would facilitate the management of the scheme details and allow better monitoring of the scheme by the Central and State agencies. The system will later be used for maintaining database and receiving online-proposals and their implementation.

Monitoring of Financial Assistance to National Sports Federations (NSFs): The software developed by NIC is a web-based application, which facilitates online submission of proposals by the NSFs to the Ministry. The software will help in bringing more transparency in the process of giving financial assistance to NSFs by enabling online submission of the proposals by the federations and processing by the Ministry. The software will also provide online status of any proposal from the date of its receipt till the final settlement of accounts. The database will further enable generation of various kinds of reports for the purpose of monitoring and review by higher officials.

GIS based database of sports infrastructure: NIC has been requested to develop GIS based database of sports facilities available in Delhi is being prepared with the help of NIC. The database will have complete information about various sports infrastructure facilities available in and around Delhi. This shall allow users to search for sports infrastructures by a number of different ways. They will be able to browse an interactive map, search for nearest facilities in their local area, use the name and address of a specific infrastructure to find out more information. This will also help in identifying the gap areas and optimal planning for improvement and investment in Sports Infrastructures.

Website of the Ministry: Consequent upon the bifurcation of the Ministry in Department of Youth Affairs & Department of Sports, the website of the Ministry has been redesigned by NIC in such a way that each department has separate content and look & feel with state-of-the-art administrator control for easy addition/deletion of the content. The content for both the departments are now bilingual in nature.

Comp DDO: Based on the recommendations of 6th Pay Commission, the software for processing payroll etc. has been modified and implemented by NIC. The revised paybills, bilingual pay-slips are being generated on monthly basis.

PENDING UTILISATION CERTIFICATE (U.C.) FROM NGOs.

Several voluntary/non-governmental organizations throughout the country, which were given financial assistance under various schemes of the Ministry in the previous years, have not yet furnished the prescribed Utilization Certificates (UCs) despite reminders. Action has been taken to stop further grants to such organizations. Besides, the matter is being actively pursued with them. The process of UCs has been computerized. The

year wise pendency of UCs is summarized in the statement given at **Annexure -IV**. It would be seen from this that a large number of pending UCs as per present record are very old. A special drive has been launched to reconcile the UCs with the Pay and Accounts Office and efforts are being made to resolve the issue of pending UCs in consultation with the Ministry of Finance.

YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

Hon'ble Prime Minister of India in his Independence Day speech on 15th August, 2006. He called upon all youth to work shoulder to shoulder in building a new India of their dreams. He has also assured that this country will have great opportunities for full expression of the skills of youth in India.

The population of persons below the age of 35 years in India is about 70 percent of the total population. Within this, the population between the age of 10-19 years is approximately 225 million, the largest ever cohort of young people to make a transition to adulthood. It is this population of young people, which constitutes, for India, a potential demographic dividend, and/or a challenge of mega proportions if not properly addressed and harnessed.

NATIONAL YOUTH POLICY, 2003

The National Youth Policy, 2003, while emphasizing on youth empowerment and participation of youth in the processes of planning and development, Gender Justice, Inter-Sectoral coordination, and establishment of a well organized Information and Research Network in respect of issues of concern for the Youth, accords priority to rural and tribal youth, out-of-school youth, adolescents and youth with disability and under especially difficult circumstances. In this broad framework, it identifies the sectors key to the development of youth viz., Education, Health and Family Welfare, Recreation and Sports, Preservation of Environment, Training and Employment, Art and Culture, Science and Technology and Civics and good Citizenship. Meanwhile, it has been decided to revise the National Youth Policy, 2003 in the context of 11th Five Year Plan.

Background

The scheme titled National Programme for Youth and Adolescent Development (NPYAD) has been formulated by merger of four 100% central sector grants-in-aid schemes of the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports during 10th Plan namely, Promotion of Youth Activities & Training, Promotion of National Integration, Promotion of Adventure and Development & Empowerment of Adolescents', with a view to reduce the multiplicity of schemes with similar objectives and improve the delivery mechanism.

Under the scheme, proposals from All India Organisations are received directly and proposals from State Level Organisations through the concerned State Government/ UT administration, duly verified & prioritized by a designated State Level Screening Committee (SLSC).

The scheme is being implemented in the project mode through Project Implementing Agencies (PIAs). The PIA may submit project proposal involving one or more programme area or components under the scheme but the key factor for consideration of the project will be the past experience and resource (infrastructure and technical manpower) available with the PIA.

A duly constituted Project Appraisal Committee (PAC) in the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports considers the proposals. The recommendations of the PAC thereafter are placed for approval of the competent authority in the Ministry.

A state wise statement showing the details of funds sanctioned under various components of the Scheme of NPYAD during 2008-09 is given in **Annexure VI**.

Support to Adolescents' Health and Development Project

The Ministry and the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) have been collaborating for the support to Adolescents' Health and Development (AHD) with the overall objective

of ensuring a healthy and safe growing up process for out-of-school adolescents. This is in keeping with the focus of the National Youth Policy on “need for youth to be equipped with requisite knowledge, skills and capabilities”. The partners that have been involved in implementation of the adolescents’ project are the Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS), the National Service Scheme (NSS) and the Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development (RGNIYD) as part of the sixth country programme, CP6 - (2003-2007). UNFPA has provided support for building capacities of NYKS and NSS personnel through RGNIYD and strengthening RGNIYD as a resource and documentation centre; establishing Teen clubs through NYKS; reaching adolescents through conduct of Quiz and establishing an Adolescent Cell for technical guidance.

Under the Country Programme CP7 (2008-12), the UNFPA will support to select activities, with an estimated annual budget of US\$ 6,00,000. The programme will reach out-of-school adolescents, and will continue to support for operationalisation of teen clubs at the village level in 63 districts of 31 states across the country. These teen clubs will have trained peer educators who will be the source of information for adolescents. Capacity building of national level institutions such as NYKS and NSS will be another area of support in order to enable them implement programmes supported not only by UNFPA but also by the Govt. and other partners. Support will be provided for capacity building programmes for NSS officers. Innovative activities are proposed such as facilitating the RGNIYD to design and offer programmes for youth. In the calendar year, 2008, an amount of Rs. 1,80,92,000/- was released to NYKS and Rs. 72,92,600/- was released to RGNIYD.

The Tenzing Norgay National Adventure Award is the highest national recognition for outstanding achievements in the field of adventure on land, sea and air. A cash Award of Rs.3,00,000/-, a statue and a scroll of honour is given to each awardee. This award has been made at par with the Arjuna Award for sporting excellence.

Tenzing Norgay National Adventure Awards are given away by the President of India alongwith Arjuna Awards, in a function held at Rashtrapati Bhavan on the 29th August every year. Awards for the year 2008 were conferred on Capt. M.S. Kohli, VSM, FRGS (Life Time Achievement), Nb. Subedar Mohinder Singh, Shourya Chakra (Land Adventure), Subedar Neel Chand Shourya Chakra (Land Adventure) and Air Commodore, T.K. Rath (Air Adventure) by Smt. Pratibha Patil, the President of India, at Rashtrapati Bhavan on 29.8.2008.

National Youth Festival is organized every year from January 12th to 16th to commemorate the birth anniversary of Swami Vivekananda. January 12 being the birth anniversary of Swami Vivekananda is observed as National Youth Day. 13th National Youth Festivals have been held in different states of the country.

Dr. M. Hamid Ansari, Vice President of India, inaugurated 14th National Youth Festival on 12th January 2009 at Guru Nanak Dev University campus at Amritsar with over 3,000 youth from all over India. On this occasion, Hon'ble Union Minister of State for Youth Affairs and Sports, Dr. M.S. Gill and other Hon'ble Members of Parliament were also present.

During the year 2008-09 an amount of Rs.1,57,50,000/- was released to the State Government of Punjab for organizing the 14th National Youth Festival.

A cultural display and a march-past of participating youth delegates were held on the occasion.

During the five-day festival, the competitive/non-competitive events in individual items as well as group items at various venues were organized. In addition to these, the Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan, an autonomous body of the Department of Youth Affairs, Govt. of India, organized a young Artists Camp, Yuva Kriti and an Adventure Festival at Khalsa College, Amritsar. The National Service Scheme also organized a National Youth Convention and a lecture series 'SUVICHAR' at the same venue.

As a curtain raiser of the 14th National Youth Festival, a Symposium on '21st Century Belongs to India and Her Youth' was organized by RGNIYD. Chaired by the Secretary (Youth Affairs), Government of India, a panel of experts from the field of Education, Employment, Health and Youth Organisations made presentations, which was followed by an open house discussion with the youth delegates participating in the National Youth Festival. An opinion survey on various issues among the youth delegates who participated in the Youth Festival was conducted. The results of the survey was presented in the SUVICHAR programme which was well received by the audience. An exhibition

of RGNIYD's activities and academic programmes was also put up in the festival. A stall displaying the various career options for adolescents along with on-the-spot career guidance was also arranged.

The closing ceremony was held on the 16th January, 2009 which was presided over by the Minister of Youth Services and Sports, Punjab, Shri Gulzar Singh Ranike.

Department of Youth Affairs, Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports presents National Youth Awards every year to motivate young persons to achieve excellence in the field of national service and to encourage them to develop a sense of responsibility to their community and to improve their own potential as good citizens and young leaders. The Award consists of a silver medal, a certificate, a shawl and a cash prize. **From this year, the Government has doubled award money for individual awardees from Rs. 20,000 to Rs. 40,000 and for voluntary organizations from Rs. 1 lakh to Rs. 2 lakhs.**

These awards are given away on the opening day of the five-day National Youth Festival by the Hon'ble Chief Guest. National Youth Awards for 2007-08 were given away by Dr. M. Hamid Ansari, Vice President of India to 25 individuals and 2 voluntary organizations during the 14th National Youth Festival held at Amritsar, Punjab from 12th to 16th January, 2009. The list of awardees is given in **Annexure-VII**.

The Scheme of Scouting and Guiding, a Central Scheme, was launched in the early 1980s, to promote the Scouts and Guides movement in the country. This is an international movement aimed at building character, confidence, idealism and spirit of patriotism and service among young boys and girls. In the process, Scouting and Guiding also seeks to promote balanced physical and mental development among young people.

Under the scheme, financial assistance is provided to Bharat Scouts and Guides for various activities such as organization of training camps, skill development programmes, and holding of jamborees, etc. These activities, inter alia, include programmes related to adult literacy, environment conservations, community service, health awareness and promotion of hygiene and sanitation.

The Bharat Scouts and Guides is the largest voluntary, non political educational, movement in the country open to all without distinction of origin, race or creed, in accordance with the purposes, principles and methods conceived by the founder, Lord Baden Powell, in 1907. The Bharat Scouts and Guides organization has a network of branches covering all the States of India. Besides the territorial States (i.e. the states of the Indian union and the Union Territories) there are functional units, like the Kendriya Vidyalaya Sangathan, Navodaya Vidyalaya Samiti and the Indian Railways.

The Rashtriya Sadbhavana Yojana was launched in 2005 in place of the erstwhile National Reconstruction Corps Scheme. The scheme aims at encouraging leadership among the rural youth. Under the scheme an average of around 10-20 volunteers in each of the 500 districts having presence of NYKS were enrolled as Nehru Yuva Sathis (NYS). These NYSs are to be nominated by the selected best Youth Clubs and Youth Development Centres in the block and district respectively. They are entitled to receive a monthly honorarium of Rs.1000/- per month. The parameters on which the clubs are to be evaluated have been finalized and sent to all registered clubs affiliated with NYKS for participation in the scheme. The trained volunteers would be a great strength in the efforts to and empower and encourage the youth. During the period under report 6000 NYSs were deployed through Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan.

The National Service Volunteer Scheme (NSVS) was launched in 1969. This is one of the oldest and most successful scheme of the Ministry in providing a platform for the youth to take up a leadership role in the spheres of the social and community service at the grass roots level.

The National Service Volunteer (NSV) is a youth social worker who is willing to commit his/her energy and time to the service of the community and the country. National Service volunteers have been working in the field of education, agriculture, information technology, rural development and health. The NSVS provide for an opportunity for first work experience after education and is aimed to inculcate leadership qualities in them. During their deployment, the volunteers are paid Rs.2500/- per month by way of honorarium. During the period under report 7400 NSVs were deployed (through Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan 7100 and National Service Scheme 300).

There is considerable potential for utilizing the services of NSVs as a key link in the structure of the Youth Organizations. The programmes/projects undertaken with the involvement of NSVs during the year 2008-09 are as given below: -

Youth Hostels are built to promote youth travel within the country. The construction of the Youth Hostels is a joint venture of the Central and the State Governments. While the Central Government bears the cost of construction, the State Governments provide fully developed land free of cost. As on 31st March, 2009, 79 Youth Hostels have been constructed across the country and 6 more Youth Hostels are under various stages of construction. A statement indicating details of such completed/under construction hostels is at **Annexures VIII & IX**. The Youth Hostels are looked after by a Warden and an Assistant Warden, usually, a husband-wife team. These Wardens are appointed on contractual basis.

As on 1st March, 2009, an amount of Rs.275.00 lakhs have been released towards construction purposes in General Category States. A sum of Rs.75.00 lakhs have been released for the construction purposes in North East States under the Youth Hostel Scheme.

During the financial year 2008-09, three youth Hostels at Vizianagaram (AP), Ooty (Tamil Nadu) and Badrinath (Uttarakhand) has been completed.

The construction of a new Youth Hostel with State of Art technology with modern facilities has commenced at Tarn Taran, Punjab. The construction of the hostel has been initiated by National Building Construction Corporation (NBCC), an IS/ISO 9001 Company.

Commonwealth Youth Programmes (CYP)

INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION (COMMONWEALTH YOUTH PROGRAMME & EXCHANGE OF YOUTH DELEGATIONS):

This programme came into being in 1974 with the overall purpose of promoting the development of youth in the Commonwealth. This programme encourages and supports the youth in the process of national development and provides opportunities for increasing international understanding. Its mandate orients it to work towards a society where young women and men are empowered; to develop their potential, creativity and skills as productive and dynamic members of their societies; to participate fully at every level of decision making development, both individually and collectively, successfully promoting Commonwealth values of international co-operation, social justice, democracy and human rights.

CYP Asia Centre at Chandigarh, is one of the four CYP Regional establishments along with the Centres in Lusaka (Zambia) for the Africa region, Georgetown (Guyana) for the Caribbean region and Solomon Islands for the South Pacific region. The overall responsibility for CYP lies with the Commonwealth Secretariat at London. The activities of the CYP including the Asia Centre are directed by Youth Affairs Unit of the Commonwealth Secretariat. The Asia Centre meets the specific needs of 7 Commonwealth Countries of the region, namely, Brunei Darussalam, Bangladesh, India, Malaysia, Maldives, Singapore and Sri Lanka.

At present, there are three major strategic areas on which Commonwealth Youth Programme is concentrating:

- National Youth Policy;
- Human Resource Development, and
- Youth Empowerment.

The programmes are financed by member countries and India.

CENTRES OF EXCELLENCE (CoE)

In consultation with Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, the Commonwealth Secretariat, London has identified CYP Asia Centre, Chandigarh alongwith Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development, Sriperumbudur (Tamil Nadu) as Centres of Excellence. CoE provides an important learning and development resource its specialized field(s). CYP envisages a CoE for youth development as the engine room for creating and gathering evidence that will be used to chart out the interventions, reforms and strategies that are needed to achieve improved outcomes for young people. The Centre's role would be to collect, analyze and synthesize current and evolving knowledge about the best available evidence based practice in managing, supporting and delivering youth programmes and to generate new research in this area.

These Centres enable the development of evidence-based practice, the application of critical methods of learning, enquiry and practice development in order to enhance the capacity, knowledge and skills in each specialized field. The CoE would focus on effective strategies for engaging youth in meaningful participation in decision-making. One of the key principles of a CoE would be to commit and to engage youth directly in planning, designing and implementing the Centre's activities in partnership with a number of other stakeholders.

Young people would be trained and supported to find, describe and build models of effective strategies for engaging youth as well as to help communities implement strategies at the local level. Not only would the CoE develop tools to evaluate, measure and demonstrate effective youth engagement, it would also create an accessible clearinghouse for information on the issue. In order to do so, it would demonstrate that it is a working model of youth engagement.

EXCHANGE OF DELEGATIONS OF YOUTH AT INTERNATIONAL LEVEL

The Department endeavors to inculcate in the youth a broader view in the increasingly flat World and create an international perspective in collaboration with other countries and international agencies/organizations on various youth issues. The Department also

collaborates with the Commonwealth Youth Programme Asia Centre, Chandigarh, in organizing a number of events concerning youth in Commonwealth countries in the Asia-Pacific Region. In this context the International Exchange of Youth Delegations has been conceived as an effective instrument.

2. Under this programme, exchange of Youth Delegations with friendly countries is taken up on reciprocal basis for promoting exchange of ideas, values and culture amongst the youth of different countries and also to develop International understanding. Exchange of Youth Delegations and International training programmes were organized as under:

A. INDIA-CHINA YOUTH EXCHANGE PROGRAMME

During the visit of the Chinese Premier to India in April 2005, it was decided that regular youth exchange activities would be launched between India and China. It was decided that in the period from 2006 to 2010 a total of 500 youth from both countries will visit each other.

The exchange programme involves interaction with local youth, visit to tourist and cultural sites and introduction to the countries economic and social activities. In addition, it also has elements of educational values, meetings with economic and political personages and interactive sessions in different areas.

In the year 2008-2009, the second batch of 100 member **Indian Youth Delegation** led by Secretary (Youth Affairs) visited various places in China namely Beijing, Shanghai, Guiyang and Fuzhou from 29th June to 8th July, 2008 and interacted with the officials, youth organization and students interspersed with cultural programmes during their stay in China.

A 100 member **Chinese Youth Delegation** visited India from November 11 to 19, 2008. During their 10-day stay in India, the delegation paid their visit to Delhi, Agra, Jaipur, Mumbai and Pune. The programmes included interaction with representatives of Youth Network Organizations of India, visit to youth and sports institutions, universities, industrial units, software parks, International Trade Fair, heritage and cultural centres etc.

B. INDIA-KOREA YOUTH EXCHANGE PROGRAMME

A 10-member **Indian Youth Delegation** visited Republic of Korea from 16th to 25th October, 2008.

In reciprocity, a Korean Youth Delegation consisting of 10 members visited India during 22nd September to 1st October, 2008. On 23rd September the delegation interacted with the NYKS Officers, National Service Volunteers and Youth Club Members on various schemes implemented by NYKS besides activities undertaken by Youth Clubs at Gandhi Smriti and Darshan Samiti, New Delhi. The power point presentation on NYKS was presented to the delegation.

- C. SAARC Youth Camp in Bangladesh from 28th July to 1st August, 2008.**
- D. Commonwealth Day Celebrations in Maldives from 9-12th March, 2008.**
- E. Training Programme for Young Leaders 2008 conducted by the Government of Japan, Japan International Co-operation Agency (JICA).**

The National Service Scheme (NSS) is a centrally sponsored scheme, launched in Gandhiji's Birth Centenary 1969, with the objective to develop character and personality of student youth through community service in schools and colleges. The Scheme is implemented through the State Governments and the operations of NSS are at the University/ College and Higher Secondary School level.

It began in 37 Universities involving 40,000 students. Today, NSS has more than 3.2 million student volunteers on its roll spread over 200 Universities and 41 (+2) Senior Secondary Councils and Directorate of Vocational Education covering more than 10,313 colleges/institutes of higher and technical education.

PROGRAMMES

The NSS volunteers undertake two types of activities: -

- (1) Regular Activities and
- (2) Special Camping Programmes.

(1) Regular Activities

During the regular activities the NSS volunteers devote 120 hrs per year for two consecutive years, which includes 20 hrs. of general orientation regarding NSS and the mode of work they have to do in their volunteership. After completion of the tenure, they are given certificates by the Universities and +2 Councils.

During this period they work in their adopted villages/slums in the field of cleanliness, adult education, environment conservation/protection, disaster management, health awareness through health check programmes, pulse polio immunization, drive against social evils, like dowry, drug abuse, superstition etc. The activities to be undertaken are governed largely by local conditions.

(2) Special Camping Programmes.

Special camping forms an integral part of National Service Scheme. It has special appeal to the youth as it provides unique opportunities to the students for group living, collective experience sharing and constant interaction with community.

Special Camping Programmes are organized generally on various developmental issues of national importance. In the past the themes of the Special Camping Programmes have been - Youth against Famine, Youth against Death and Diseases, Youth for Rural Reconstruction, Youth for Eco development and Youth for Mass Literacy, Youth for National integration and Social Harmony. The current theme of Special Camping is Healthy Youth for Healthy India. Every year 50 percent of the volunteers of each NSS unit are expected to participate in Special Camps, which is of 7 days duration.

FUNDING PATTERN

Union and State Governments jointly fund this programme at the ratio of 7:5 in all States except North East Region, Sikkim and Hilly Terrains where the ratio is 3:1. In J&K and all the Union Territories, Kendriya Vidyalayas and Navodaya Vidyalayas the programme is fully funded by the Government of India. As per the existing norms of the scheme expenditure of Rs. 160/- per volunteer per annum for Regular Activities and Rs. 300/- per volunteer per annum for Special Camping Programme is admissible for the states in rest of India. For North Eastern (NE) States including Sikkim, Himachal Pradesh and other hilly areas notified by the Planning Commission the present unit cost norms are Rs.200/- and Rs.400/- respectively.

At the State level, State NSS cells are established by Central Government with full financial support to look after the inter- departmental coordination for smooth implementation of the programme at the State level.

ORGANIZATION

At National level, the NSS Headquarters in the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, looks after policy planning and monitoring of the scheme. A Programme Advisor's Cell headed by a Programme Adviser has been entrusted with assessing and monitoring the targets set for students under NSS, and those under Special Camping Programmes. 15 Regional

Centres are functioning in various States under the control of Deputy or Assistant Programme Adviser or Youth Officer.

INDIRA GANDHI NSS AWARDS

In 1993-94, during the Silver Jubilee year of NSS, the IGNSS Awards were instituted to give recognition to selfless service rendered by the NSS volunteers, Programme Officers and the Programme Coordinators. This award is conferred to - (i) Best University (Programme Coordinator), (ii) 6 best Programme Officers and 6 units and (iii) 16 Best NSS volunteers.

TRAINING

To train the NSS Programme Officers and to equip them with the modern skills of social development, 5 Training Orientation and Research Centres (TORCs) and 13 Training and Orientation Centres (TOCs) are working all over the country which are funded by the Govt. of India. These institutions run orientation as well as refresher courses for the field functionaries associated with the NSS volunteers.

TARGETS & ACHEIVEMENTS

In the year 2008-09 there is a target to enroll 32.57 lakh volunteers for Regular Activities against which a number of 30, 84,100 volunteers have been actually enrolled. A number of 13,310 Special Camps are to be organized in adopted villages against which, 19105 Special Camps have been organized.

The NSS volunteers under the regular activities for environment conservation and enrichment, planted thousands of saplings throughout the country. They have undertaken innovative projects like creation of NSS grants in the institution campus, avenue plantation and plant identification. Under the lead initiative of Shri Dunge Govt. College, Bikaner, a massive Tree Plantation was taken up in which 1,05,000 saplings were planted in an area covering 300 hectares approx. within a span of 3.50 minutes involving 14,500 NSS volunteers and villagers; which has been recognized by Limca Book of World Records.

Mumbai University NSS volunteers helped the state administration and Police during Terror Strike in Mumbai. They controlled the crowd and traffic and helped the victims in taking them to St. George Hospital, Mumbai. NSS volunteers also organized Blood Donation Camps to help the victims of Mumbai Terror Attack and donated 600 units of blood.

REPUBLIC DAY CAMP

Every year Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports organizes five Pre-Republic Day Parade Camps in five regions viz. Eastern, Western, Northern, Southern and Central region, for participating in the national programme of 'Republic Day Parade'. A team consisting of NSS Programme Adviser, Head of the concerned Regional Centre, representatives of the Ministry and local concerned Resource Person visit the camps and selects the candidates for Final Republic Day Parade Camp, which is organized at New Delhi every year.

Every year, on the basis of selection from the Pre-Republic Day Camps, a contingent of NSS Volunteers participates in the Republic Day Parade at Rajpath on 26th January. The budget for the month-long activities is provided by the Govt. of India. This year, the month-long camp was organized at Ambedkar Bhavan, Rani Jhansi Road, New Delhi, where 200 NSS volunteers and 15 Programme Officers and NSS Officials from all over the country participated, and an amount of Rs. 63.90 lakhs has been sanctioned by the Government.

A 17-day orientation programme for 200 NSS volunteers of Republic Day Parade 2009 was organized by RGNIYD on various vital topics. i.e., Life Skills, Personality and Leadership development, Volunteerism, Career Guidance, Right to Information and Social Harmony and National unity. The programme was entirely activity based and the feedback from the participants was very good regarding the benefit of the programme attributed to them.

SPIC MACAY organized a Virasat Camp from 17-21 January, 2009 in which eminent artists like Saswati Sen, Ranjana Gauhar, Shankar Bandhu, Ustad Ashad Ali Khan performed.

During the month long stay in the camp; these volunteers also met Her Excellency, the President of India, Hon'ble Vice President of India and Hon'ble Union Minister of Youth Affairs & Sports.

INTRODUCTION

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS) is an autonomous body of the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports. NYKS has its presence in 501 districts of the country. It has become one of the largest Youth organizations in the world, reaching out to more than eight million non-student rural youth enrolled through about 2.58 lakh village based youth Clubs.

These Youth Clubs work in the areas like education and training, awareness generation, skill development and self-employment, entrepreneurial development, thrift and co-operation, besides development of the body through sports and adventure and mind through sustained exposure to new ideas and development strategies. For implementation of the programmes, every district Nehru Yuva Kendra (NYK) has a trained cadre of District Youth Coordinator, National Service Volunteers and Youth leaders.

THRUST AREAS

The primary thrust is to convert the Youth Clubs/Mahila Mandals to a movement through making this clubs and mandals as being the nucleus of youth convergence and empowerment. The district Nehru Yuva Kendras are enrolling the adolescents as members making their presence felt in the executive bodies of the Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals. The information booklets on schemes of Central Government and State Governments are also being distributed amongst the members of Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals, Youth Development Centres etc. Moreover, during 2008-09, 1500 youth in 50 districts were covered under Youth Leadership Training Programme in order to train and equip youth leaders with necessary knowledge and skill to assume the responsibility of the village situation and to act as catalytic agents of socio-economic-political change and over all development of the village.

NYKS accomplishes its task through two categories of programmes i.e. Regular Programmes and Need Based Special Programme and Schemes assigned to it by the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports and in addition Special programmes undertaken in collaboration with other Ministries and Organizations. Important programmes under these categories are detailed below along with significant achievements during the year 2008-09.

ACHIEVEMENTS OF NEHRU YUVA KENDRA SANGATHAN (NYKS)

During the Year 2008-09 NYKS undertook various important programmes. The Regular programmes along with significant achievements are given in the table below. These programmes include Campaign for identification of sports and social issues as per local need, resources and initiatives, Block Level Youth Leaders Meeting for Review & Planning by the District Youth Coordinators, Training of Youth Club Office Bearers and Members, Sports Tournament & Sports Material Purchase, District Folk Cultural Festival, District/ State Youth Awards (Individual), Celebration of National and International Days and Weeks, Sharamdan Shivirs (Work Camps), Quarterly Meetings of District Administration on Youth Programme / State Advisory Committee on Youth Programme (DACYP/SACYP), Documentation, Incentive to Youth Clubs for achieving optimum convergence of Youth & Sports, District Youth Convention, Grant-in-aid to Youth Clubs, Exhibition for Youth on Handicraft (Yuva Kriti), Panchayat Yuva Shakti Abhiyan (PYSA), National Convention of NSVs and NYSs and Need Based Special Programme.

II SCHEMES OF MINISTRY OF YOUTH AFFAIRS AND SPORTS IMPLEMENTED BY NEHRU YUVA KENDRA SANGATHAN

1. National Service Volunteers Scheme (NSVS)

Objective: The primary objective of NSV scheme is to provide opportunities to those graduate students below 25 years of age who feel motivated to serve the community for a year or two. Each volunteer is paid an honorarium of Rs.2500/- p.m. NSVs are given intense training on their induction, which primarily focuses on personality development, public speaking, positive thinking and a basic capsule of event management so that they can organize small campaigns and awareness programmes. Subsequently they are given refresher courses.

Achievement: The target of 7100 NSVs has been achieved.

2. Rashtriya Sadbhawana Yojana

Objective: This recently approved scheme of the Ministry aims at encouraging leadership among the rural youth. Under the scheme 10-20 volunteers in each of 501 districts with NYKS presence are enrolled as Nehru Yuva Sathee (NYS). These Sathees are nominated by the best selected Youth Clubs and Youth Development Centres in the block and district respectively. They are entitled to receive monthly honorarium of Rs.1000/-. The parameters on which the clubs are evaluated, have been sent to all registered clubs affiliated with NYKS for participation in the scheme. These trained volunteers are a great strength for their peer group in their endeavour to empower youth.

Achievement: During 2008-09, 6000 NYS were deployed, thus fulfilling the target for the year.

3. Development and Empowerment of Adolescents

The programme and achievement under this component which was started in 2003 is as follows :

- Constitution of an expert cell for delineating innovative Adolescent development activities;
- Selection of 63 districts where the activities were to be conducted;
- Creation of a fresh field infra-structure with training to the freshly appointed and selected field persons, namely, District Project Officers, Monitoring officers, Adolescent Peer Volunteers, and members of District Adolescent Resource Teams;
- Detailing of various works, programmes, activities done by the Head Quarters and the field;
- Impact study and reporting, etc.
- Benefit to 55836 adolescents- both girls and boys through the programmes on Life Skills training; training on Adolescent reproductive and Sexual Health; and related health matters;
- Formation of 3780 Teen Clubs in 126 Blocks of 63 districts;
- Parents and local (rural) stakeholders have whole-heartedly accepted the NYKS strategy of converting Life Skills training as an extra-socialization programme.

A rudimentary Action Plan was created for the Country Plan 7 (CP-7), i.e. for the period between 2008 and 2012; in that it is planned that the Adolescent Development work would continue in those 63 districts in whose 126 Blocks it started in the period of CP-6. It was also agreed that the UNFPA would continue supporting the infrastructure required (by the NYKS) for implementing the Adolescent Development Scheme of the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports.

The new financial began (2008-09) with the sanction of one 45 days' training in Life skills in all 63 districts. That programme was done. 2776 adolescents (F: 1405; M: 1371) got the benefit of this programme;

The UNFPA is supporting the finance involved in engaging 63 District Project Officers; Five Monitoring officers; 3 support staff; and 126 Adolescent Peer Volunteers.

The Ministry has sanctioned 256 residential camps (of 7 days' duration each) for training 40 X 256= 10,240 rural adolescents; 64 Career fairs; and Training of Village Counsellors for the current year. Work in the field has already begun on the organization of the camps. Other programmes have been planned for the next few months. Guideline, Protocols and funds have been issued to the field for the camps; and are under preparation for other programmes. One more proposal for funds to do certain environment building activities to sustain Teen Clubs is under consideration of the Ministry.

SPECIAL PROGRAMMES UNDER-TAKEN IN COLLABORATION WITH MINISTRIES AND OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

In addition to the above mentioned Regular Programmes, the NYKS during the year 2008-09 also undertook various Special Programmes in collaboration with other Ministries and Organizations. These programmes include National Integration Camps, Pakistan Youth Delegation, Budding Poets Remembers Martyrs (Valedictory Function of 1st War of Independence), Two day convention of NSVs and NYSs at Gandhi Samriti and Darshan Samiti, Rajghat, New Delhi, Korean Youth Delegation, Nehru Yuva Sandesh: Monthly News Magazine,

9th Know India Programme, Observance of Hindi Day/Pakhwara and Award Ceremony, Chinese Youth Delegation to India, Red Ribbon Express Project, A Nationwide Campaign of Youth Against Terrorism & Violence, XIV National Youth Festival 2009, Exhibition of RRE and Jammu & Kashmir Dastkar Pradarshani and Sanskritik Programme

Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development (RGNIYD) a Deemed University under section 3 of University Act 1956 was set up as an autonomous body by the Department of Youth Affairs and Sports, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India and registered under Societies Registration Act, XXVII of 1975 S.No.67 of 1993.

MANDATE

- a. To function as a Resource Agency and Think - Tank for youth programme, policies, and implementation strategies.
- b. To develop multi faceted - programmes for youth keeping in view of the social harmony and national unity as the ultimate objective.
- c. To grow and develop as a facilitator and nodal agency for youth training, youth work, and youth development in the country for rural as well as urban youth.
- d. To function as an Institute of advanced study in the field of youth and to develop such professional excellence as may be required for the purpose.
- e. To develop its programmes aimed at inculcating a sense of national pride, awareness of national goals and internalisation of national values among the youth workers.
- f. To develop new ideas and innovative programmes for motivating and creating a committed cadre of youth workers and functionaries.
- g. To promote and conduct action and user based applied research and evaluation studies in youth development and through this provide necessary thrust to youth programmes on systematic and scientific lines.
- h. To function as Center for Information Publication and Documentation pertaining to youth development.
- i. To provide Institutional training for the personnel working in the field of youth.

- j. To provide appropriate youth extension projects and services which can function as laboratory on youth work.
- k. To link its programmes and functions to the promotion of National Youth Policy.

Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development has been playing a vital and catalytic role at the national level as the apex Institute for Training, Research, Action Research, Consultancy, Dissemination and Documentation activities in the field of youth development.

This Institute has the following five Divisions besides the Administrative Division, each under a Faculty Head.

- Training, Orientation and Extension Division (TOE)
- Research, Evaluation and Documentation/Dissemination Division (READ)
- Panchayati Raj and Youth Affairs Division (PRIYA)
- International Centre for Excellence in Youth Development Division (ICEYD)
- Social Harmony and National Unity Division (SHANU)

During the year the Institute organized several important training programmes and undertook various important activities. The details of the Training Programme and other activities are as follows:

RGNIYD - DECLARED AS A DEEMED UNIVERSITY

The Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India on the advise of the UGC under section 3 of UGC Act 1956 declared vide letter No. F.9-3/2006-U.3 (A) dated 23 October 2008, Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Developments, Sriperumbudur, to be "Institute Deemed to be University" under the "De Novo" category.

RGNIYD launched academic programme aiming at professionalizing the concept of youth work through which empowerment of youth can be achieved. MA programmes in

- M.A. Youth Empowerment
- M.A. Career Counselling
- M.A. Gender Studies
- M.A. Local Governance
- M.A, Life Skills Education

The courses will have a combination of theory and practice with an element of research and development, focused on youth. There will be 4 semesters for all the M.A. Programmes.

NATIONAL CONSULTATIONS

The Institute holds National level consultation with experts, academicians, Practitioners and others to prepare Training Modules on vital issues of concern to the youth. In this task during the year several consultations were held and training modules were prepared which was followed up by a pilot-testing of the module among the target participants.

Regional Consultative Workshops on Youth Development Index

RGNIYD has undertaken a project on 'Construction of a Youth Development Index (YDI) and Youth Development Report for India' through the Tata Institute of Social Sciences. As part of this process, RGNIYD organised Regional Consultative Workshops, in collaboration with the Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Mumbai and local partners to obtain feedback and suggestions about the YDI. The Framework for the YDI is being

developed around the five thematic areas listed in the National Youth Policy (2003) viz., Health and Nutrition; Education and Training; Work and Employment; Culture and Lifestyle; and Citizenship and Participation. During the Regional Consultative workshops across the country, draft papers representing each of the thematic areas, key indicators and framework for the YDI were discussed with youth development experts. Alongside, a one-day workshop was organized in each of the five regions with the youth representing various fields to obtain feedback and suggestions on the status of youth in those particular regions.

Developing a Module on Education for Sustainable Development

Practical approaches of preserving the ecology and the natural resources of the earth would be dealt in the module.

Developing a Module on Career Counseling for Youth Functionaries

RGNIYD formulated a module for training these youth functionaries in career counselling who have more access to youth. Pilot Testing of the Module on Career Counselling for Youth Functionaries was done and a consultation with the State Liaison Officers of NSS was held. Subsequently the training was undertaken in six States.

Programme Development for Youth in Border Districts

With a view to developing programmes for the youth in the border districts and to bring in a synergy between the major youth organizations viz, RGNIYD, NSS and NYKS in the border districts, RGNIYD organized a consultation

Review of the NSS Training manual

The task of formulating the training manual was initiated wherein the need was assessed with the Deputy Programme Advisors, Youth Officers and other youth functionaries drawn from various parts of the country. The final manual now has 14 modules in two parts.

Development of Handbook for Functionaries in Extension

With the objective of codifying the methods and procedures in extension and to evolve a comprehensive handbook for the functionaries involved in extension activities, The broad content for the handbook was also evolved viz., the concept of extension, process and innovations, methodology, monitoring and evaluation, resources and convergence and agencies involved in extension and outreach activities.

Regional Consultation Programme on Trafficking, Commercial Sex

To debate on selected issues impinging the youth related to trafficking and commercial sex, to evolve strategies to counter these social evils a regional consultation on trafficking, commercial sex in Jammu & Kashmir.

SEMINARS/WORKSHOPS

RGNIYD organised several Workshops and Seminars viz. National Seminar on Citizenship Rights and Social Harmony, State Level Seminar on Developing Social Harmony and National Integration, Workshop on Peace Education for NSS Group Leaders, Seminar- a

Day with Transgender, Seminar on Life Skills for Excellence in Education and a Workshop on Tobacco Prevention and Control for Youth.

SENSITISATION PROGRAMMES

The Institute organized Sensitization Programme for Differently Abled Youth in collaboration with the National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities (NIEPMD), Chennai. to create awareness among the disabled youth about the welfare schemes for the disabled, to enhance their self esteem and coping skills and to provide them a conducive environment for full participation in all mainstream activities. Orientation Programme of NSS Programme Officers in Youth Leadership and Personality Development in Pondicherry, Andaman & Nicobar was organised. The Youth need to concentrate on gender issues and ensure that the society provides equal opportunities. The RGNIYD Manual on Gender Sensitization Programme was used to train the member of Panchayat Raj Institutions in Tamil Nadu.

With a view to developing short duration training programmes aiming at the employability of the youth in the concerned areas, a skill Development Programme was

organised in which courses based on locally available technologies in the areas of Agriculture, Science and Technology, and Medical/Health Science for community development were prepared.

LOCAL GOVERNANCE

A Training programme on Local Development: Policies and Programmes was organised for the elected young women Panchayat representatives. The Training programme covered important topics on water supply and sanitation, environmental protection at village level, awareness and protection of consumer rights, backward region grant fund for Panchayat development, social reforms and Panchayati Raj Institutions, National Rural Employment Guarantee Schemes. Swarnajayanthi Gram Swarozgar Yojana, youth policies and programmes, Right to Information Act, Indira Awas Yojana, Sarva Siksha Abhiyan and the role of Panchayati Raj Institution with reference to these schemes, importance of Social Auditing and programme appraisal. A Workshop on Community Development and Decentralised Governance for the National Service Volunteers of NYKS was organized

A Training programme on Good Governance and Social Audit was organised. The participants were provided valuable inputs on the problems and prospects of Panchayati Raj Institutions in Jammu and Kashmir, the role of Panchayati Raj Institutions in disaster management, promoting communal harmony, fostering elementary education. Besides, practical inputs on the role of PRIs in promoting health and sanitation were also provided.

INTERSTATE YOUTH EXCHANGE AND HOME STAY PROGRAMME FOR THE YOUTH OF NORTH-EASTERN STATES

An inter-state youth exchange and home stay programme for the youth of the southern states was organised by RGNIYD in collaboration with NYKS, Sikkim from 20-29 June 2008 at Sikkim. They visited various places of interest and interacted with the youth of the north-east. They also performed cultural programmes at various venues and the north-eastern youth also entertained the participants with their cultural programmes

A ten-day Interstate Youth Exchange and Home Stay Programme for the youth of North-Eastern states was held from 20-30 August 2008 at Vishakapatnam and Hyderabad in Andhra Pradesh.

A three-day action research workshop on community development and civic education with public-private partnership for slum dwelling youth of Chennai was conducted at RGNIYD in collaboration with the Centre for Child Rights Protection (CCRP), Chennai in which 37 youth participated. A Dissemination Workshop on the Research 'A Study on the Knowledge, Attitudes and Practice of Youth towards STI, HIV/AIDS among the youth in Tamil Nadu' at TANSACS premises on 19th May 2008 to disseminate the finding of the study among the key stakeholders.

ADOLESCENT HEALTH AND DEVELOPMENT PROJECT

Six batches of ‘Refresher Training for Teachers in Career Guidance’ was organized. in which 228 teachers from Government and Government-aided schools of Vellore district, Tamil Nadu participated. These teachers were already trained in career guidance during 2007. In order to promote awareness among local Panchayat leaders about Adolescent Health and Development Programme and to get support from them to form teen clubs in villages, two sensitization programmes for local leaders were organised. A Capacity Building Workshop on Population Education was organised by RGNIYD in collaboration with Janasankya Sthirtha Kosh (JSK) and Nehru Yuva Kendra (NYK).

Community Intervention Programme is being implemented in Sriperumbudur Block of Kancheepuram District and Alangayam Block of Vellore District. Training on enhancing life skills for adolescents was organized at Chennai. A Training programmes on adolescent reproductive and sexual health and HIV/AIDS was organised at Trivandrum. The adolescent health and development project of RGNIYD since its inception has formed 27 teen clubs in Vellore and Sriperumbudur blocks. In order to strengthen and sustain the activities of the teen clubs a one-day orientation programme for Teacher Coordinators and Teen Club Office Bearers

on 'teen clubs' was organized. Life Skill and Peer Educators Training Programme for Teen Clubs were organised. National Workshop in Media Literacy for Adolescents as organised to understand the impact of media on adolescents, the benefits of media and sensationalisation of violence and crime.

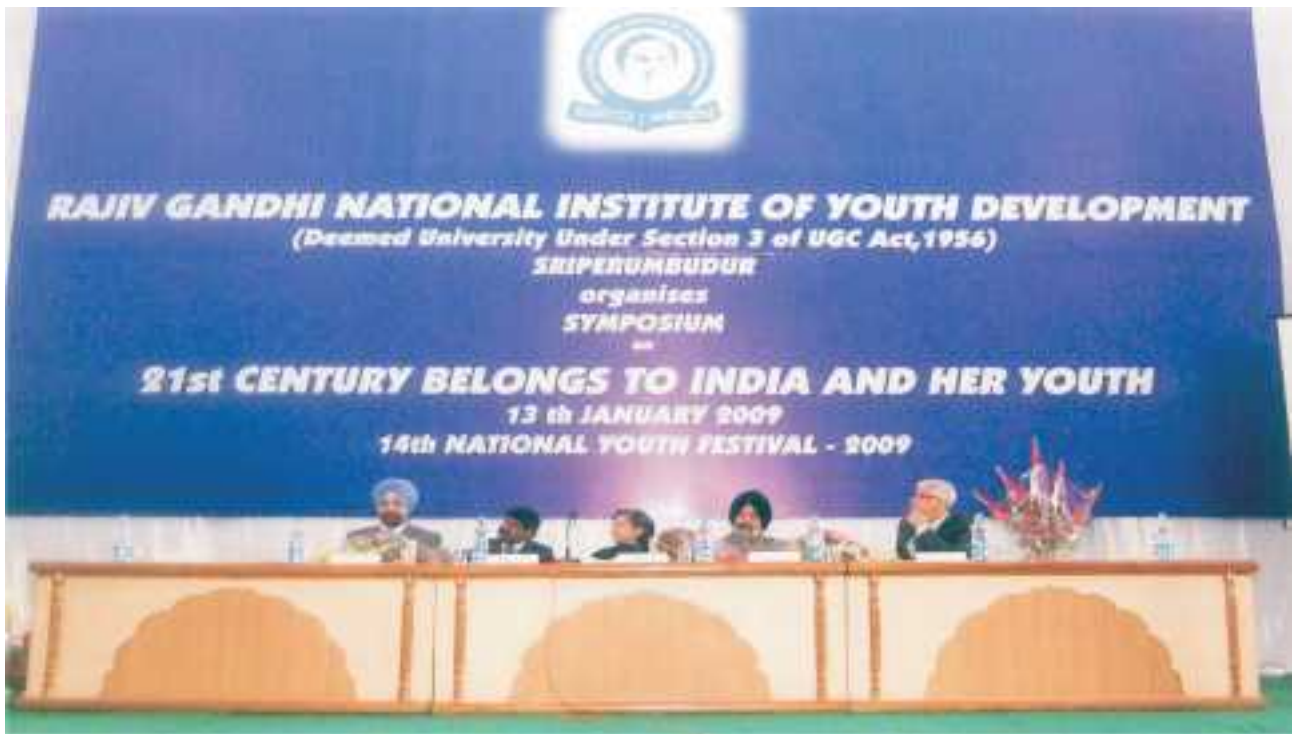
The Community Radio "ILANTHALIR" became operational with the broadcast of programmes prepared by the adolescents themselves, with a daily relay between 3-4 pm and 4-5 pm. Community Radio Sets were distributed to the schools in and around Sriperumbudur to receive the programmes.

The UNFPA officials lauded the activities of the Adolescent Health and Development Project of RGNIYD supported by them and were very much impressed with the activities of the AHDP.

DEPARTMENT OF SPORTS



SPORTS DEVELOPMENT

Sports and games have always been seen as an integral component in all round development of human personality. Apart from being means of entertainment and physical fitness, sports have also played a great role in generation of the spirit of healthy competition and bonding within the community. Needless to mention that achievements in sports at the international level have always been a source of national pride and prestige.

With modern sports being highly competitive, the use of modern infrastructure, equipment and advanced scientific support has changed the scenario of sports at the international level. Keeping in line with the growing demands for advanced infrastructure, equipment and scientific support, Government of India has taken several initiatives and is providing the necessary assistance to the sportspersons by way of training and exposure in international competitions backed up with scientific and equipment support. For broad-basing of the sports and mass participation in sports, the Ministry has introduced the centrally sponsored scheme entitled 'Panchayat Yuva Krida aur Khel Abhiyan'.

NATIONAL SPORTS POLICY INITIATIVES

Physical education, games and sports have been receiving attention over successive Plans. However, it was only after India hosted the IX Asian Games in 1982 that "Sports" as a subject of policy started receiving attention. National Sports Policy, 1984 was the first move towards developing an organized and systematic framework for the development and promotion of sports in the country, and the precursor of the present National Sports Policy, 2001.

NATIONAL SPORTS POLICY 2001

The twin planks of the National Sports Policy 2001 are "Broad-basing" of Sports and "Achieving Excellence in Sports" at the national and international levels.

The salient features of the Policy are as under:

1. Broad basing of sports and achievement of excellence;
2. Up-gradation and development of infrastructure;
3. Support to National Sports Federations and other sports bodies;
4. Strengthening of scientific and coaching support to sports
5. Special incentives to promote sports
6. Enhanced participation of women, scheduled tribes and rural youth;
7. Involvement of corporate sector in sports promotion; and
8. Promote sports mindedness among the public at large.

MAJOR SPORTS ACHIEVEMENTS OF INDIAN TEAMS IN INTERNATIONAL EVENTS

Chapter-15

India has, of late, been positioning itself as an important host country/destination for organizing a variety of discipline specific and multi-discipline, mega, international sports events. The Commonwealth Youth Games were held in Pune in the month of October 2008. This will be followed by the main Commonwealth Games, 2010 to be held in Delhi.

Apart from this, the Ministry also supports participation of Indian Teams in the major International Sports events. Some of the achievements of the Indian teams during the year 2008-09 are as follows:

Beijing Olympics 2008

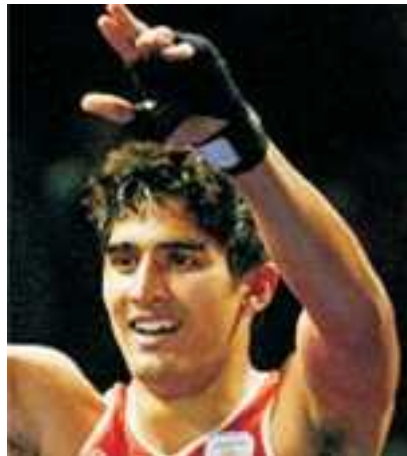
For the first time in the history of Indian Sports, India won an individual Olympic gold medal at the Beijing Olympics 2008. Shri Abhinav Bindra created history by clinching the gold medal in 10 meter air rifle event. Shri Vijender Kumar and Shri Sushil Kumar won Bronze medals in boxing and wrestling, respectively. Further, India's performance in terms of medals tally at Beijing Olympics was better than that in previous Olympic Games. In all, 56 Indian Athletes participated in the Games held from 8th to 24th August, 2008. List of medal winners along with those athletes who gave creditable performance in Beijing is furnished below:-

1. Sh. Abhinav Bindra, Shooter won first Individual Gold medal in shooting 10 M Air Rifle.

2. Sh. Vijender Kumar, Boxer won first Individual Bronze medal in 75 Kg. wt. category.

3. Sh. Sushil Kumar, Wrestler won Bronze medal in 66 Kg. wt. category.
4. Ms. Saina Nehwal, Badminton player gave superb performance to become 1st Indian women shuttler to reach Olympic Quarter Finals.
5. Akhil Kumar, Boxer 54 Kg, lost in the quarter finals.
6. Jitender Kumar, Boxer 51 Kg. lost in the quarter finals.
7. Gagan Narang, Air Rifle shooter though shot 595 points out of 600 points (i.e. only one point less than Abhinav) but finished 9th place.

Other Major Achievements

- i) India stood first in the medal tally at the Commonwealth Youth Games held in Pune, India from 12-18 October, 2008 with 76 Medals (33 Gold + 26 Silver + 17 Bronze).
- ii) Vishwanathan Anand retained his world title defeating GM Vladimir Kramnik of Russia at the World Chess Championship held in Bonn in the month of October 2008.
- iii) Indian Jr. Men's Hockey won Gold Medal at the 6th Junior Asia Cup held at Hyderabad from 11th to 18th July, 2008 while the Indian Junior Women (U-21) team won the Bronze Medal in the 5th Jr. Asia Cup held at from 14-25 December, 2008 and qualified for the World Cup at USA in August, 2009.

- iv) Indian Junior Free Style, Greco Roman Style and Female wrestling team won two bronze medals at the Junior World Championship held at Turkey in August, 2008; 01 Gold + 03 Silver +07 Bronze medals in Junior Asian Championship held at Doha, Qatar in July, 2008 and 07 Gold + 02 Silver +10 Bronze medals Asian Cadet Championship held at Tashkent, Uzbekistan in July, 2008

- v) Indian Women Boxing team won 1Gold + 1 Silver + 2 Bronze medals in World Women Boxing championship held at Ningbo City China and. won 3 Gold + 3 Silver Medals in Asian Boxing Championship held at Guwahati.
- vi) Indian contingent won 3 Gold medals in Basketball (men), Kabaddi (men and women) and 2 Bronze medals in Basketball (women) and Body Building in 1st Asian Beach Games at Bali, Indonesia in October, 2008.
- vii) Saina Nehwal became the first Indian to win the World Junior Badminton Championship held in Pune in October 2008. Guru Sai Dutt won Bronze medal in Men's Single and Ms. Saina Nehwal & Mr. Aditya Prakash won Bronze medal in Mixed team event in Junior World Badminton Championship. Saina also became the first Indian to make it up to the semi-finals of the World Federation Super Series Masters Finals held in Malaysia in December, 2008.

- viii) Indian Junior Rowers won 2Gold, 1Silver and 1Bronze Medal in the 14th Asian Junior Rowing Championship held in Hong Kong in November, 2008.
- ix) Indian Boxers Akhil, Dinesh, Jitender and A. L. Lakara won one Bronze Medal each in the AIBA World Cup held at Moscow, Russia in December, 2008.
- x) Indian Wushu players won 1Silver and 3 Bronze Medals in the II World Junior Wushu Championship held at Bali in December, 2008.
- xi) Indian Sr. (Women) Kabaddi Team won Gold Medal in 3rd Asian Women Kabaddi Championship held at Madurai (Tamilnadu) in September, 2008.

INTRODUCTION

The Sports Authority of India (SAI) was set up as an autonomous body in 1984 with the objective of promoting sporting excellence. It is also entrusted with the responsibility of maintaining and utilizing, on behalf of Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, the following Stadia in Delhi:-

- 1) Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium
- 2) Indira Gandhi Stadium (Indoor) and Yamuna Velodrome
- 3) Major Dhyan Chand National Stadium
- 4) Dr. Shyama Prasad Mookherjee Swimming Pool Complex
- 5) Dr. Karni Singh Shooting Ranges

Subsequently, in order to adopt an integrated approach towards promotion and development of sports, the erstwhile Society for National Institutes of Physical Education & Sports (SNIPES) consisting of NSNIS Patiala at its centers and the two LNCPEs located at Gwalior and Thiruvananthapuram were merged with SAI w.e.f. 1st May, 1987. The LNCPE Gwalior was, however, delinked from SAI in September, 1995 on attaining the status of a “Deemed University”.

GENERAL BODY & MEMBER OF SOCIETY OF SAI

The **Governing Body** of SAI headed by the Union Minister for Youth Affairs & Sports and the Union Minister of State for Youth Affairs & Sports is its Vice-Chairman.

The last meeting of the Governing Body was held on 23rd February 2009.

AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

- To promote and broad-base sports in the country.
- Talent identification and development.

- To implement schemes/programmes for achieving excellence in sports in different disciplines at international level in order to establish India as a major sporting power.
- To manage the Stadia in Delhi, which were constructed/renovated for the IXth Asian Games held in 1982.
- To act as an interface between the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports & other agencies concerned with the promotion/development of sports in the country.
- To establish, run, manage and administer the institutions to produce high caliber coaches, sports scientists and physical education teachers.
- To plan, construct, acquire, develop, take over, manage, maintain and utilize sports infrastructure and facilities in the country.
- To initiate, undertake, sponsor, stimulate and encourage research projects related to various sports sciences for up gradation of sports, sportspersons and coaches;
- Other incidental issues concerning promotion, development and excellence in sports.

ORGANISATIONAL SET UP

The activities of Sports Authority of India fall under the following functional Divisions.

- (i) Academics
 - a) SAI Netaji Subhas National Institute of Sports, Patiala
 - b) SAI Lakshmi Bai National College of Physical Education, Thiruvananthapuram.
- (ii) Operations - Deals with Sports Promotional Schemes of SAI
- (iii) TEAMS - Training of Elite Athletes and Management Support
- (iv) Stadia - Maintenance & utilization of Stadia including Coaching
- (v) Personnel - Service matters
- (vi) Vigilance - Vigilance matters related all categories of SAI employees.
- (vii) Finance - Budget and Financial planning.
- (viii) Coordination - Coordinates with ministry & others out side agencies/ Institutional along with SAI regional/Sub Centres.
- (ix) Media - Coordination with Print & Visual media/Release of NIT/ Advertisement and press briefings.

SCHEMES OF SAI

The Sports Promotional Schemes of SAI were conceived and formulated during 7th Five Year Plan for development and promotion of sports at grass-root level in the country. SAI is currently implementing the following Sports Promotional Schemes through its Regional Centres :-

- a) National Sports Talent Contest (NSTC) Scheme.
- b) Army Boys Sports Companies (ABSC) Scheme.
- c) SAI Training Centre (STC) Scheme
- d) Special Area Games (SAG) Scheme
- e) Centre of Excellence Scheme
- f) Capital Projects
- g) National Coaching Scheme
- h) Govt. Schemes being implemented by SAI on agency basis.

The salient features of the following Sports Promotion Schemes being implemented by the SAI are indicated in the succeeding paragraphs.

a) **NATIONAL SPORTS TALENT CONTEST (NSTC) SCHEME**

The National Sports Talent Contest Scheme was launched during 1985 under which the talented young children between the age group of 14 - 18 years are spotted and nurtured by providing scientific training. The main concept of the scheme is to PLAY & STUDY in the same school. Scientific scouting of talent at optimum age is essential for converting the gifted and talented children into future medal hopes in various competitions at National and International level. Each adopted school in addition to the services of coaches for imparting training to the inmates gets Rs. 20, 000/- per annum for purchase of consumable sports equipment.

The selection of trainees is done on potential and performance basis.

- Medal winners in State/National Level Competitions are automatically admitted into the Scheme subject to their being found medically fit.
- Medal winners at District Level Competition or those who have participation in State Level Competitions are admitted subject to their being found fit medically and physically and also having the required potential, which is assessed by battery of tests.

- Selection from remote, tribal & coastal areas is done by organizing competitions among participants.
- Talent is identified by a Selection Committee consisting of representatives of SAI, School, State Govt. SAI Coaches, Sports Scientists etc.
- The sportspersons identified on this basis are offered admission after age verification, medical examination and finding suitable by applying battery of tests.

Under the Scheme selected trainees are admitted on non-residential basis. However, in exceptional cases the trainees are admitted on residential basis and they are provided boarding and lodging facilities @ Rs.75/- per head per day for 300 days in a year instead of stipend of Rs.300/- per month which is given to non residential trainees. The non-residential trainees are also provided with Rs.2000/- per year per head for competition exposure and Rs.2000/- per head per year for sports kit. The trainees admitted on residential basis are also provided competition exposure and sports kit on the same norms.

At present there are 22 Regular Adopted Schools, 27 schools adopted to promote indigenous games / martial arts, and 33 Akharas.

i) Extension of NSTC Scheme to Navodaya Vidyalayas

Keeping in view the need to promote sports in remote and rural areas & to provide greater balance for village children the NSTC Scheme was extended to Navodaya Vidyalaya having the requisite infrastructure. These schools also act as feeder centres to SAI Training Centres and SAG Centres. The centres are established in association with Navodaya Vidyalaya Samiti. As on date 49 Navodaya Vidyalayas are functioning. Total strength of trainees under NSTC Scheme is 2372 (1826 boys, 546 girls).

In addition to the services of qualified coaches the adopted schools are given an annual grant of Rs. 20,000/- for purchase of equipment and the inmates inducted under the scheme are provided stipend @ Rs. 300 per head per month for 10 months, Rs. 1500/- per year towards sports kit and Rs. 1500/- per year towards competition exposure.

ii) PROMOTION OF INDIGENOUS GAMES & MARTIAL ARTS

With a view to promote Indigenous Games & Martial arts in the schools in rural & semi urban areas and scouting of talent in these games, 27 schools

have been adopted till date. Under this scheme, the scouting of talent in indigenous Games & Martial arts is done on the basis of competitions being organized. The retention/weeding out of existing trainees are done on the basis of their performance in these competitions.

The schools adopted are given an annual grant of Rs. 25,000/- for organizing competitions in addition to annual grant of Rs. 20,000/- given for purchase of equipment. The selected trainees are provided sports kit, competition exposure & stipend as applicable to other trainees selected in the Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalaya Adopted School under NSTC scheme. In addition to this, the schools are also be provided the services of expert for imparting training.

iii) Promotion of Wrestling in the Country

Wrestling has been a traditional indigenous sport in the country and mostly played at village level. India has won many international medals in the past and has been a force to reckon with. In order to create a broader base for modern wrestling and supplement the efforts made by various Akharas in the country, 33 Akharas have been provided with equipment support as on date. The adopted Akharas are provided with one set of Wrestling Mat and/or Multi-Gym and the trainees of the Akharas are provided a stipend of Rs.1000/- per month per trainee to supplement their diet charges, besides accident insurance.

b) ARMY BOYS SPORTS COMPANY

With a view to leveraging the excellent infrastructure, efficient administration and disciplined environment for sports training available in the Army at its various regimental centers, SAI and Army have joined hands to jointly nurture talented boys in sports. Boys in the age group of 8 to 16 years are admitted in the 16 ABSCs. After attaining the required age the trainees are also offered job in Army. Athletics, Archery, Basketball, Boxing, Diving, Equestrian, Football, Gymnastics, Handball, Hockey, Kayaking & Canoeing, Swimming, Shooting, Rowing, Volleyball, Wrestling and Weightlifting disciplines are covered under this scheme. The selection criteria for admission of trainees are the same as applicable under the NSTC Scheme.

The trainees in the 15 ABSC Centres are provided Boarding & lodging, Educational Expenses, Sports Kit, Insurance, Medical cover, Competition Exposure & Scientific

Coaching by experienced coaches. Each ABSC also gets a grant of Rs. 50,000/-per annum for purchase of consumable sports equipment & maintenance of play fields. At present there are 1044 boys trainees under ABSC Scheme.

c) SAI TRAINING CENTRES

The main objective of the scheme is to train meritorious sportspersons in the age group of 14-21 years. The age is relaxed depending upon the merit of the case. The medal winners at State or National level competition in individual events & Team Games are admitted in the Scheme under category - I (based on the performance of last two years). The players who have participated in State/ National level competitions including medal winner at District level competitions are admitted subject to passing a battery of tests. The details of achievements trainees of SAI Training Centres during 2008 - 09 are at **Annexure - X**. At present there are 58 STCs in which 8205 (5580 boys and 2625 girls) are being trained.

d) SPECIAL AREA GAMES SCHEME

Special Areas Games Scheme aims at scouting and nurturing natural talent for modern competitive sports and games from tribal, rural and coastal areas of the country. The Scheme also envisages tapping of talent from indigenous games and martial arts and also from region, which are either genetically or geographically advantageous for excellence in a particular sports discipline. The main objective of the Scheme is to train meritorious sports persons in the age group of 14 - 21 years. The age is relaxed depending upon the merit of the case.

The trainees admitted under the residential scheme are provided free Boarding and Lodging facilities, sports kit, sports equipment, competition exposure, insurance, medical expenses etc and non residential trainees with monthly stipend, sports kit, sports equipment, competition exposure etc.

The Special Area Games Centres are started in consultation with the State Govts/ UT Administration. The State Govt. has to provide requisite land with infrastructure. However, in case the non-availability of infrastructure the State Govt. has to provide developed land on long term lease basis to SAI enabling it to create the required facilities. Before the start of the Centre an Agreement has to be signed between SAI and the State/UT Govt. The details of achievements of SAG trainees 2008 - 09 are at **Annexure - X**. At present there are 21 Centres in which 1917 (1142 boys & 775 girls) are being trained.

Adoption of Sports Centers on the pattern of existing schemes for Akharas under NSTC Scheme

In the 47th Finance Committee Meeting held in the year 2006 - 07 it was decided that the sports centers being run by schools, collages, village level organizations and voluntary organizations promoting disciplines such as Athletics, Judo, Wrestling, Boxing and Swimming especially in the North Eastern states and Jammu and Kashmir should be encouraged.

Facilities provided under this scheme are:

1. Financial support or provision of equipment as the case may be, in order to achieve better results and performance.
2. Stipend @ Rs.1000/-PM for 10 months in a year for 15-20 trainees.

Extension Centers of STC/SAG Centers to cover schools/colleges for wider covera

Such centers which have adequate infrastructure and produce results but lack technical inputs are brought under this scheme. Institutions having past history of producing national & international sports persons are covered under this scheme.

Facilities to be provided under this scheme:

1. Financial support to the tune of Rs. 5000/-per trainees per year not exceeding one (1) lac annually to support infrastructure and equipment needs.
2. The trainees under this scheme are provided with a stipend of Rs.6000/-per trainee for 10 months in a year
3. Competition exposure @ 3000/-PA
4. Sports Kit @ 4000/- PA
5. Insurance coverage up to Rs.150/- PA

As on date the number of centers under this scheme is 75 in which 1202 (746 boys and 456 girls) are being trained.

Note: Functional centers for the above mentioned scheme as on today are seventy five (75).

e) CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE SCHEME

As a natural corollary to the Sub-Junior, Junior Schemes, the Scheme of Centre of Excellence envisaged induction of talent in the Country who has shown promising performance in the Sr. National Competitions beyond the above age groups for further training at the Regional Centres/Sub-Centres of SAI for nearly 200 days in a year. They are provided with the state of art facilities, equipment and scientific back up along with specialized training. These Centres of Excellence operate as regular coaching camp for the best available talent in India and provide two or possibly three concurrent layers of highly skilled sports persons giving a wider choice of talent and continuity for later selection to National Teams and provide alternative second and third options for the National Teams.

The trainees are admitted into the Scheme on residential and non-residential basis. The trainees admitted on residential basis are provided boarding and lodging facilities, sports kit, sports equipment, competition exposure, insurance, medical expenses and scientific sports training. Non-residential trainees are given monthly stipend, sports kit, competition exposure based on the laid down scheme norms. At present there are 12 centres in which 343 (223 boys & 120 girls) are being trained.

REGIONAL CENTRES

1. NETAJI SUBHAS EASTERN CENTRE, KOLKATA

The SAI Eastern Centre was established on 23rd Jan' 1983, on 42 Acres of land at Salt Lake City, Kolkata. The Centre has infrastructure facilities ranging from training facilities to medical facilities to scientific set up. In addition, residential facilities for the trainees are also available.

The Centre conducts National Coaching Camps, diploma Course in Coaching for various sports and refresher Courses. It also provides organizational support documentation and scientific backup with a view to achieving excellence in sports. Extensive talent scouting programmes are conducted for identifying talented sports person to induct them in various sports promotional schemes being implemented in the region.

Infrastructure facilities at the Centre

The Centre has one cinder athletic track, four cemented courts for Basketball and two clay courts for Kabaddi, Lawn Tennis (Two hard courts and two clay courts) Volleyball (four courts) , two Cricket Pitches in clay and concrete, one Archery field, four Football fields, Boxing (one International standard and one practice ring), and one Billiards Hall. In the small indoor hall students of diploma course in boxing and state national level trainees are imparted training in the boxing ring.

As far indoor facilities are concerned it has two indoor halls, one for Basketball, Gymnastics, Badminton, Volleyball, Table Tennis, Fencing etc. This apart a hall for Judo & Billiards and one conditioning hall for ladies and gents, equipped with available fitness equipment. Other infrastructure are related with Administrative and Scientific building and hostel buildings two house about 400 trainees.

Besides the NSTC scheme which covers adopted schools including those covered for promotion of indigenous games and Martial Arts and Navodaya Vidyalayas, 1 ABSC, 8 SAG Centres, 7 STC Centres and one Centre of Excellence are also functioning in the region.

2. SAI NETAJI SUBHAS SOUTHERN CENTRE, BANGALORE

SAI Southern Centre, Bangalore is spread over 101.2 acres of land is well equipped for imparting scientific and systematic training for elite sports persons and for monitoring and implementing various schemes of SAI and Govt. of India. It also conducts diploma course in coaching in various disciplines.

Sports Promotional Schemes of SAI namely NSTC (2 Schools adopted, 3 covered under indigenous games and martial arts, 11 Navodaya Vidyalayas), 14 STC centres, 4 SAG centres and 3 Centre of Excellence are functioning in the region. In addition to this there is one more SAI Training centre functioning at LNCPE, Trivandrum, which is being directly monitored by Principal, LNCPE, Trivandrum.

The following infrastructure facilities are available at the center:

SPORTS INFRASTRUCTURE AVAILABLE

The centre has the following outdoor and indoor sports infrastructure:

Outdoor:- One Athletic track each of synthetic and cinder, two basketball courts (mosaic), one football field(Turf), one Handball court (clay), three cinder and one

sandy volleyball court, five clay and one cement Lawn Tennis court, one Swimming Pool with diving facility and one for learners, one hockey field of polygrass and one of turf, two clay courts for kho-kho and Kabaddi, one golf course of nine holes and Shooting Range with facility for 25m, 50m and trap and skeet event.

Indoor: One Badminton hall (multipurpose) one hall having facilities for Volleyball/ Basketball/Handball, 3 halls for weightlifting. In addition to this it also has a hall for conditioning, Judo and 10 mt. Shooting Range.

Apart from this there is hostel accommodation for about 573 sportspersons, Health Centre, Administrative and Sports Science Centre for the convenience of sportspersons and staff, it also has a small shopping complex.

3. NETAJI SUBHAS NORTHERN CENTRE, SONEPAT:

SAI Netaji Subhash Northern Centre was set up on 15th October 1991 at Chandigarh to implement the schemes of SAI as well as the schemes of the MYAS in the states of Northern Region. The Government of Haryana has allotted 83 acres of land at Sonapat for establishment of Regional Centre, and creation of sports infrastructure and playing facilities. The Governing Body of SAI at its meeting held on 12th Nov-2001 approved the shifting of the Regional Centre from Chandigarh to Sonapat and also naming the centre after Late Ch.Devi Lal, Former Deputy Prime Minister of India.

There are 4 NSTC adopted schools, including 4 schools covered to promote indigenous games and martial arts. Besides this 3 Navodaya Vidyalayas and 6 Akharas have also been adopted under the NSTC scheme and 4 Akharas given equipment support. There are also 10 SAI

Training Centres and 20 Extension Centre of STC are functioning in the region under the Sports promotion schemes of SAI.

4. SAI WESTERN CENTRE, GANDHINAGAR:

The SAI Western Centre Gandhinagar covers the State of Gujarat, Maharashtra, Goa, Rajasthan and UT of Daman and Diu and Dadar Nagar Haveli under its jurisdiction.

There are 06 NSTC adopted schools, including 2 schools covered to provide indigenous games and martial arts. Besides this, 8 Navodya Vidyalaya and 13 Akharas have also been adopted under the NSTC Scheme. There are 7 STC, 20 STC Extension Centre and 1 Center of Excellence functioning in the Region under the Sports

Promotional Schemes of SAI. Besides this, assistance is also being provided to National Sailing Institute, Mumbai which was established in the premises of the Naval Sailing Club (Mumbai) on completion of the 1982 Asian Games. While the Indian Navy undertook the provision of space for boat storage and training, SAI was required to provide the equipment, manpower and assistance to run the centre. It has been approved to established SAG centre for Yachting.

The following infrastructure facilities are available at the center:

The Regional Centre at Gandhinagar has 25mt Shooting Range, field of Hockey (2 nos), Football and Cricket, courts for tennis (3 clay courts), Basketball (3 cemented courts), Squash (wooden court), Handball (clay and grassy-4 courts), Kho-Kho/ Kabaddi (5 clay courts), Volleyball (4 clay courts) and synthetic surface for Athletic (400m track) and Hockey. All the playfields are flood lighted. It also has a Fitness center fully equipped with Multigym for youngsters and Corporate Members, Sauna bath, Steam bath and Billiards Table and a 50m Swimming Pool with separate Diving pool and 400m Cinder Athletic track.

After taking over the complex from the State Govt. of Gujarat the following facilities were added by SAI.

150 bedded Hostel Building, Sports Science and Admn Block, Guest House(called SAI Sadan) with 4 VIP suites and 8 air-conditioned single room, 4 cemented cricket pitches, one super-turf hockey field and synthetic athletic track, fitness centre, 4 handball courts(clay and grass) over head tank and flood lighting arrangements for all play fields. An indoor multi-purpose hall is under construction.

The Regional center also has WEST ZONE TRAINING CENTRE set up at Aurangabad.

5. NETAJI SUBHASH CENTRAL CENTRE, BHOPAL:

The Central Centre was established at Delhi in April, 1988. Subsequently the centre was shifted to Bhopal in 2001. The centre has been renamed as Udhav Das Mehta (Bhai ji) Central Regional Centre. The centre is operating from Rajiv Gandhi Bhavan, Shymala Hills in Bhopal. However, a full-fledged Regional Sports Complex is under construction in 100 acres of land, allotted by Govt. of Madhya Pradesh at GramGora, Bishen Kheri, Bhopal.

In addition to NSTC schools adopted under the scheme, including 4 Navodya Vidyalayas and those covered for promotion of indigenous games and 5 martial arts 2 Akharas have also been adopted under the NSTC Scheme. Apart from this,

there are 5 STC, 2 Centre of Excellence and 1 SAG Centre functioning in the Region under the Sports Promotional Schemes of SAI. There are also two associated centres at Allahabad and Meruut adopted under SAG Scheme.

Approximately 50 acres of land has been transferred to SAI for establishment of Sub-Center at Ranital, Jabalpur. However, on inspection it was reported by CPWD that the land is water logged and not suitable for construction. State Govt. has been requested to provide alternative land.

6. NETAJI SUBHAS SUB CENTRE LUCKNOW: Netaji Subhas Sub Centre, Lucknow has the following facilities:-

- a) 60 bedded boys and girls hostel
- b) 1 hockey synthetic field
- c) Fitness / Scientific block
- d) Grassy Football Field
- e) Running Track / Snyder Track
- f) 2 Lawn Tennis Courts
- g) 2 Volleyball Courts
- h) 2 Kabaddi Courts
- i) 2 Basketball Courts
- j) 1 Administrative Block

There are 6 STC, 2 Navodya Vidyalayas and 1 STC Centre functioning under this sub Centre, Lucknow.

7. NETAJI SUBHAS NORTH EASTERN REGIONAL CENTRE, IMPHAL:

Sports Authority of India, North East Regional Center Imphal, was established at Takyel, Imphal in September 1986 for development of sports in the region. At present the center is running schemes in three states namely Manipur, Mizoram and Nagaland.

The centre is having one Multipurpose Indoor hall and two fields each for football, Hockey, Sepak Takraw, Lawn-Tennis (cemented), Basketball, Handball and Kabaddi. One Athletic track (grass), One Archery Field and one SAG Indoor hall.

8. NETAJI SUBHASH NORTH-EASTERN SUB-CENTRE, GUWAHATI:

The centre is located in Guwahati in an area comprising 7.5 acres of land. The Sub-Center Guwahati operates schemes in Assam Meghalaya and Arunachal Pradesh. There are 4 schools adopted under NSTC Scheme, including 1 school for indigenous games and Martial Arts. In addition to this, there are covered under 1 NSTC Scheme. There are also 1 ABSC, 3 STC and 4 SAG centre functioning in the region.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMME

A) NETAJI SUBHAS NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF SPORTS: PATIALA

During the year 2008 - 09, the Institute carried out the following functions:

- Organization of various types of Academic Programmes.
- Management of the Coaching Camps for national probable for various international competitions.
- Management of the SAI Training Centre and the SAI Centre of Excellence, at the Institute.
- Implementation of the Umbrella Scheme of Incentives for promotion of Sports Activities.

PROGRAMMES UNDERTAKEN DURING 2008 - 2009

Organisation of various types of academic programmes

1. Diploma Course in Sports Coaching

The one-year Diploma Course was conducted by the Institute, at three different Centres of Patiala, Bangalore and Kolkata.

- Patiala : 17 disciplines : Athletics, Badminton, Basketball, Boxing, Cricket, Cycling, Fencing, Football, Gymnastics, Handball, Hockey, Judo, Table Tennis, Volleyball, Weightlifting, Wrestling and Wushu. In all, 262 students were admitted to these disciplines.
- Bangalore : 8 disciplines : Athletics, Hockey, Kho-kho/Kabaddi, Tennis, Softball, Swimming, Taekwondo and Volleyball. In all, 111 students were admitted for this training course at Bangalore.
- Kolkata: 4 disciplines: Archery, Athletics, Boxing and Football. In all 51 students

2. M. Sc. in Sports Coaching

This two year Masters Course is being conducted by the Institute at its Patiala Centre during the year 2006 - 08 has been conducted in all four Disciplines.

3. Certificate Course in Sports Coaching

The six-week Certificate Course in Sports coaching was conducted by the Institute, at various SAI academic centers. In all, 95 students attended the Course in 9 sports disciplines (2008 - 09)

4. Refresher Course

Refresher courses were held for different disciplines by the institution.

SCIENTIFIC SUPPORT TO NATIONAL CAMPS AND SAI SCHEMES:

The various scientific departments conducted scientific tests / evaluations on National Campers held at SAI NS NIS, Patiala. These departments provided valuable inputs for training of athletes preparing for different International Competitions.

Publication Section

The Institute publishes its Journal of Sports & Sports Sciences, and the quarterly NIS News Bulletin, apart from other general and specific sport related publications.

MANAGEMENT OF NATIONAL COACHING CAMPS

Under the Long Term Development Plan, the Institute conducts national coaching camps for training of the elite sportspersons on its campus and the SAI High Altitude Training Centre, Shilaroo, Himachal Pradesh.

LAKSHIMBAI NATIONAL COLLEGE OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION, THIRUVANANTHAPURAM

All the above stadium are under renovation for conduct of Commonwealth Games 2010 and no major sports activities have taken place during the year.

TEAMS DIVISION

TEAMS Division is mainly responsible for implementation of various schemes of MYAS for development of sports in the country. Mainly it provides the necessary facilities to Elite sports persons preparing the major events like Olympics, Asian Games Commonwealth Games and various other international competitions in India and abroad. It implements the plan prepared by various National Sports Federations vide their LTDPs and approved by the Committee for preparation of National Teams for National and International tournaments by providing the following:-

1. **Coaching Camps** - During the year 2008 - 09, 178 Coaching Camps in disciplines were held under the Scheme for “Financial Assistance to National Sports Federations” and 18 Coaching Camps in 15 disciplines were held under the Scheme for “Preparation of Indian Team for Commonwealth Games”.
2. **Foreign Coaches** - 27 Foreign Coaches were engaged for the training of Indian Sportspersons in 13 disciplines.
3. **Scheme Relating to Talent search & training** - 27 Sportspersons and 8 Coaches / supporting Personnel were assisted for advance training under the scheme.

(A) INTRODUCTION

Lakshmibai National University of Physical Education, Gwalior, formerly known as Lakshmibai College of Physical Education was established by the Government of India, Ministry of Education in 1957. As a tribute to her great martyrdom, this Institute was named after Rani Lakshmibai.

At the time of its inception, this Institute was affiliated to Vikram University, Ujjain. Later on in the year 1964 it got affiliated with Jiwaji University, Gwalior. Keeping in mind the unique status and promising future, this Institute was conferred the status of an Autonomous College by Jiwaji University, Gwalior, empowering the Institute to lay down its own admission policies, syllabi, examination systems and other such procedures of independent nature. However, the powers to confer degrees were vested with the Jiwaji University, Gwalior.

The 3-year Bachelor degree programme in Physical Education in India commenced from 1957 at LNIPE, Gwalior while the 2-year Master Degree Programme in the year 1963. In the year 1980, this Institute became the first National Level Institute that commenced imparting M.Phil Degree in the field of Physical Education.

In further recognition of the educational services rendered by the Institute in the field of Physical Education, Sports and Research, Ministry of Human Development, Government of India, on the recommendation of the University Grants Commission conferred upon the Institute in the year 1995, the status of “**Deemed to be University**” under the University Grant Commission Act, 1956. This Institute is the only Deemed to be University in India in the field of Physical Education.

In keeping with the over-all academic patterns and looking to the duration of professional courses in India and world-wide as well, the 3-year BPE Degree Course has since been switched over to 4-year B.P.Ed. (Integrated) Course, which has been recognized by the National Council for Teacher Education (NCTE), Western Regional Centre, Bhopal.

(C) INFRASTRUCTURAL FACILITIES

The Institute is co-educational and fully residential ever since its inception and well equipped with the infrastructural facilities which are mainly as under:

- (i) Library- The Institute has its library, which is equipped with rare collection of books for post-graduate and research scholars on various subjects. The students have various facilities including referencing, internet etc. The library has about 35,000 volumes on physical education and allied subjects. During the year of report, the Institute has commenced functioning of its Library in newly constructed building, which was inaugurated by Dr. M.S. Gill, Hon'ble Minister of State (Independent Charge) for Youth Affairs & Sports and President of the Institute on 4th October, 2008.
- (ii) Laboratories- The Institute has a good number of laboratories equipped with indigenous and imported equipments to cater the academic requirements of students in their respective curriculum. During the year of report (2008-09), the Institute has added one Computer Lab for its students.
- (iii) Play Fields- The Institute has excellent play fields and facilities for Gymnasium, Swimming, Cricket, Squash, Football, Hockey, Basketball, Tennis, Conditioning Hall, Volleyball, Kho-kho, Kabaddi, Badminton, Throw-ball, Tennis, and Table Tennis.
- (iv) Administrative / Residential Buildings- The Institute is enriched with good number of Administrative and Residential buildings meant for discharge of functions of the Institute and accommodation for its officers and employees of all categories.

(D) MAJOR ACTIVITIES

- 1) The 6th Convocation of the Institute was organized on 4th October 2008 at the Rabindranath Tagore Auditorium of the Institute. Excellency Governor of Madhya Pradesh Dr. Balraj Jhakar graced the occasion with his auspicious presence as Chief Guest and delivered Convocation Address. The Convocation was presided over by Dr. M.S. Gill, Hon'ble Minister of State (Independent Charge) for Youth Affairs & Sports and President of the Institute. The occasion was also blessed by the presence of most of the members of L.N.I.P.E. Board of Management. Maj. Gen. (Retd.) S.N. Mukherjee, Vice Chancellor of the Institute conferred the degrees to 277 graduates on this occasion.

- 2) The Institute celebrated Rajbhasha Pakhwara during the period from 15th to 27th September, 2008. During this period, various competitions were organized for all categories of staff, which evoked good response. Based on the performance, the prizes were distributed to the staff by the Vice Chancellor on the occasion of Closing Ceremony of the Pakhwara. During this period, the meeting of Departmental Hindi Implementation Committee as well as Workshop on the use of Official Language was also organized.
- 3) Department of Health Sciences and Yoga organized 3-day International Conference on Stress Management from 20th to 22nd Oct. 2008. This was inaugurated by the Vice Chancellor on 20th Oct. 2008 and in all, around 15 resource persons delivered their expert talks. Approximately 180 papers were presented in 23 difference scientific sessions.
- 4) Five faculty members of the Institute namely Prof. (Mrs.) I. Majumdar, Prof. Manika Debnath, Prof. Vivek Pandey, Dr. (Ms.) Jayashree Acharya and Dr. Pushpendra Puruswani presented papers in Pre-Olympic Conference and International Convention of Sciences at NANJING, China and Guangzhou, China under the Government's Scheme namely financial assistance under Travel Grant.
- 5) The Department of Teacher Education organized four training courses for in-service Physical Education Teachers working with Central Board of Secondary Education (2 courses from 5th to 17th May 2008 and 19th to 30th May 2008) and Kendriya Vidyalaya Sangathan (2 courses from 1st to 12th Nov. 2008 and 18th to 29th Nov. 2008). In all, 320 teachers attended these courses, who were upgraded with knowledge related to recent trends in physical education and sports through activity and theory lectures by senior faculty members of Institute.
- 6) The Department of Computer Science & Applied Statistics organized 2-day Workshop on Data Analysis on Physical Education from 16th to 17th Sept. 2008.
- 7) The Department of Youth Affairs & Sports sent Institute's teams for participation at various levels in the games and events recognized by Association of Indian Universities for participation by the Member Universities. The Institute organized West Zone Inter University Hockey (Men) Tournament from 24th to 28th Oct. 2008, which was participated by 33 universities from the States of Madhya Pradesh, Gujarat, Maharashtra and Rajasthan represented by 594 students. The team of LNIPE, Gwalior remained at First place and qualified for Inter Zonal Tournament. Gymnastic (Women) Team of Institute secured 3rd place at All India level and a

student of the Institute also secured 3rd place in Diving at All India Swimming Championship.

- 8) TOPS Training program was conducted by three organizations jointly i.e. Youth Sports Trust, LNIPE, Gwalior and British Council from 3rd to 6th November, 2008. A team of 5 experts in the field of Physical Education came from UK to deliver TOPS Training to the students namely Mr. Paul Tebay, Mr. Alan Bell, Mr. Martin Thomson, Ms. Jayne Molyneux, and Mrs. Lesley Minervini. This was inaugurated by Vice Chancellor of Institute on 3rd November, 2008 and participated by 68 students of BPEd III year, 78 students of BPEd IV year and 29 students of MPEd Final year in all. Apart from this, 15 staff members also attended the program.
- 9) Coaching Camps of India U-13, 17 and 19 National Women Football Teams were conducted at the Institute during the year 2008.
- 10) Summer Coaching Camps in various sport and games were also organized by the Institute for the children of Gwalior city, which evoked good response and a total of 928 children participated.

BROADBASING OF SPORTS AND CREATION OF SPORTS INFRASTRUCTURE AT GRASSROOTS

Chapter-18



PANCHAYAT YUVA KRIDA AUR KHEL ABHIYAN (PYKKA)

The Ministry was implementing four Centrally Sponsored Sports Infrastructure Development Schemes during the Xth Five Year Plan period, which were transferred to the State Sector w.e.f. 1.4.2005 viz., the Scheme of Grants for the Creation of Sports Infrastructure, the Scheme of Grants to Rural Schools for the purchase of sports equipment and the development of play grounds; the Scheme of Grants for the promotion of Games & Sports in Universities and Colleges; and the Scheme of Grants for the Installation of Synthetic Playing Surface. Under these erstwhile centrally sponsored schemes, financial assistance was being provided to State Governments, educational institutions and NGOs for the creation of sports facilities on a cost sharing basis.

With the closure of these schemes, there has been no provision for providing financial assistance to State Governments, Educational Institutions and NGOs for the creation of sports infrastructure. There is a severe inadequacy of basic sports infrastructure at the grassroots level, especially in rural areas. Similarly, there is also a lack of sports competitions in the rural areas. Given the fact that, less than 5% of the population has access to sporting facilities and organized sports, the need for promoting sports infrastructure at the grassroots level in a phased but time bound manner has been repeatedly emphasized in various fora.

Keeping these factors in view and with the objective of promoting mass participation in sports and widening the seedbed of talent, the Government has launched a national programme titled 'Panchayat Yuva Krida aur Khel Abhiyan' (PYKKA) for the first time for the creation of basic sports infrastructure in all village and block panchayats of the country over a period of 10 years and organizing sports competitions at block, district, state and national levels. All the 2,50,000 village and block panchayats and equivalent units will be covered during this period. The scheme will not only contribute to public health and social inclusiveness, but also stimulate the economic activities within the sports sector, as it would lead to an exponential growth in the demand for sports instructors, coaches, sports equipment and consumables and sports events and related support services. Promotion of indigenous games and the expansion of the talent pool through the identification and nurturing of rural sports talent, are some of the major benefits of the scheme.

Components

Under the Scheme, financial assistance is given to a village/block panchayats for the following purposes:-

- (i) **One Time Capital Seed Grant** for development of sports infrastructure viz. development of playfield, athletic track, fencing of playfield, goal posts, poles for net games, outdoor fitness equipments etc at Rs. 1 lakh for village panchayats and Rs 5 lakh for block panchayats. This will be contributed on 75:25 basis between the Central Government and State Governments for normal States and on 90:10 basis for Special Category States.
- (ii) **Annual Acquisition Grant** at Rs 10, 000 per annum to each village panchayat and Rs. 20,000 per annum to each block panchayat for a period of five years for

acquisition of sports equipments, accessories, sports fixtures, consumables and repairs/maintenance. This grant is 100% central grant.

- (iii) **Annual Operational Grant** at Rs. 12,000 per annum to each village panchayat and Rs. 24, 000 per annum to each block panchayat for a period of five years to meet operational expenses of non-competition activities including honorarium to Kridashree and maintenance of infrastructure etc. This grant is 100% central grant.
- (iv) **Annual Competition Grant** for organizing tournaments at block level, district level, state level and national level as per details given below:
 - (i) Rs. 50, 000 per annum to each block panchayat for organizing block level competitions.
 - (ii) Rs. 3 lakh per annum to each district for holding district level competitions.
 - (iii) Rs. 10 lakh per annum to each State and Rs. 5 lakh to each UT per annum for holding State/UT level competitions.
 - (iv) Rs. 50 lakh per annum for holding national level competitions.

Annual competition grant is a 100% central grant.

- (v) **Prize Money** at Rs. 25,000 Rs. 15,000 and Rs. 5,000 as 100% Central grant to first three village panchayats at the block level tournaments (all 6,373 blocks) and at Rs. 50,000, Rs. 30,0000 and Rs. 10,000 as 100% Central grant to the first three block panchayats at the district level tournament (all 607 districts).

North East Sports Festival (North East Games) will continue to be organized, as before, by the SAI (NIS Patiala) and the funds for the same will be provided as per existing norms from the PYKKA scheme.

With a view to formulating the operational guidelines for implementation of the scheme, the Ministry organized a two day National Seminar on PYKKA in Vigyan Bhawan, New Delhi on 21-22 May 2008. Sports Secretaries from various States and UTs, other officials from all over India, eminent sportspersons, Sports Authority of India, Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan and others connected with sports, participated in the conference to deliberate upon and identify the best practices in respect of rural sports programme in States/UTs and use them as a base for determining the operational guidelines. All States expressed full commitment to the implementation of the Scheme.

PYKKA also received full endorsement from the State Sports Ministers during the National Conference of State Ministers of Youth Affairs & Sports held in Vigyan Bhawan on 9th July 2008.

The General Council of PYKKA, in its meeting held on 29.8.2008 under the chairmanship of the MOS (YS&S)/Independent Charge, approved the operational guidelines for implementation of PYKKA, which have been circulated to all States/UTs.

The Mission Directorate of PYKKA has received proposals from 24 States during 2008-09. The National Level Executive Committee, in its four meetings held on 29.9.2008, 5.11.2008, 12.12.2008 and 22.1.2009, has approved, in principle, the proposals for one-time capital grant, annual acquisition grant and annual operation grant worth Rs. 250.78 crore covering 22854 village panchayats and 601 block panchayats in 19 States. An amount of Rs. 83.85 crore has already been released to the States towards first instalment. An amount of Rs. 8.15 crore has also been released to NIS, Patiala towards competition grant for sanctioning/reimbursement of expenses to States for holding competitions at block, district and state levels. Entire allocation of Rs. 92 crore provided for PYKKA during 2008-09 at RE stage has been allocated to the States.

1. SCHEME OF ASSISTANCE TO NATIONAL SPORTS FEDERATIONS:

Under this scheme, the Government of India provides assistance to National Sports Federations (NSFs) for conducting National Championships and International Tournaments in India, participation in International tournaments abroad, organizing coaching camps, procuring sports equipment, engagement of foreign coaches and disbursement of salaries of the paid Joint/Assistant Secretaries engaged by NSFs.

During the year 2008-09, Government has already incurred an expenditure of Rs. 41.50 crore under Plan and Rs 3.00 Crore under Non-Plan on account of proposals received from NSFs for foreign exposure and for holding International Tournaments/National Championships. The expenditure also includes funds released for Coaching camps, providing equipment, engaging foreign coaches and salaries of Joint/Assistant Secretaries of the NSFs.

Apart from this, many proposals have also been approved at No Cost to the Government for foreign exposure and for holding International Tournaments in India.

The details of financial assistance released during the last 4 years i.e., 2005-06, 2006-07, 2007-08 and 2008-09 to various recognized NSFs is given at Annexure-XI.

The details of foreign Coaches engaged during the year 2008-09 on long term/short term basis have been given in the statement at Annex-XII.

2. SCHEME RELATING TO TALENT SEARCH & TRAINING:

Under this scheme, assistance is provided to promising sportspersons for training and training-cum-competitions in India and abroad, for purchase of equipment and for scientific support. Supporting personnel such as coaches, sports scientists, doctors masseurs etc. are also assisted for undergoing specialized training and for attending seminars/conferences and major international sports events and for appearing in qualifying examinations. This scheme is implemented through Sports Authority of India (SAI).

During 2008-09, assistance of Rs. 1.50 crore has been released to 31 sportspersons and 29 supporting personnel including coaches, sports scientists/experts and Referee/judges as per list enclosed at **Annexure-XIII**.

3. NATIONAL SPORTS DEVELOPMENT FUND

National Sports Development Fund was instituted by the Central Government in 1998 with a view to mobilizing resources from the Government as well as non-governmental sources, including the private/corporate sector and non-resident Indians, for promotion of sports and games in the country. In order to make contributions to the Fund attractive, 100% exemption from income tax is available on all contributions. To begin with, the Government made a contribution of Rs. 2.00 crore during the year 1998-99. Further Government contribution is on matching basis to the contributions received from other sources. At present, the corpus of the Fund is Rs. 26.62 crore as on 30.11.2008.

President, BCCI, in February 2008, pledged a contribution of Rs. 50 crore to NSDF for promotion and development of sports. Out of Rs. 50 crore pledged, BCCI has already contributed Rs. 15 crore in March 2008.

For the purpose of administration of the funds donated by BCCI, a separate BCCI - NSDF Implementation Committee (BNIC) has been constituted under the Chairpersonship of the Chairman, NSDF Executive Committee with 4 nominated Members each from the BCCI and the NSDF Executive Council and one representative each of the identified National Sports Federations. Joint Secretary (sports) will function as Member-Secretary of the BNIC. The BNIC will also have the option to co-opt experts.

Assistance to sportspersons who qualified for Beijing Olympics

The sportspersons, who qualified for participation in Beijing Olympics, were provided assistance either directly or through their respective National Sports Federations for their specialized training within the country and abroad, exposure in international competitions, scientific support, equipments, accessories, out of pocket allowance, nutritional supplements etc.

The office bearers of the NSFs of all 13 sports disciplines, whose sportspersons qualified for Beijing Olympics, were called for meetings alongwith Government Observers to

discuss the specific requirements and needs of the players for their preparation to Beijing Olympics. The kind of assistance, which was not available under the other Schemes of the Ministry, was provided to the Beijing qualifiers from NSDF.

The details of beneficiaries assisted from National Sports Development Fund till date is given in **Annex-XIV**.

Details of Contributions received for the Fund, since its inception, are at **Annex-XV**.

The Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports implements various schemes for giving incentives to sports persons to take up sports:

1. RAJIV GANDHI KHEL RATNA AWARD

The scheme was launched in the year 1991-92 to honour outstanding sportspersons. Under this scheme, an amount of Rs.5 lakhs is given as award for the most spectacular and outstanding performance by a sportsperson in the preceding year.

Shri Mahendra Singh Dhoni, Cricketer was conferred with Rajiv Gandhi Khel Ratna Award for the year 2007 for his outstanding performance. 19 sportspersons have been given this award since the inception of the scheme.

2. ARJUNA AWARDS

The Arjuna Awards were instituted in 1961. To be eligible for the Award, a sportsperson should have had not only good performance consistently for the previous three years at the international level with excellence for the year for which Award is recommended, but also shown qualities of leadership, sportsmanship and a sense of discipline. The awardees are given a statuette, a scroll of honour, ceremonial dress and a cash award of Rs.3.00 lakhs.

Following sportspersons were conferred Arjuna Awards for the Year 2007 by Her Excellency the President of India on National Sports Day i.e., 29th August 2008.

3. DHYAN CHAND AWARD FOR LIFE TIME ACHIEVEMENTS IN SPORTS AND GAMES

Dhyanchand Award for Lifetime Achievements in Sports and Games was instituted in the year 2002. This award is given to honour those sportspersons who have contributed to sports by their performance and continue to contribute to the promotion of sports even after their retirement from active sporting career. The award carries a cash of Rs.3,00,000/- a plaque and a scroll of honour. Three awards are given every year.

Shri Hakam Singh, Athletics; Shri Mukhbain Singh, Hockey and Shri Gian Singh, Wrestling were conferred with Dhyan Chand Award for the year 2008.

23 sportspersons have been given this award since the inception of the Award.

4. DRONACHARYA AWARDS

The Dronacharya Award, instituted in 1985, honours eminent Coaches who have successfully trained sportspersons or teams and enabled them to achieve outstanding results in international competitions. The awardee is given a statuette of Guru Dronachrya, a scroll of honour, ceremonial dress and a cash prize of Rs.3. 00 lakhs. The awards for the year 2007 were conferred to the following three coaches:-

51 Coaches have been given this award since its institution.

5. MAULANA ABUL KALAM AZAD (MAKA) TROPHY

The Maulana Abul Kalam Azad (MAKA) Trophy was instituted in 1956-57. The top overall performing university in the Inter-University Tournaments is given the Maulana Abul Kalam Azad (MAKA) Trophy, which is a rolling trophy. A small replica of the MAKA Trophy is also awarded for retention by the University.

Prize Money for Maulana Abul Kalam Trophy (MAKA) Rolling Trophy has been enhanced substantially this year to Rs. 10 lakh, Rs. 5 lakh and Rs. 3 lakh from existing Rs. 2 lakh, Rs. 1 lakh and Rs. 50,000 respectively for the first, second and third overall winner universities.

Punjabi University, Patiala, was awarded the MAKA Trophy for the year 2006-07.

6. SPECIAL AWARDS TO WINNERS IN INTERNATIONAL SPORTS EVENTS AND THEIR COACHES

This scheme was introduced in the year 1986 to encourage and motivate outstanding sportspersons for higher achievements and to attract the younger generation to take sports as a career. Under the scheme, special awards are given to sportspersons and their coaches for winning medals in recognized international sports events held in a year. Amount of cash award for medal winners in Olympic Games was increased this year from Rs. 30 lakh to Rs. 50 lakh for gold medallists, from Rs. 18 lakh to Rs. 30 lakh for silver medallists and from Rs. 12 lakh to Rs. 20 lakh for bronze medalists. The amounts of cash awards given for winning medals in various international events are given in the following table:

The three medal winners at Beijing Olympics, Sh Abhinav Bindra, Sh Vijender Singh and Sh Sushil Kumar have already been given the cash award of Rs 50 Lakhs and Rs 20 Lakhs respectively.

Cash award is also given to coaches. The coaches who have trained the medal winners for at least 240 days immediately preceding the game are eligible for cash award under the scheme. Award money to a coach is 50% of the award money given to the sportsperson whom he had coached. In case, there is more than one coach associated with a coach the award money is distributed between/among them equally.

An amount of Rs. 8.75 crore was released during the financial year 2008-09 towards special cash awards to sportspersons and coaches for winning medals in various international sports events. A list of sportspersons/coaches given cash awards during the year 2008-09 is at Annexure-XVI

7. SCHEME OF SPORTS FUND FOR PENSION TO MERITORIOUS SPORTS- PERSONS

This scheme was launched in the year 1994. Under this scheme, those sportspersons who are Indian citizens and have won gold, silver and bronze medals in Olympic Games, World Cup/World Championships, Asian Games, Commonwealth Games and Paralympic games and have attained the age of 30 years and have retired from active sports career are eligible for life pension under this Scheme.

Amount of pension to meritorious sportspersons has been doubled with effect from 1.7.2008, as per details given below:

At present, 476 sportspersons are receiving pension under this scheme.

8. NATIONAL WELFARE FUND FOR SPORTS PERSONS

The National Welfare Fund for sports persons was set up in March, 1982 with a view to assisting outstanding sportspersons of yesteryears, living in indigent circumstances who had brought glory for the country in sports. Under the scheme, financial assistance is provided in the form of pension and lump-sum grant to the sportspersons as well as their families for medical treatment etc. The fund is managed & operated by a Committee with the Minister for Youth Affairs and Sports as the Chairperson. At present, 30 sportspersons are receiving pensions under the scheme.

Financial assistance under the Scheme was enhanced substantially w.e.f 1.7.2008, which was last revised in 1998, as per details given below:

- ❖ Eligibility Ceiling for outstanding sportspersons in indigent circumstances revised from Rs. 36,000 per annum to Rs. 2 lakh per annum.
- ❖ Assistance for fatal injury to a sportsperson raised from Rs. 1 lakh to 5 lakh.
- ❖ Assistance for sustaining injury other than a fatal injury enhanced from Rs. 40,000 to Rs. 2 lakh.
- ❖ Pension for permanently incapacitated outstanding sportsperson increased from Rs. 2500 per month to Rs. 10,000 per month.
- ❖ Pension in other cases enhanced from Rs. 2,000 per month to Rs. 8,000 per month.

- ❖ Assistance to families of indigent sportspersons increased from Rs. 40,000 to Rs. 2 lakh.
- ❖ Assistance for medical treatment increased from Rs. 40,000 to Rs. 2 lakh.
- ❖ Assistance to eminent coaches, referees and umpires enhanced from Rs.20,000 to Rs. 50,000.

(I) The promotion of sports and games in schools, colleges and universities:

The Scheme of Promotion of Sports and Games in Schools and Colleges and the Scheme of Sports Scholarships are being merged into a single new scheme proposed to be introduced from 2009-10. Draft EFC Memorandum of the new Scheme has been prepared and circulated for comments before it is submitted to the Departmental Expenditure Finance Committee for approval. The Scheme is expected to be approved in the next 1-2 months. The Scheme aims at giving a critical thrust to broad-basing of sports and games in schools, colleges and universities; and encouraging excellence in sports in educational institutions with a view to encouraging mass participation in sports as well as increasing the base of talented sportspersons. The thrust of the new scheme will be on funding the establishment of community coaching centres with selected educational institutions as the hub of local sporting activities; assisting the selected institutions in the purchase of consumable and non-consumable sports equipment; awarding scholarships to gifted and talented young athletes attending the coaching centres; and awarding special scholarship to women sportspersons who are national champions and those who wish to pursue higher education, or training in physical education, or any sports related field.

(II) The promotion of sports among person with disabilities:

A new scheme is being introduced from 2009-10 to provide focused support to the physically and intellectually challenged. The scheme will cover special coaching and training requirements of the target groups, organizing competitions at district level, state and national level, participation in international competitions, and other need-based specialized support. At present, the NSFs dealing with sports for disabled are being assisted under the general NSF Scheme.

(III) National Championships for Women (Non-Plan)

The scheme started in 1975, aims at promoting sports amongst women. Under the scheme, national level competitions are preceded by holding of lower level competitions (Block, District & State level) for which States/ UTs are provided financial assistance as per norms. Under this scheme, assistance is being provided to hold annual National Championships for Women in various sports disciplines.

Under this Scheme, financial assistance is extended to the National Anti-Doping Agency (NADA) and National Dope Testing Laboratory (NDTL) to carry out their respective activities.

NADA is the national organization responsible for promoting, coordinating, and monitoring the doping control programme in sports in all its forms in the country. The Anti Doping rules of NADA which are compliant with the Anti Doping Code of World Anti Doping Agency (WADA) have been finalized after wide consultation with the Indian Olympic Association and National Sports Federations and have now come into effect from 1st January, 2009. The various Committees as required under these Rules i.e. the Anti Doping Disciplinary Panel, the Anti Doping Appeal Panel and the therapeutic Use Exemption committee have been constituted. The other staff of NADA is in the process of being engaged.

The NADA has taken up in a major way the sample collection process of athletes and wide dissemination of information as well as education of athletes and coaches about the ill effects of doping and nature of banned substances.

The NDTL is responsible for testing dope samples and for conducting advance research on the subject by maintaining close association with the WADA and WADA accredited laboratories. As a member of WADA, the payment of annual contribution is also made. India has ratified the UNESCO convention against doping in sport.

NDTL achieved WADA accreditation on Sept. 21, 2008 after being in the probationary phase since October, 2006. The NDTL has now become 35th Laboratory in the world and 6th in the Asian Region, accredited by WADA for dope testing. The NDTL has been registered as Society under Societies Registration Act, 1860 on 8th October, 2008. The Ministry has constituted the General Body and the Governing Body of NDTL. The first meeting of General Body & Governing Body of NDTL was held on 5th Jan. 2009.

Drug Testing - A total no. 2100 samples of various sportspersons were tested in NDTL during the above mentioned period.

- i) **Routine samples** - 1600 urine samples of competition and out of competitions were tested in NDTL. After getting WADA Accreditation in Sept.2008, NDTL tested 128 samples of CYG in Oct. 2008 and submitted report within 24 hours of receiving the samples and is also receiving samples from various international competitions held in India & Abroad.
- ii) **Proficiency Testing:-** A total of 50 urine samples were tested received from various agencies viz. World Association of Anti-Doping Scientists (WAADS), College of American Pathologists (CAP) & World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA).
- iii) **Research :-** A total of 450 samples tested for various research projects being carried out in NDTL.

The Commonwealth Games, to be held in Delhi between October 3-14, 2010, is a mega sporting event, in which about 71 countries participate, in 17 sporting disciplines. It is held after every four years. India which is one of the most important participating countries in the Games, has never hosted the Commonwealth Games so far. This is only the second time, that the Commonwealth Games will be held in Asia, after Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, where they were held in 1998. These Games will be held in the 17 disciplines of 1) Archery, 2) Athletics, 3) Aquatics, 4) Badminton, 5) Boxing, 6) Cycling, 7) Gymnastics, 8) Hockey, 9) Lawn Bowls, 10) Net Ball, 11) Rugby 7s, 12) Shooting, 13) Squash, 14) Table Tennis, 15) Tennis, 16) Weightlifting and 17) Wrestling. In addition to these sports disciplines, competitions will also be held for Elite Athletes with Disability (EAD) in four disciplines viz. (i) Athletics, (ii) Power lifting (iii) Table Tennis and (iv) Swimming. The medals under this category are also included in the overall medals tally of a participating country.

- 2) The Commonwealth Youth Games (CYG) which are a sub-event of the Commonwealth Games were held in Pune from 12th to 18th October, 2008. These Games were held in 9 disciplines viz. 1) Athletics, 2) Badminton, 3) Boxing, 4) Shooting, 5) Swimming, 6) Table Tennis, 7) Tennis, 8) Weightlifting and 9) Wrestling. A total of 1315 sportspersons from 71 countries participated in these Games. India emerged on the top in the medals' tally.
3. The preparation for the Commonwealth Games can be broadly considered in the following categories :- (i) Upgradation/creation of Sports Infrastructure - Competition and Training venues (ii) Development/Creation of Non-Competition venues - Games Village, International Broadcasting Centre and Main Press Centre (iii) Upgradation of City Infrastructure (iv) Conduct of the Games (v) Host Broadcasting (vi) Augmentation of Hotel Accommodation (vii) Medical and Health Facilities (viii) Transportation Plan (ix) Security Arrangements and (x) Preparation of Indian Team for Commonwealth Games.
4. After obtaining the necessary regulatory clearances, the work on the Competition venues and most of the Training venues has commenced and is continuing apace.

Time Lines, against monitorable parameters are being monitored, on a web-based monitoring system developed by the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports. As a result of the efforts put in by all the concerned agencies, various sports facilities would be completed well in time for the Games.

5. In order to prepare Indian Sportspersons for the forthcoming Commonwealth Games, 2010, a Scheme titled 'Preparation of Indian Team for Commonwealth Games, 2010 is already under implementation. The scheme aims to impart state of the art training to 1286 sportspersons (medal probables) and 210 Coaches, both in India and abroad with adequate sports sciences back up, with the objective of maximizing Indian medals' tally in the Commonwealth Games, 2010.
6. The Games Village is being developed by Delhi Development Authority (DDA). The entire Residential Zone is being developed in the form of residential apartments on PPP model. The facilities in the International Zone will be provided mainly in the form of temporary overlays. The work is proceeding as per the schedule. There is no 'Stay' from the Court on the construction work.
7. The work, related to upgradation of City infrastructure, Development of International Broadcasting Centre, Main Press Centre, Medical and Health Facilities, Transport and Communication arrangements, Security arrangements and conduct of the Games, is also proceeding satisfactorily.
8. The Cabinet was also apprised of the status of the preparedness for hosting Commonwealth Games in Delhi, in its meeting, held on 04.12.2008. The Cabinet reviewed the progress of work and directed all concerned agencies to ensure that there is no slip up in schedule and that expeditious steps are taken to remove any problems that may arise from time to time.

INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE OF SPORTS AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION TEAMS/EXPERTS

Chapter-24

International cooperation in the field of Sports and Physical Education has been given importance for providing the much-needed opportunities to the Indian teams/experts for foreign exposure and for coaching/training abroad and for obtaining the services of coaches/experts from abroad.

A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was signed between the Government of Republic of India and the Government of the Federative Republic of Brazil on Cooperation in Sports and Youth Affairs.

An MOU on Sports Cooperation was signed between the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Government of India and the National Institute of Sports of Chile (CHILDEPORTES) on April 21 2008 at Santiago (Chile).

An MOU on Youth and Sport Cooperation was signed between the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Government of India and the State Ministry of Youth and Sport Affairs of the Republic of Indonesia at Jakarta (Indonesia) on 1st December 2008.

Under International Exchange Programme, a Chess Tournament between national Under-20 teams of Armenia and India was organized during November 29-December-3, 2008 at New Delhi.

A four member Expert delegation from Cuba visited India and carried out a diagnostic study in the field of sports in India during March-April 2008.

NATIONAL SPREAD OF RURAL SPORTS

- ❖ With the objective of promoting mass participation in sports and widening the seedbed of talent, a national programme titled 'Panchayat Yuva Krida aur Khel Abhiyan' (PYKKA) has been launched for the first time for the creation of basic sports infrastructure in all village and block panchayats of the country during 11th and 12th Five Year Plans and organizing sports competitions at block, district, state and national levels. A provision of Rs. 1500 crore has been made for implementation of PYKKA during 11th Five Year Plan.

COMMONWEALTH GAMES 2010

- ❖ The preparations for successful conduct of the Commonwealth Games 2010 at New Delhi are in full swing. The Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports in consultation with the Ministry of Urban Development, Government of NCT of Delhi and Delhi Development Authority is monitoring the progress of all activities associated with conduct of the Games to ensure their timely completion well before the commencement of the Games.
- ❖ The work on upgradation/creation of the sports infrastructure, construction of Games Village and upgradation of city infrastructure and civic amenities is progressing as per schedule.
- ❖ The Government has approved a scheme titled "Scheme for Preparation of Indian Teams for Commonwealth games, 2010", costing Rs. 678 crore specifically designed to prepare Indian sportspersons for maximizing the medals tally in the CWG, 2010. Under this Scheme, comprehensive and intensive training and exposure both in India and abroad will be provided to identified elite sports persons (medal probables) of 18 sports disciplines with full scientific and medical facilities. The coaching/training camps for the selected athletes have commenced at various centres of Sports Authority of India.

ENHANCED WELFARE ASSISTANCE TO THE SPORTSPERSONS EFFECTIVE FROM JULY 2008

- ❖ Income ceiling raised from Rs. 36,000 per annum to Rs. 2 lakh per annum.
- ❖ Monthly pension amount quadrupled.
- ❖ Ex-gratia payments for fatal injury, medical treatment and other assistance enhanced by 5 times.
- ❖ Minimum pension period enhanced to 5 years.

ENHANCED FINANCIAL SECURITY TO SPORTSPERSONS EFFECTIVE FROM JULY 2008

- ❖ Amount of pension to meritorious sportspersons, who have won Gold, Silver or Bronze medals in Olympic Games, World Cup/World Championships, Asian Games, Commonwealth Games and Para-Olympic Games and who are above 30 years of age and have retired from active sports career, doubled from 1.7.2008.

ENHANCED CASH INCENTIVES

- ❖ Amount of cash award for medal winners in Olympic Games increased from Rs. 30 lakh to Rs. 50 lakh for gold medallists, from Rs. 18 lakh to Rs. 30 lakh for silver medallists and from Rs. 12 lakh to Rs. 20 lakh for bronze medallists.

UPGRADATION OF POPULAR AND AFFORDABLE SPORTS

- ❖ The categorization of sports and games disciplines, which are affordable and involve mass participation, such as Hockey, Football, Volleyball, Basketball, Swimming, Cycling has been upgraded to 'priority' status entitling them for increased financial assistance for coaching, training, participation in international competitions, national championships and procurement of sports equipment.

INITIATIVES FOR PROMOTION OF SPORTS AND GAMES IN SCHOOLS, COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

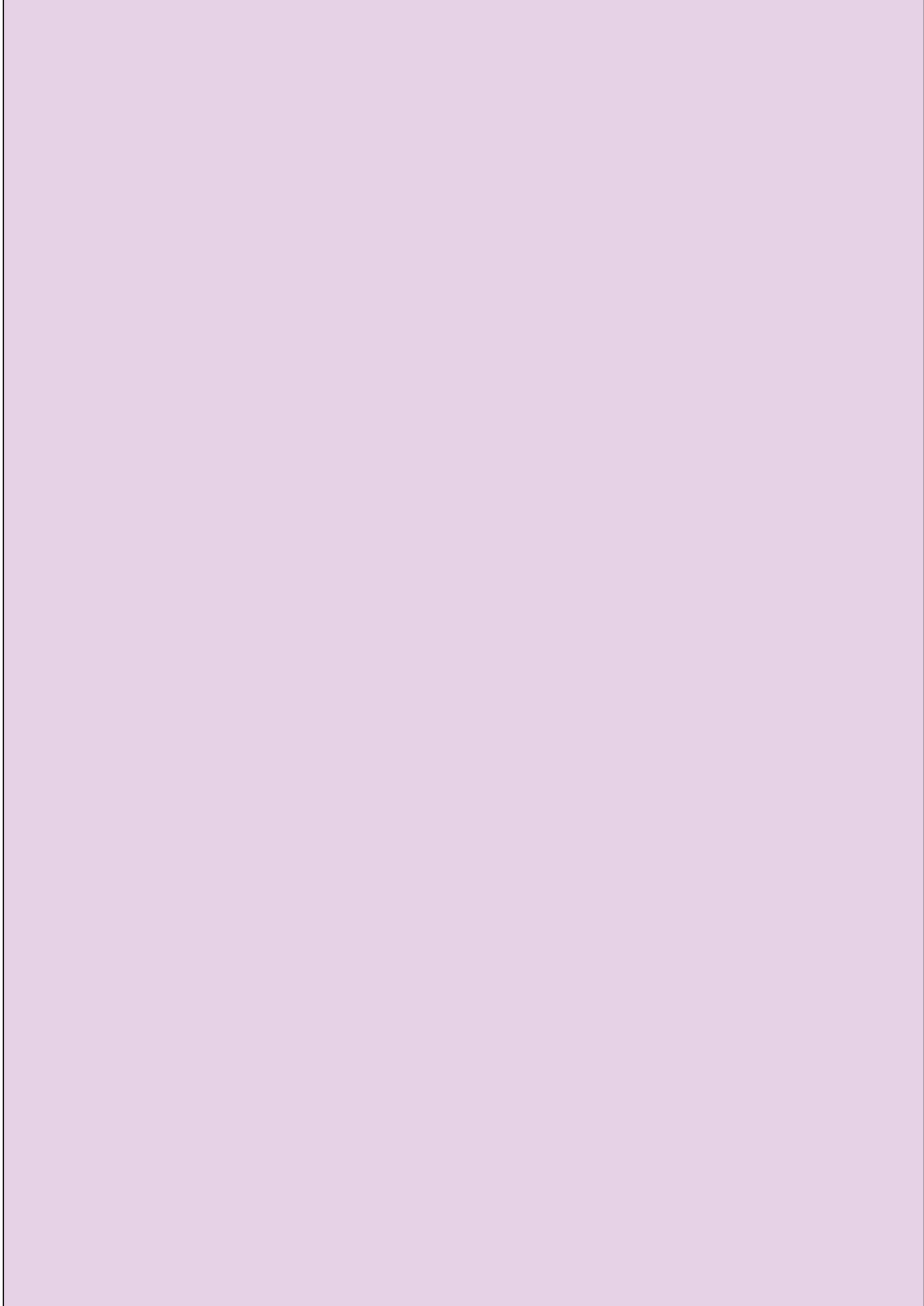
- ❖ Categorization of School Games and University Games upgraded to 'Priority' status.

- ❖ Prize Money for Maulana Abul Kalam Trophy (MAKA) Rolling Trophy increased five times to Rs. 10 lakh, Rs. 5 lakh and Rs. 3 lakh from existing Rs. 2 lakh, Rs. 1 lakh and Rs. 50,000 respectively for the first, second and third overall winner universities.
- ❖ Association of Indian Universities (AIU) recognized as National Sports Promotion Organization (NSPO) making it eligible for all facilities which are available to a recognized NSF.
- ❖ Revised Scheme for promotion of sports and games in schools, colleges and universities to be introduced shortly.

ANTI DOPING MEASURES

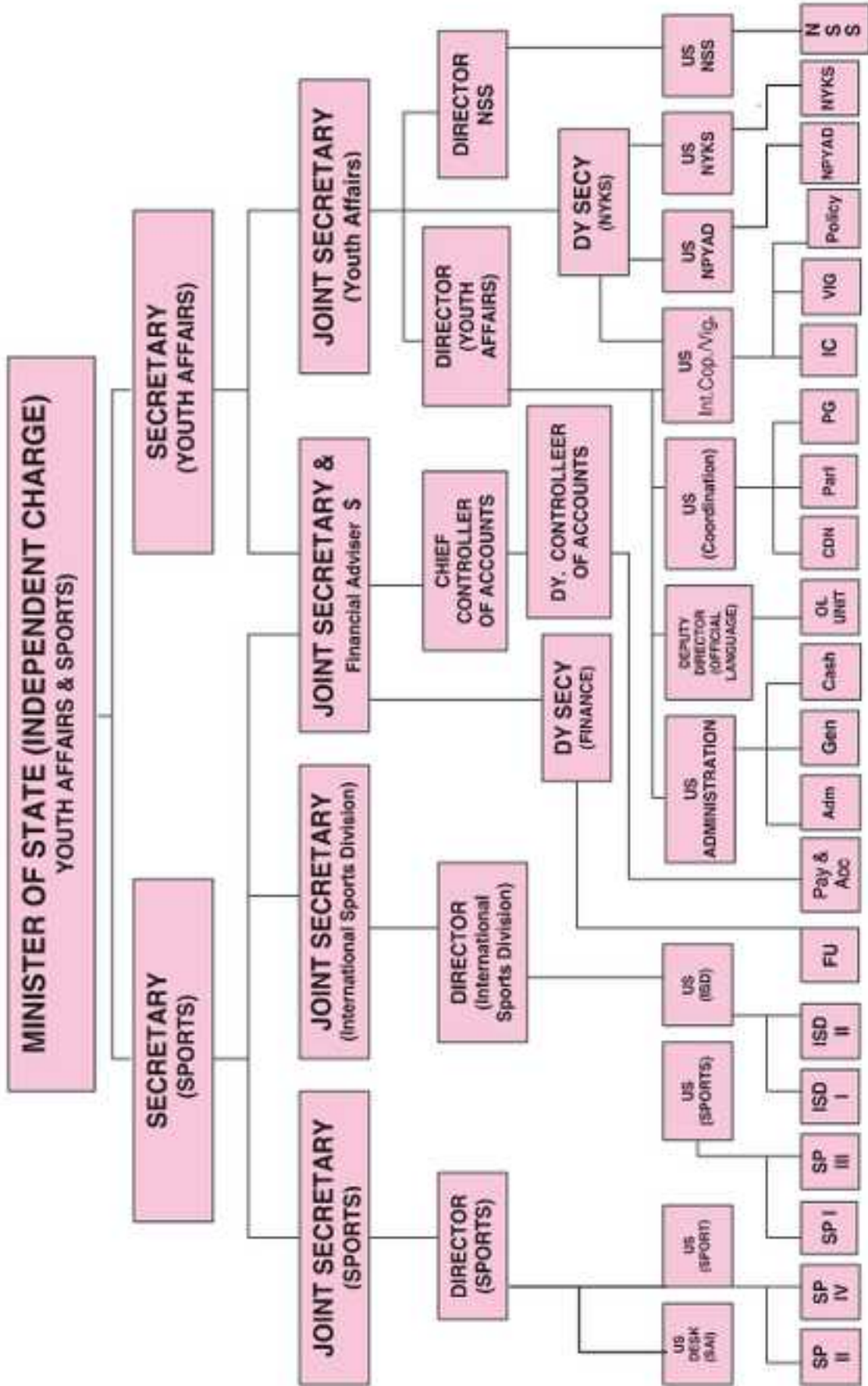
- ❖ The Government of India, Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports has established the National Anti Doping Agency (NADA), an autonomous body with the mandate to take all measures to rid sports of the menace of doping and is responsible for organizing awareness campaigns against doping in sports, test planning and result management, education and research. NADA Code has been approved which has come into force w.e.f 1.1.2009.
- ❖ National Dope Testing Laboratory (NDTL) is an autonomous body, established for testing dope samples. NDTL got accreditation from World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) in September 2008.
