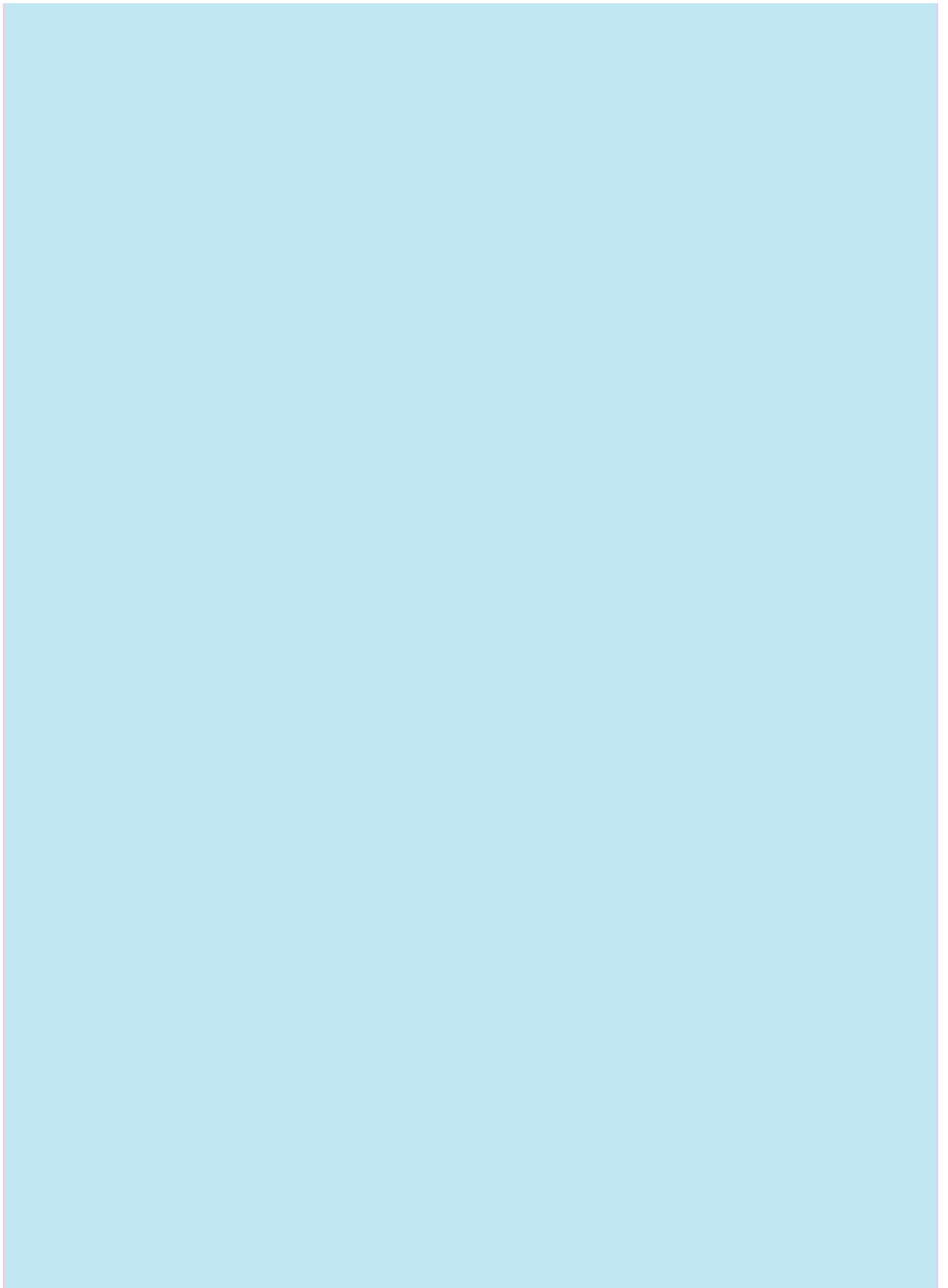

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the 1990s, the number of people who have been infected with HIV has increased in almost every country in the world. In 1990, there were 1.5 million people living with HIV, but by 2000, this number had risen to 36 million (UNAIDS 2001).

There are a number of reasons why the spread of HIV has increased so rapidly. One of the main reasons is the increase in the number of people who are having sex with multiple partners. This is particularly true in sub-Saharan Africa, where the average number of partners a person has in their lifetime is estimated to be around 10 (UNAIDS 2001).

Another reason for the increase in HIV is the widespread use of unsterilized needles and syringes. This is particularly common in injecting drug users, who are at a high risk of contracting HIV. In some countries, up to 50% of injecting drug users are HIV positive (UNAIDS 2001).

There are also a number of other factors that have contributed to the spread of HIV, such as the use of contaminated blood products and the practice of traditional genital mutilation. In some parts of the world, traditional genital mutilation is still practiced, and this can increase the risk of HIV infection (UNAIDS 2001).

Despite the fact that HIV has spread so rapidly, there are a number of things that can be done to reduce the risk of infection. One of the most important things is to use condoms correctly and consistently. This can reduce the risk of HIV infection by up to 80% (UNAIDS 2001).

Another important thing is to get tested for HIV regularly. This can help to identify people who are infected with HIV, so that they can start treatment and reduce the risk of complications. In some countries, there are also programs that provide free HIV testing and counseling (UNAIDS 2001).

There are also a number of other things that can be done to reduce the risk of HIV, such as avoiding sharing needles and syringes, and using sterile blood products. In some countries, there are also programs that provide sterile needles and syringes to injecting drug users (UNAIDS 2001).

## OVERVIEW

India is on the threshold of an unique demographic dividend with young persons within the age group of 13-35 years comprising more than 40% of the total population of India. This cohort which is the most vibrant and dynamic segment of the country's population constitutes potentially its most valuable human resource. This "Youth Bulge" in the light of its impact on work participation and dependency ratios has been called a window of opportunity in terms of growth and development of our country, an opportunity which would need to be seized before the window closes. This poses its own challenges with reference to inclusive growth and the need to bridge divides. The requirements for this will transcend sectoral programmes, and would require a variety of interventions and programmes aimed at addressing the youth in a multi-dimensional manner.

Various sectoral initiatives, in spite of their primacy in terms of the overall socio-economic policy, will not be enough and sizeable investment will also have to be made on youth, per se, through measures and schemes that the sectoral initiatives, cannot by themselves, take care of. The Ministry of Youth Affairs has been designated as the nodal Ministry for development and empowerment of youth and adolescents in the country. To achieve the goals of empowering and enabling the youth to become effective and productive participants, a de novo look at the existing policies, instruments and institutions, initiation of innovative policies, efficient, effective and creative ways to rejuvenate institutions have been taken up. Synergy and convergence of efforts with other Ministries/Departments have also been initiated.

"Sports" as an identifiable subject needs to be shown as an integral element of youth development. With a view to ensuring sport development as an integral aspect of youth development and youth development as critical to accelerated national development, the National Sports Policy 2001 lays special emphasis on "Broad-basing of Sports" at the national and international levels. The Twenty Point Programme also speaks of "Yuva Vikas" or Youth Development by providing universal access to sports in rural and urban areas. The nation-wide rural sports infrastructure scheme christened the Panchayat Yuva Krida Aur Khel Abhiyan (PYKKA) aims at achieving the above mentioned objectives by providing basic sports infrastructure and equipment at the panchayat level and encouraging sports and games in rural areas through annual competitions at the block and district levels. PYKKA will help States in promoting sports at the grassroots level, which they have not been able to achieve on their own so far due to severe resource constraints. It will also deepen and widen the seedbed of sporting talent, leading to better performances by our sportspersons in national and international events.

As part of rationalization of schemes, their number will be reduced by bringing all schemes under five major schemes, one each for infrastructure development (other than PYKKA), strengthening of NSFs; support to individual sportspersons; incentives to medal winners; and sportspersons welfare. Both broadbasing and promotion of excellence in sports is proposed to be achieved through a holistic and multi-pronged approach.

# ORGANIZATION

## SECRETARIAT

The Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports is functioning under the overall guidance of a Minister, Youth Affairs & Sports, Dr. M.S. Gill and a Minister of State for Youth Affairs & Sports, Shri Pratik Prakashbapu Patil. In April, 2008, the Ministry was bifurcated into the Department of Youth Affairs and the Department of Sports, each under the charge of a Secretary to the Government of India.

There are three Joint Secretaries in the Ministry. Joint Secretary (Youth Affairs and Administration) looks after matters concerning Youth development, Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS), National Service Scheme and the work relating to General Administration. Joint Secretary (Sports) looks after the work relating to Sports Authority of India (SAI), Lakshmi Bai National University of Physical Education (LNUPE), various National Sports Federations and other Sports Schemes like Panchayat Yuva Krida evam Khel Abhiyan. Joint Secretary (International Sports Division) looks after matters concerning the Commonwealth Games 2010. The matter relating to Accounts & Audit is under the charge of a Joint Secretary & Financial Adviser who looks after the work of this Ministry in addition to his duties in other Ministries.

The Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports has at present a sanctioned strength of 219, comprising 37 Group 'A' posts, 78 Group 'B' posts (21 Gazetted and 57 Non Gazetted), 74 Group 'C' posts and 30 Group 'D' posts. The Organizational Chart of the Ministry is at Annex-I.

## REPRESENTATION OF SC/ST AND OTHER BACKWARD CLASSES

In the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, 41 personnel belong to SC, ST and OBC categories. In Group 'A' posts, 3 officers belong to SC category and 1 Officer belongs to OBC category. In Group 'B' posts, 8 officers belong to SC category, 5 officers belong to ST category and 2 officials belong to OBC. In Group 'C' posts, 9 officials belong to SC category and 3 officials belong to OBC category. In Group 'D', 6 officials belong to SC category, 3 officials belong to ST category and 1 official belongs to OBC category

## Allocation of Budget

The total budget allocation for the Ministry for 2009-10 was Rs. 3073.00 crore (BE), comprising Rs. 2699.00 crore on the Plan side and Rs. 374.00 crore on the Non-Plan side. RE for 2009-10 is Rs. 3706.00 crore comprising of Rs. 2967.00 crore on the Plan side and Rs. 739.00 crore on Non-Plan side. For the year 2010-11, the total budget estimate is Rs. 3565.00 crore (BE) comprising Rs. 2844.00 crore for Plan and Rs. 721.00 crore for Non-Plan. The details are given at Annex-II.

## Progressive use of Hindi

The Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports has an Official Language Section comprising sanctioned posts of Dy. Director(O.L.), 01 Sr. Hindi Translator, 03 Junior Hindi Translators and secretarial staff for implementation of the Official Language Act, 1963 and Official Language Rules 1976. An Official Language Implementation Committee (OLIC) has been constituted in the Ministry under the chairmanship of the Joint Secretary (Admn.) and its meetings are held regularly in each quarter.

During the period under report First Sub-Committee of Parliament on Official Language had inspected the Ministry on 28th January, 2010 to review the progressive use of Hindi in the Ministry. The Committee observed that there was significant improvement in the progressive use of Official Language Hindi in comparison to the previous inspection held on 2006.

The Ministry wholeheartedly observed Hindi Fortnight from 14-30th Sep, 2009. During the Hindi Fortnight, competition like Hindi essay writing, Hindi Noting & Drafting (For Hindi & Non-Hindi Speaking Employees) Hindi elocution were organized.

The website of the Ministry has been made bilingual in Hindi and in English and it is being updated regularly.

## **VIGILANCE CELL**

Vigilance Machinery during the period 2009-10 functioned in the Ministry under a Joint Secretary who has been designated as the Chief Vigilance Officer. Each autonomous organization and subordinate office in the Ministry has its own independent unit to deal with vigilance cases.

A Vigilance Awareness Week was observed in the Ministry as well as its field organizations from from 3rd Novembor to 7th November. A pledge was taken by all the officers and employees of this Ministry. During the week, banners and posters containing slogan regarding awareness on vigilance were displayed. Awareness on preventive vigilance, common irregularities leading to vigilance cases, strict adherence to honesty and transparency etc. were emphasized.

## **COMPLAINT COMMITTEE ON SEXUAL HARASSMENT OF WOMEN EMPLOYEES**

In pursuance of the directives of the Hon'ble Supreme Court in their judgment in the case of Vishakha & Others Vs. State of Rajasthan & Others, a Complaint Committee has been constituted under the chairmanship of a lady Director in the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports to look into the complaints of sexual harassment of women employees in the Ministry. A complaint received by the Committee during last year is presently in the final stage of its hearing. No fresh complaint has been received by the Committee during 2009-10.

## **RIGHT TO INFORMATION AND PUBLIC GRIEVANCES CELL**

All applications under Right to Information Act, 2005 are received centrally in RTI Cell of this Ministry which is manned by a Section Officer coordinated by Director (Coordination). Applications are forwarded to the concerned CPIOs for sending suitable reply to the petitioner within the stipulated time. In pursuance of the provisions contained in Section 5 (1) of the Right to Information Act 2005, the Ministry has designated subject wise Public Information Officers at the level of Director/Deputy Secretary and officer at the level of Joint Secretaries as Appellate Authorities, under the Act. The

details are also posted on the official website of the Ministry. Similarly all applications on Public Grievances are also received centrally in PG Cell. Director (Admn.) has been nominated as the Public Grievance Officer in the Ministry.

## Utilisation Certificate

The Chief Controller of Accounts, Ministry of Human Resource Development brings to the notice of this Ministry, from time to time, about the number of pending Utilisation Certificates. Special efforts were in place to liquidate the pendency of the Utilization Certificates. Steps have been taken for releasing of funds only to those agencies who had submitted the Utilisation Certificates for the grants received from the Government of India. In case of non-submission of Utilization Certificates, no further grants are released.

Special drives and consultations with the Financial Adviser, wherever necessary, has resulted in liquidation of pendency in large scale. A stringent action has been initiated to take penal action against NGOs who did not furnish utilization details in respect of Government grants. The names and addresses of the defaulting NGOs have been posted on the Departmental Web site. Besides this, regular reminders are also issued to the defaulting NGOs for submitting the Utilisation Certificates urgently. The year-wise pendency of UCs is summarized in the statement given at Annex -IV.

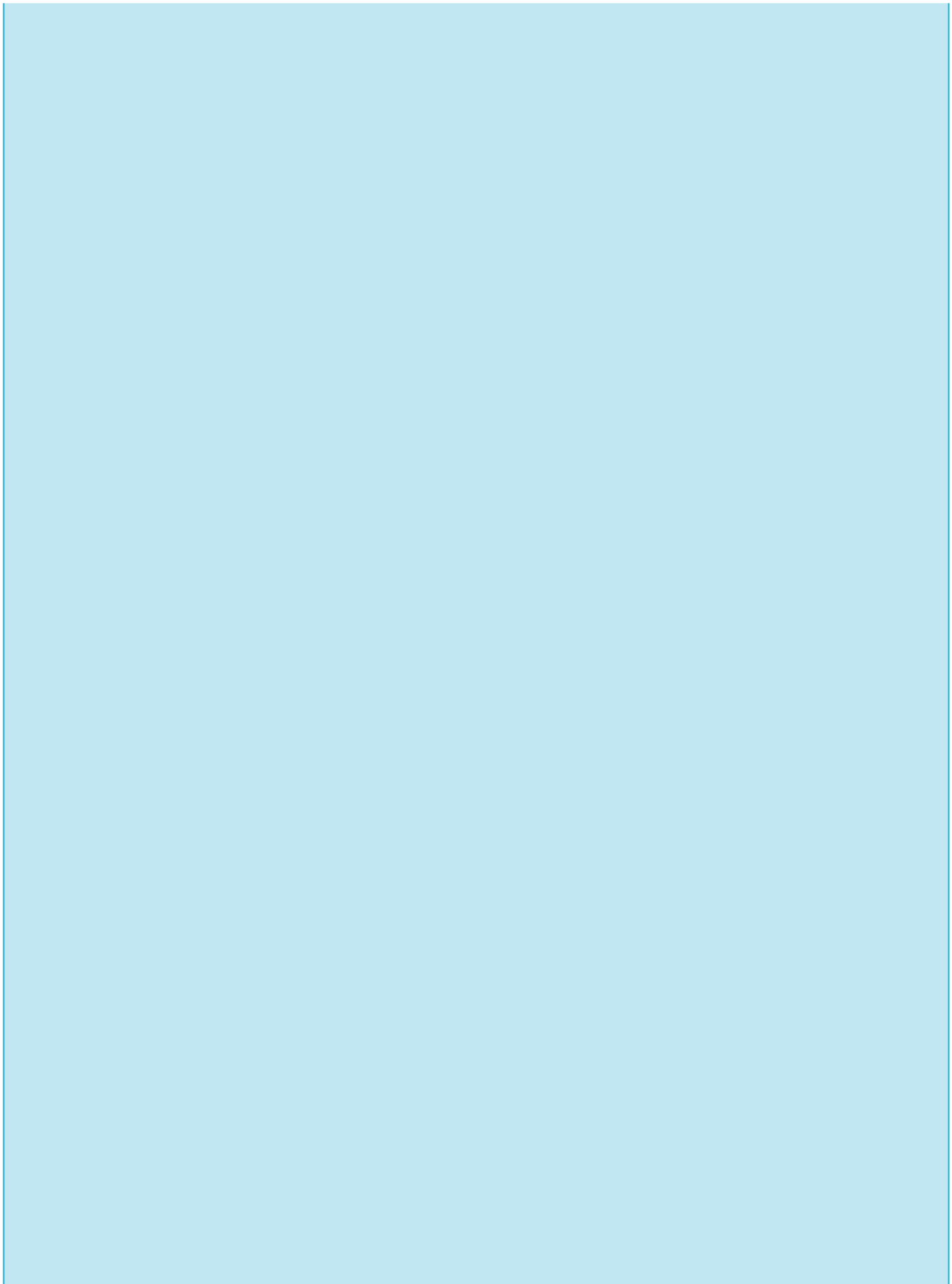

### YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

Honble Prime Minister of India in his Independence Day speech on 15th August, 2006 called upon all youth to work shoulder to shoulder in building a new India of their dreams. He has also assured that this country will have great opportunities for full expression of the skills of youth in India.

The population of persons below the age of 35 years in India is about 70 percent of the total population. Within this, the population between the age of 10-19 years is approximately 225 million, the largest ever cohort of young people to make a transition to adulthood. It is this population of young people, which constitutes, for India, a potential demographic dividend, and/or a challenge of mega proportions if not properly addressed and harnessed.

The National Youth Policy was thoroughly revised and tabled in Parliament in December, 2003. As enshrined in the 'Implementation Mechanism' of the National Youth Policy, 2003, the Committee for Action Plan of the National Youth Policy was constituted under the Chairpersonship of Secretary, Minister of Youth Affairs & Sports on 13th December, 2004 to chalk out plans for implementation of the programmes and activities for all round development of the youth. The Committee comprised of Secretaries or representatives from concerned Ministries/Departments, representatives from prominent Non-Government Organizations and eminent Academicians/Experts in various fields.

Based on the discussions held in the meeting, a draft National Plan of Action for Youth focusing eight key sectors i.e. Education, Training and Employment, Health & Family Welfare, Preservation of Environment, Ecology and Wild Life, Recreation and Sports, Arts and Culture, Science and Technology, Civics and Good Citizenship of the National Youth Policy was prepared.

The Policy identifies the following thrust areas:-

- Develop qualities of citizenship and dedication to community service
- Provide the youth with proper educational and training opportunities
- Sustain and reinforce the spirit of volunteerism amongst the youth
- Develop youth leadership in various socio-economic and cultural spheres
- Special focus on engaging rural youth in nation-building activities
- Greater female participation in youth development programmes

The Policy also identifies the following key sectors of youth concerns:

- Education
- Employment and training
- Health and family welfare
- Civics and good citizenship

Ministries and Department concerned with various youth related issues are presently being consulted to review the National Youth Policy, 2003.



# NEHRU YUVA KENDRA SANGATHAN (NYKS)

## Chapter-3

### Introduction

Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS) is an autonomous body of the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports. NYKS has 501 Kendras, 28 Zonal Offices and over 3.05 lakh village based Youth Clubs with enrollment of about 8 million volunteers. It is proposed to extend NYKS to the remaining 122 new districts of the country during the current plan period. It is the largest grass root level voluntary organization; one of the kind in the world. It channelizes the power of youth who are in the age group of 13-35 years on the principal of voluntarism, Self -help and participation.

The Youth Clubs enrolled with NYKS work in the areas like education and training, awareness generation, skill development and self-employment, entrepreneurial development, thrift and co-operation, besides development of the body through sports and adventure and also through sustained exposure to new ideas and development strategies. For implementation of the programmes, every district Nehru Yuva Kendra (NYK) has a trained cadre of District Youth Coordinators, Volunteers and Youth leaders.

## Thrust Areas

The primary thrust of the organization is to convert the Youth Clubs/Mahila Mandals to a movement through making these clubs and mandals as being the nucleus of youth convergence and empowerment. The Kendras are enrolling the adolescents as members so as to make their presence felt in the executive bodies of the Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals. The information booklets on schemes of Central Government and State Governments were distributed amongst the members of Youth Clubs and Mahila Mandals, Youth Development Centres etc for their enlightenment. During 2009-10, 19639 youth in 501 districts were covered under Capacity Building of Youth in Social Sector Programmes so as to train and equip youth leaders with necessary knowledge and skill to assume the responsibility at village level situation and to act as catalytic agents of socio-economic change and over all development of the village. Besides, Skill up-gradation Training Programme for women in 100 border/tribal/backward districts were also run to enable them to take up self employment activities and through this programme 25470 women were trained through 849 programmes.

NYKS accomplishes its task through their different categories of programmes i.e. Regular Programmes, Special Programmes and Programmes in collaboration with International bodies. The Regular programmes are the programmes/Schemes assigned by the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports. The Special Programmes are the Programmes/Schemes undertaken in collaboration with the Ministries/ Departments of Government of India. While Certain programmes are also implemented in collaboration with International bodies.

### III. Scheme being implemented in collaboration with International Bodies:

NYKS in collaboration with United Nations Fund for Population Activities implemented the scheme for Development and Empowerment of Adolescents. The objective of the scheme is to provide the right stimulus, environment and role models to the adolescents so that it could be an engine for social change and national reconstruction.



# NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME

## Chapter-4

National Service Scheme (NSS) is a noble experiment in academic expansion. It inculcates the spirit of voluntary work among the students and teachers through sustained community interactions. Over the years, NSS has emerged as India's largest student youth movement in linking with the community.

National Service Scheme, popularly known as NSS was launched in Gandhiji's Birth Centenary 1969, in 37 universities involving 40,000 students with primary focus on the development of personality of students through community service. Today, NSS has more than 3.2 million student volunteers on its roll spread over 208 Universities in 10,313 colleges / institutes of higher and technical education and 7542 Secondary schools all over the country.

### Programmes

The National Service Scheme has two types of programmes, viz, "Regular Activities" and "Special Camping Programmes" undertaken by its volunteers. Under 'Regular Activities', NSS volunteers devote 120 hrs per year for two consecutive years, which includes 20 hrs. of general orientation regarding NSS and the mode of work they have to do in their volunteership. During this period they work in their adopted villages / slums in the field of cleanliness, adult education, environment conservation / protection etc.,

Special Camping provides unique opportunities to the students for group living, collective experience sharing and constant interaction with community. Special Camping programmes are organized generally on various developmental issues of national importance. The current theme of Special Camping is Healthy Youth for Healthy India. Every year 50 percent of the volunteers of each NSS Unit are expected to participate in Special Camps which is of 7 days duration.

### Funding Pattern

Union and State Governments jointly fund this programme at the ratio of 7:5 in all States except North East Region, Sikkim and Hilly Terrains where the ratio is 3:1. In J&K and all the Union Territories, Kendriya Vidyalayas and Navodaya Vidyalayas the programme is fully funded by the Government of India. As per the existing norms of the scheme expenditure of Rs. 160/- per volunteer per annum for Regular Activities and Rs. 300/- per volunteer per annum for Special Camping Programme is admissible for the states in rest of India. For North Eastern (NE) States including Sikkim, Himachal Pradesh and other hilly areas notified by the Planning Commission the present unit cost norms

are Rs.200/- and Rs.400/- for regular activities and special camping programmes respectively. At State level State NSS Cells are established by Central Government with full financial support to look after the inter-departmental coordination for smooth implementation of the programme at the State level.

## Organization

At National level, the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports looks after policy planning and monitoring of the scheme. A Programme Advisor's Cell headed by a Programme Adviser has been entrusted with assessing and monitoring the targets set for students under NSS, and those under Special Camping Programme. 15 Regional Centres are functioning in various States under the control of Deputy or Assistant Programme Adviser or Youth Officer.

## Training

To train the NSS Programme Officers and to equip them with the modern skills of social development, 5 Orientation, Training and Research Centres (TORCs) and 13 Training and Orientation Centres (TOCs) are working all over the country which are funded by the Govt. of India. These institutions run orientation as well as refresher courses for the field functionaries associated with the NSS volunteers.

## Targets & Achievements

In the year 2009-10 there is a target to enroll 32.57 lakh volunteers for Regular activities against which a number of 32,57,104 volunteers have been actually enrolled. A number of 9121 Special Camps are to be organized in adopted villages.

During the Pulse Polio Immunization Campaign 7,68,925 children were benefited in which 1,18,352 volunteers were involved. 35242 Units of Blood were donated by NSS Volunteers. Apart from this regular blood donation camps, the National Voluntary Blood Donation Day was observed throughout the country.

Special NSS camps were organized for conducting relief and rehabilitation work in the flood affected villages of North Karnataka involving removing of silt, creating awareness on Prevention of Epidemic Diseases, cleaning of debris of collapsed houses, cleaning of drainage systems etc.

## Rajiv Gandhi Adventure Scheme

With a view to promote adventure activities among student youth, Rajiv Gandhi Adventure Scheme has been launched on 26th June, 2009 to be conducted all over the country from Himalayan Region in the North and to kunnur and Tekkadi in South India; on a yearly basis for 2000 NSS Volunteers with at least 50% of the volunteers being girl students. The adventure activities to be undertaken in these camps include trekking (mountain and desert), white water rafting, para-sailing, para-gliding and basic skiing.

## Mega Summer Camp

A Mega-Summer Camp of 400 students has been introduced, for a 12 days' duration, which will be held every year in the months of May-June, in one of the four regions North, East, South and West - excluding Delhi. The first mega summer camp was held from 22nd June 2009 to 3rd July, 2009, in RGNIYD. The theme of the Camp is aimed at promoting volunteerism and citizenship. The areas of involvement focused on health, environment and rural development

## Pre-Republic Day and Republic Day Camps

NSS volunteers participate in the Republic Day Parade on Rajpath every year. To select the marching contingent, 5 Pre- Republic Day Parade Camps were organized at Guwahati, Jamshedpur (Tatanagar), Pune, Gurgaon and Bangalore. One thousand NSS Volunteers (after initial selection) and NSS Programme Officers participated in these camps. Out of the 1000 volunteers, 200 volunteers were finally selected to take part in the month long Republic Day Camp at New Delhi in January.

## Evaluation Study

In order to take a holistic view of functioning of NSS, Tata Institute of Social Sciences (TISS) was entrusted with conducting an "Evaluation Study of NSS in India". The specific objectives of this study inter-alia included reviewing the planning and implementation of the existing NSS activities in different zones; assessing its impact and sustainability; examining the structure and functioning of the existing administrative and financial mechanisms etc. The important recommendations of TISS are being implemented through the note for Expenditure Finance Committee.



## RAJIV GANDHI NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF YOUTH DEVELOPMENT (RGNIYD)

### Chapter-5

Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development (RGNIYD) a Deemed University under section 3 of University Act 1956 was set up as an autonomous body by the Department of Youth Affairs and Sports, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India and registered under Societies Registration Act, XXVII of 1975 S.No.67 of 1993. It has emerged as the professional resource agency, and acts as a think-tank of the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, and assists the Government and Non-government agencies in youth related activities. As the apex Institute at the national level, it works in close cooperation with the NSS, NYK and other youth organisations in the implementation of training programmes. The Institute is a nodal agency for training youth and a facilitator of youth development activities in rural as well as in urban areas.



The Institute is provided with the essential facilities and infrastructure so that it would serve as a Centre of Advanced Study and Applied Research for ensuring availability of professional expertise in youth work and to create a competent cadre of youth workers. As a regular feature of its functional activities, the Institute has launched a number of research projects and extension programmes to unearth the potential in the young people which perhaps remain untapped. It provides a forum for youth to debate and discuss issues that concern them as well as those that impinge on their development.

Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development has been playing a vital and catalytic role at the national level as the apex Institute for Training, Research, Action Research, Consultancy, Dissemination and Documentation activities in the field of youth development.

This Institute has the five Divisions besides the Administrative Division, each under a Faculty Head.

In keeping with its mandate to function as a Centre of Advanced Study in the field of youth development, the RGNIYD has been granted the status of a Deemed University under section 3 of the UGC Act. On being declared a deemed University in 2008, RGNIYD has launched 5 Master level academic programmes aiming at professionalizing the concept of youth work through which empowerment of youth can be achieved. . The academic programmes are Master of Arts. in 1) Youth Empowerment, 2) Career Counseling, 3) Gender Studies, 4) Local Governance and 5) Life Skills Education.

During the year the Institute organized several important training programmes and undertook various important activities. The detail of the Training Programmes and activities is at **Annex-VI**.

An important mandate of the Institute is formulation of Core Training Materials, Training Manuals and Special Modules to impart specific inputs in different areas which are replicable in anypart of the country. The Institute does this through consultations with experts in the specific area to prepare the modules which is then refined and revised after pilot testing the module among the stakeholders.

The Institute has prepared and brought out several modules / manuals viz Social Harmony and National Unity, Career Guidance for Teachers, Life-Skills for Adolescents, Gender Equity and Youth, Model Youth Clubs, Leadership and Personality Development, Tribal Youth as Social Animators, Training Youth in Citizenship Rights and Social Harmony, Youth in Border Districts and NSS Training Manual.

## YOUTH HOSTELS

### Chapter-6

Youth Hostels are built to promote youth travel within the country. The construction of the Youth Hostels is a joint venture of the Central and the State Governments. While the Central Government bears the cost of construction, the State Governments provide fully developed land free of cost. Youth hostels are located in areas of historical and cultural value; educational centre; tourist importance etc. where facilities for youth activities are most necessary. 15 of our functional Youth Hostels are in State Capitals. These Youth Hostels provide good accommodation for the youth at reasonable rates.

As on 31st December, 2009, 80 Youth Hostels have been constructed across the country and 5 more Youth Hostels are under various stages of construction. A statement indicating details of such completed/under construction hostels is at **Annex-VII & VIII**

As on February, 2009 an amount of Rs.2,48,37,653/- have been released towards construction purposes in General Category States. A sum of Rs.75.00 lakhs have been released for the construction in North East States.

The some of the major initiatives taken under the Youth Hostel Scheme include are:

- With a view to face lift the Youth Hostels falling enroute Queen's Baton Relay, 20 Youth Hostels have been short listed wherein Rs. 5 lakhs per Hostel has been released. The fund shall be utilized to carry out the external and internal painting of the hostel and complete repair work of toilets, rooms and commons areas of the Youth Hostel building.
- The furnishing norms of the new Hostels have been enhanced.
- With a view to impart efficient management system in hostels, the method of recruitment of the Youth Hostel Wardens (now designated as Managers) has been changed. Moreover, Youth Hostel Receptionist/ Care Takers are been appointed.
- The construction methodology of new Hostel has been reviewed with a view to optimize the plinth area usage and ensure completion of the projects within time in order to minimize cost and time over run.
- Hostels which are not properly located/ managed are to be put for alternate use.

A new Youth Hostel at Taran Tarn with State of Art Technology and modern facilities has been completed in a record time of nine months and inaugurated by the Hon'ble Minister of Youth Affairs & Sports on 18.11.2009. A Youth Hostel at Ooty (Tamil Nadu) has also been inaugurated by the Hon'ble Minister of Youth Affairs & Sports in this year.

### Background

The scheme titled National Programme for Youth and Adolescent Development (NPYAD) has been formulated by merger of four 100% central sector grants-in-aid schemes of the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports during 10th Plan namely, Promotion of Youth Activities & Training, Promotion of National Integration, Promotion of Adventure and Development & Empowerment of Adolescents, with a view to reduce the multiplicity of schemes with similar objectives and , ensuring uniformity in funding pattern and implementation mechanism, avoiding delays in availability of fund to the field level and institutionalizing participation of State Governments in project formulation and its implementation. While there will be synergy and convergence in operation mechanism and programme delivery, there will be clear distinction with regard to the financial parameters of each of the components under the scheme. The Scheme has come into existence with effect from 1st April, 2008.

Under the scheme, proposals from All India Organisations are received directly and proposals from State Level Organisations through the concerned State Government / UT administration, duly verified by a designated State Level Screening Committee (SLSC), constituted for the purpose before recommending to the Ministry, indicating their priority.

The scheme is being implemented in the project mode through Project Implementing Agencies (PIAs). The PIA may submit project proposal involving one or more programme area or components under the scheme but the key factor for consideration of the project will be the past experience and resource (infrastructure and technical manpower) available with the PIA.

A duly constituted Project Appraisal Committee (PAC) headed by Secretary (Youth Affairs) in the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports considers the proposals. The recommendations of the PAC thereafter are placed for approval of the competent authority in the Ministry.

A statement showing grant-in aid of more than 1.00 lakh sanctioned under various components of the Scheme of NPYAD during 2009-10 is given in Annex-IX.

### Activities and Achievement in the North East Region including Sikkim

The Ministry has sanctioned an amount of Rs. 195.00 lakhs for various activities/ programmes under the Umbrella Scheme "National Programme for Youth and Adolescent Development" of the Ministry. Out of this, Rs.193.98 lakhs, as 1st installment, has been released to various Voluntary Organisations in the North East Region.

## National Youth Festival, Bhubanewar, Orissa

Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports in collaboration with the State Government of Orissa organized the 15th National Youth Festival at Bhubaneshwar, Orissa during 8th to 12th January, 2010. The theme of the Festival was "Celebrating Diversity." About 2500-3000 youth from all over the country including all North Eastern States participated in the 5 day Festival. Activities such as Yuva Kriti, Young Artists' Camp, Food Festival, Kavi Sammelan, Rock Band and Adventure Programmes formed important components of the largest youth festival being organized in the country. Hon'ble Minister of State for Youth Affairs and Sports and the Hon'ble Chief Minister of Orissa added prestige to the Festival. 18 member SAARC delegates from Pakistan, Nepal, Sri Lanka and Afghanistan, attended the National Youth Festival.

## North East Youth Festival, Kohima, Nagaland

In a glittering ceremony held at the Indira Gandhi Stadium at Kohima, the Honorable Chief Minister of Nagaland, Shri Neiphiu Rio declared the First North East Youth Festival open on 8th October, 2009. Thundering applause from thousand of audience, firing of the traditional gun, colorful balloons flying high in the cloudy sky, smiling of the early morning sun between, traditional music all added a festive

look to the stadium. About 1300 youth from all over the country including all the north eastern states participated in the 3 day North East Youth Festival organized jointly by the Department of Youth Affairs, Government of India and the Nagaland Government from 8th to 10th October, 2009. Majority of the participants are active volunteers of the NYKS and NSS, two field organizations of the Department of Youth Affairs.

The inauguration of the Festival by the Hon'ble Chief Minister of Nagaland was followed by cultural performances which included traditional Nagas indigenous sports viz. Naga Wrestling, Taekwondo display by students and other tribal dances. The three day Festival witnessed a number of competitive events like Rock Band Contest, One Act Play, Folk Dance, Folk Music, Classical Dance Competitions etc. for which elaborate arrangements were made. Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan also set up an exhibition displaying various arts and crafts from various parts of the country in the Yuva Kriti. A Youth Convention was also organized for the NSS students and eminent personalities addressed and shared their experiences with the students. Ms. Agatha Sangma, Union Minister of State for Rural Development was the Chief Guest at the Closing Ceremony of the Festival held on 10th October, 2009, who gave away prizes to the winners of various competitive events.



## National Youth Award

Department of Youth Affairs, Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports presents National Youth Awards every year to motivate young persons to achieve excellence in the field of national service and to encourage them to develop a sense of responsibility to their community and to improve their own potential as good citizens and young leaders.

The Award consists of a silver medal, a shawl, a certificate and a cash prize of Rs.40,000/- to the individual award winners and Rs.2.00 lakhs to the voluntary organization.

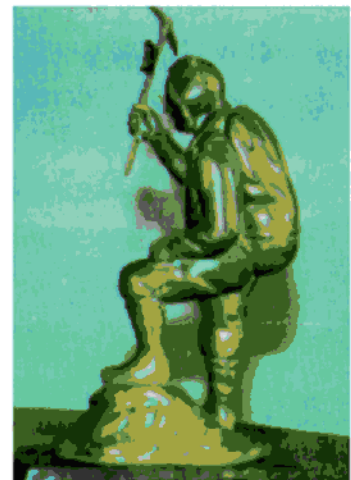
Keeping in mind the views of the National Selection Committee which considered Awards for the year 2007-08 certain modifications were made by the Ministry of selection process. For the first time, the Ministry advertised the awards on an all India basis. It was also decided that the Awards hereinafter will be theme based. The current year's theme was "Environment Protection including Rain Water Harvesting". These awards are given away normally during the five-day National Youth Festival by the Honble Chief Guest.

National Youth Awards for 2008-09 were presented to 24 individuals and 1 voluntary organization during the 15th National Youth Festival held at Bhubneswar from 8th to 12th January, 2010. The list of of Awardees is given in **Annex- X**.

## Tenzing Norgay National Adventure Award

The Tenzing Norgay National Adventure Award is the highest national recognition for outstanding achievements in the field of adventure on land, sea and air. A cash Award of Rs.3,00,000/-, a statue and a scroll of honour is given to each awardee. This award is at par with the Arjuna Award for sporting excellence.

Tenzing Norgay National Adventure Awards are given away by the President of India alongwith Arjuna Awards, in a function held at Rashtrapati Bhavan on the 29th August every year. Awards for the year 2009 were conferred on Sqn Ldr Ramakant (Air Adventure), Ms. Chaitanya Datla (Water Adventure), Shri Bachinapally Shekhar Babu (Land Adventure) and Major HPS Ahluwalia (Life Time Achievement) by Smt. Pratibha Patil, the President of India, at Rashtrapati Bhavan on 29.8.2009.



### **Commonwealth Youth Programme (CYP)**

The Commonwealth Youth Programme (CYP) vision is to work towards a society where young women and men are empowered by developing their potential creativity and skills as productive and dynamic members of their societies. These young men and women are enabled to participate fully at every level of decision making development successfully promoting Commonwealth values of international co-operation, social justice, democracy and human rights. This programme came into being in 1974 with the overall purpose of promoting the development of youth in the Commonwealth. This programme encourages and supports the youth in the process of national development and provides opportunities for increasing international understanding.

CYP Asia Centre at Chandigarh is one of the four CYP Regional establishments along with the Centres in Lusaka (Zambia) for the Africa region, Georgetown (Guyana) for the Caribbean region and Solomon Islands for the South Pacific region. The overall responsibility for CYP lies with the Commonwealth Secretariat at London. The activities of the CYP including the Asia Centre are directed by Youth Affairs Unit of the Commonwealth Secretariat. The Asia Centre meets the specific needs of eight Commonwealth Countries of the region, namely, Brunei Darussalam, Bangladesh, India, Pakistan, Malaysia, Maldives, Singapore and Sri Lanka.

At present, there are three major strategic areas on which Commonwealth Youth Programme is concentrating:

- National Youth Policy;
- Human Resource Development, and
- Youth Empowerment.

The programmes are financed by member countries and India.

### **Exchange of Youth Delegation at International Level**

The Department endeavors to create an international perspective in collaboration with other countries and international agencies/organizations on various youth issues. The Department also collaborates with the Commonwealth Youth Programme Asia Centre, Chandigarh, in organizing a number of events concerning youth in Commonwealth countries in the Asia-Pacific Region.

Under this programme, exchange of Youth Delegations with friendly countries is taken up on reciprocal basis for promoting exchange of ideas, values and culture amongst the youth of different countries and also to develop International understanding. Exchange of Youth Delegations were organized with China, Republic of Korea and training course on "Nature Conservation" and "Vocational Training Education" under the training programme for Young Leaders was organized by Japan International Co-operation Agency (JICA).

This Ministry has introduced a new Scheme - National Youth Corps (NYC) by amalgamating the two existing schemes - the National Service Volunteer Scheme (NSVS) and the Rashtriya Sadhbavana Yojana (RSY). The Scheme would enable young men and women in the age group of 18-25 years to serve up to two years in nation building. The Scheme envisages enrollment of 20,000 volunteers, of which 8,000 will be deployed in Jammu and Kashmir and 12,000 volunteers in other States. The Scheme will be implemented by Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS), an autonomous body under the administrative control of Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, Government of India. The Scheme will be effective from 1st April, 2010.

### Objectives

- To set up a group of disciplined and dedicated youth who have the inclination and spirit to engage in the task of nation building.
- To facilitate the realization of inclusive growth (both social and economic).
- To act as points for dissemination of information, basic knowledge in the community.
- To act as group modulators and peer group educators.
- To act as role models for the younger people specially towards enhancement of public ethics, probity and dignity of labour.

### Eligibility

Young men and women falling in the age group of 18-25 would be eligible to become volunteers.

Qualification: Class 10th Pass and above in special category states like North East and J&K and 12th Pass and above in respect of other states.

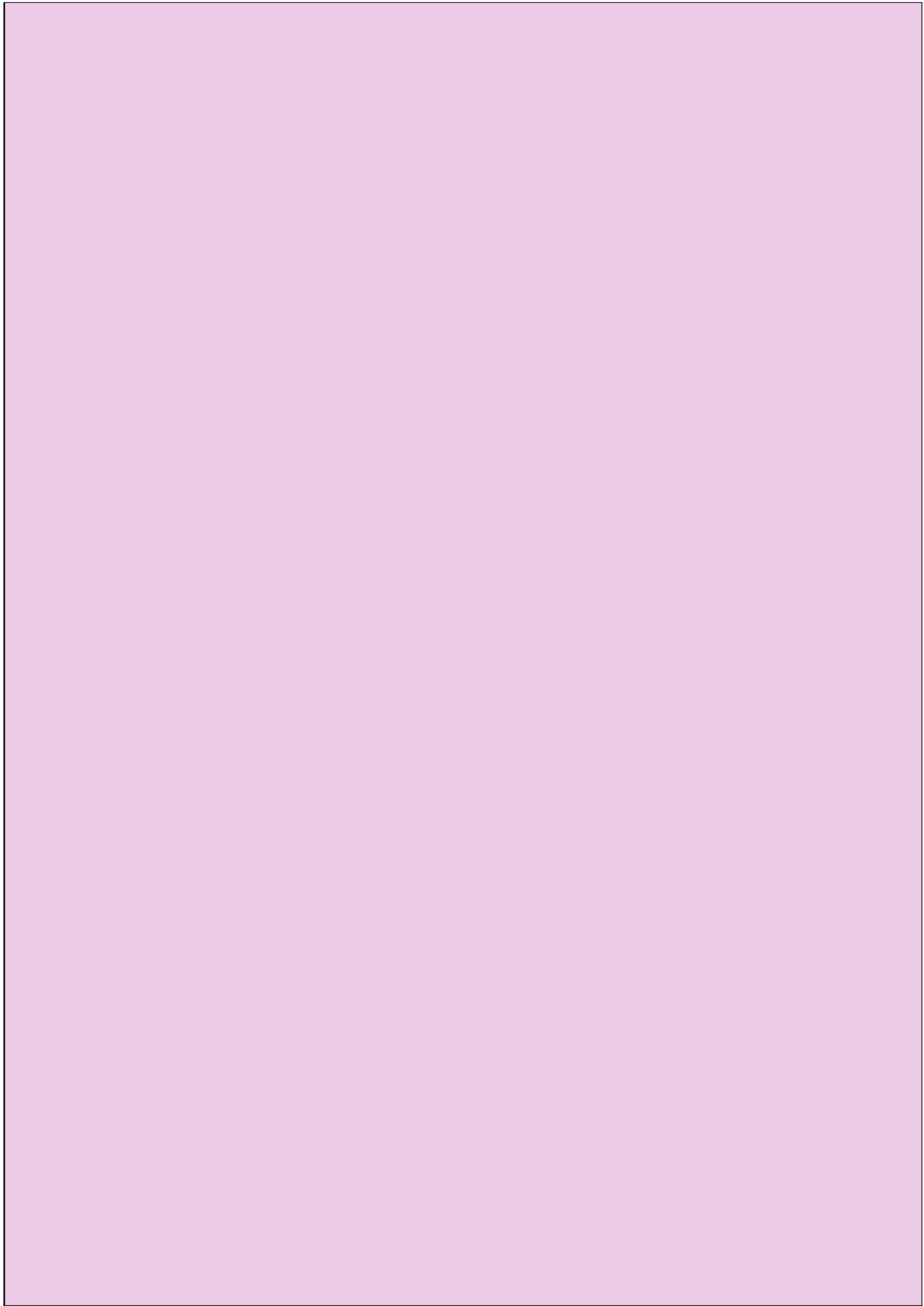
### Training :

The volunteers will be provided modular employability training (MES) in the last quarter of their engagement.

### Honorarium

The volunteers will be paid an honorarium of Rs. 2500/- per month for their engagement upto two years (including the period of training which will be for 4 week) in the identified development activities.

# DEPARTMENT OF SPORTS



Sports and games have always been seen as an integral component in all round development of human personality. Apart from being means of entertainment and physical fitness, sports have also played a great role in generation of the spirit of healthy competition and bonding within the community. Needless to mention that achievements in sports at the international level have always been a source of national pride and prestige.

With modern sports being highly competitive, the use of modern infrastructure, equipment and advanced scientific support has changed the scenario of sports at the international level. Keeping in line with the growing demands for advanced infrastructure, equipment and scientific support, Government of India has taken several initiatives and is providing the necessary assistance to the sportspersons by way of training and exposure in international competitions backed up with scientific and equipment support.

### NATIONAL SPORTS POLICY INITIATIVES

Physical education, games and sports have been receiving attention over successive Plans. However, it was only after India hosted the IX Asian Games in 1982 that "Sports" as a subject of policy started receiving attention. National Sports Policy, 1984 was the first move towards developing an organized and systematic framework for the development and promotion of sports in the country, and the precursor of the present National Sports Policy, 2001.

### NATIONAL SPORTS POLICY 2001

The twin planks of the National Sports Policy 2001 are "Broad-basing" of Sports and "Achieving Excellence in Sports" at the national and international levels.

The salient features of the Policy are as under:

1. Broad basing of sports and achievement of excellence;
2. Up-gradation and development of infrastructure;
3. Support to National Sports Federations and other sports bodies;
4. Strengthening of scientific and coaching support to sports
5. Special incentives to promote sports
6. Enhanced participation of women, scheduled tribes and rural youth;
7. Involvement of corporate sector in sports promotion; and
8. Promote sports mindedness among the public at large.

5. Indian Table Tennis Team won 1-Gold, 2-Silver and 1-Bronze medal in Commonwealth Table Tennis Championship held at Glassgow in May, 2009.
6. Indian Jr. Boys & Girls wrestling team participated in 2009 Junior Asian Free Style, Greco-Roman and Free Wrestling Championships held at Manila from 7th to 12th July, 2009 and won 5 Gold, 4 Silver and 5 Bronze medals.
7. Indian Senior Men Greco Roman Style Wrestling team participated in the International Wrestling Tournament held at Madrid (Spain) from 11-12th July, 2009 and won 1 Gold and 2 Bronze Medals.
8. Indian Swimming Team won 8 Gold, 8 Silver and 8 Bronze medals at the Asian Age Group Championship held at Tokyo. Also the Indian team won 1 Silver and 1 Bronze in Diving and 2 Bronze medals in Water Polo.
9. India competed at the 1st Asian Youth Games 2009 held in Singapore from June 29, 2009 to July 7, 2009. India finished 7th in the medal tally and secured 5 gold medals, 3 silver medals, and 3 bronze medals.
10. India bagged 3 gold, 7 silver and 23 bronze medals to finish a commendable 10th in 1st Asian Martial Arts Games held in Bangkok, Thailand from August 1, 2009 to August 9, 2009.
11. Indian Volleyball team participated in the Jr. Men World Championship held at Balewadi, Pune from 31st July, '09 to 9th August, 2009 and secured 4th Position.
12. Indian Volleyball team participated in the Sr. Men World Championship Qualifying tournament at China from 14th August, '09 to 16th August, 2009.

13. Indian Volleyball team Participated in Youth Volleyball Championship at Italy from 28.8.09 to 6th Sept.'09.
14. World Badminton Championship at Hyderabad from 10-16th August, 2009. Ms. Saina Nehwal reached up to quarter final stage.
15. Indian Volleyball team Participated in Youth Volleyball Championship at Italy from 28.8.09 to 6.9.09-7th place.
16. India participated in 3rd Asian Indoor Games 2009 held in Hanoi and Ho Chi Minh (Vietnam) from 30th October to 8th November, 2009 and India finished 7th in the medals tally by bagging 6 gold, 9 silver and 25 bronze medals.
17. India sent 392 strong contingent (306 sportspersons and 93 officials comprising of coaches, physiotherapists, masseurs, doctors, technical officers etc) for participation in 11th South Asian Games, 2010, being held in Dhaka from 29th January to 9th February, 2010. India topped the medal tally by winning 174 medals (90 Gold, 55 Silver and 29 Bronze).



### INTRODUCTION

The Sports Authority of India was set up by the Government in 1984 as a Society registered under the Societies' Registration Act, 1860, with the twin objective of broad-basing of sports and to achieve excellence at the national/international level. SAI is also entrusted with the responsibility of maintaining and utilizing the following stadia in Delhi on behalf of Government, Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports:-

- (i) Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium
- (ii) Indira Gandhi Stadium
- (iii) Major Dhyan Chand National Stadium
- (iv) Dr. Shyama Prasad Mookerjee Swimming Pool Complex
- (v) Dr. Karni Singh Shooting Ranges

The above stadia have since been handed over to CPWD for creating requisite infrastructure for the Commonwealth Games-2010.

Subsequently, in order to adopt an integrated approach towards promotion and development of sports, the erstwhile Society for National Institutes of Physical Education & Sports (SNIPES) consisting of NSNIS, Patiala at its Centres and the two Lakshmi Bai National Colleges of Physical Education (LNCPEs) located at Gwalior and Thiruvananthapuram, were merged with SAI w.e.f. 1st May, 1987. The LNCPE, Gwalior was, however, delinked from SAI in September, 1995 on attaining the status of a "Deemed University" (now re-christened as LNUPE, Gwalior).

### GENERAL BODY AND GOVERNING BODY OF SAI

The Hon'ble Prime Minister of India is the ex-officio President of the Society (SAI). Hon'ble Union Minister in-charge of Sports is the Vice-President of the Society. The Governing Body of SAI is headed by the Union Minister of Youth Affairs & Sports and Union Minister of State for Youth Affairs & Sports is its Vice-Chairman. The last meeting of the Governing Body of SAI was held on 24th July, 2009 under the Chairmanship of Dr. M.S. Gill, Hon'ble Union Minister for Youth Affairs & Sports.

### AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

- To promote and broad-base sports in the country
- Talent identification and development

- To implement schemes/programmes for achieving excellence in sports
- To manage the stadia in Delhi, which were constructed/renovated for the IXth Asian Games held in 1982 and other sports infrastructure facilities.
- To establish, run, manage and administer the institutions to produce high caliber coaches, sports scientists and physical education teachers
- To initiate, undertake, sponsor, stimulate and encourage research projects related to various sports sciences for upgradation of sports, sportspersons and coaches

## ORGANIZATIONAL SET-UP

The Sports Authority of India is headed by the Director General. He is assisted by Executive Directors in the spheres of TEAMS, Operations and Finance. On the administrative side, the DG is assisted by Secretary (SAI). Director (Infra) assists DG on matters of maintenance of Buildings owned by SAI. The coaching Department is headed by Director (Coaching). There are 6 Regions headed by Regional Directors at Bangalore, Gandhinagar, Chandigarh, Kolkata, Imphal, Bhopal and Sonapat. In addition, through the Netaji Subash National Institute of Sports (NIS), Patiala (the academic arm of SAI), and some of the Regional Centres, SAI offers a variety of courses in sports coaching and sports medicine (at NIS); and, graduate and post-graduate courses in physical education at the Laxmibai National College of Physical Education (LNCPE), Thiruvananthapuram

2 special Officers in the rank of Joint Secretary to Government of India have been appointed till Commonwealth Games 2010 to assist the DG on matters relating to CWG.

## SCHEMES OF SAI

The Sports Promotional Schemes of SAI were conceived and formulated during 7th Five Year Plan for development and promotion of sports at grass-root level in the country. SAI is currently implementing the following Sports Promotional Schemes through its Regional Centres:-

- 1) National Sports Talent Contest (NSTC) Scheme
- 2) Army Boys Sports Companies (ABSC) Scheme
- 3) SAI Training Centre (STC) Scheme
- 4) Special Area Games (SAG) Scheme
- 5) Centre of Excellence Scheme

The salient features of the aforesaid Schemes being implemented by the SAI are indicated in the succeeding paragraphs.

### (1) National Sports Talent Contest (NSTC) Scheme

**INTRODUCTION:** The National Sports Talent Contest Scheme was launched during 1985 under which the talented young children between the age group of 8-14 years are spotted and nurtured by providing scientific training.

**OBJECTIVE:** The main concept of the scheme is to PLAY & STUDY in the same school. The scheme envisages scientific scouting of talent at optimum age essential for converting the genetically and physiologically gifted children into future medal hopes in various competitions at National and International level.

**ADOPTION OF SCHOOLS:** Under the scheme, the schools having good sports infrastructure are adopted. Each adopted school in addition to the services of coaches for imparting training to the trainees will get financial assistance for purchase of consumable sports equipment.

At present, there are 22 Regular Adopted schools, in which 947 trainees (710 Boys & 237 Girls) are being trained.

**(a) Extension of NSTC Scheme to Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalayas (JNVs):**

Keeping in view the need to promote sports in remote and rural areas & to provide greater balance for village children, the Governing Body in its 27th meeting held on 9th July, 2001 approved the proposal for extension of NSTC Scheme to Navodaya Vidyalayas having the requisite infrastructure. These Centres are established in association with Navodaya Vidyalaya Samiti. These schools also act as feeder centres to SAI Training Centres and SAG Centres.

In compliance of the directions of Governing Body at its meeting held on 24th July, 2009, 33 Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalayas have been de-adopted. At present, there are 16 Navodaya Vidyalayas, in which 103 trainees (63 Boys & 40 Girls) are being trained.

**(b) Extension of NSTC Scheme to Schools having tradition of Indigenous Games & Martial Arts (IGMA)**

With a view to promote indigenous Games & Martial Arts in the schools in rural and semi-urban areas and scouting of talent in these games for nurturing in modern sports, the Governing Body of SAI in its 28th meeting held on 12th November, 2001 approved the proposal for adoption of schools runs by Educational Institutions for promotion of indigenous games & martial arts as part of the existing NSTC scheme.

At present, there are 27 schools adopted to Promote Indigenous Games & Martial Arts, in which 348 trainees (234 Boys & 114 Girls) are being trained.

**(c) Extension of NSTC Scheme to Akharas**

In order to create a broader base for modern Wrestling and to supplement the efforts made by various akharas, SAI has adopted many Akharas under NSTC Scheme.

At present, there are 32 Akharas adopted to Promote Indigenous Games & martial arts, in which 637 trainees (612 Boys & 25 Girls) are being trained.

**(d) Extension of NSTC scheme to Sports Centres adopted on the pattern of akharas**

Similarly, the Governing Body of SAI in its 31st meeting held on 20th September 2006 approved adoption of Sports Centres on the pattern of Akharas. Under the scheme, high performance Sports Centres being run, specially in the Priority disciplines, such as Athletics, Judo, Wrestling, Boxing, Swimming and other recognized martial arts akin to modern sports, are provided with the support as is being provided to the Akharas.

At present, there are 04 Sports Centres adopted on the pattern of akharas, in which 91 trainees (78 Boys & 13 Girls) are being trained.

In total, there are 22 Regular Adopted schools, 27 schools adopted to Promote Indigenous Games & martial arts, 16 Navodaya Vidyalayas, 32 Akharas and 04 Sports Centres on the pattern of akharas, in which total of 2126 trainees (1697 Boys & 429 Girls) are being trained.

**(2) Army Boys Sports Companies (ABSC) Scheme**

The scheme is a joint venture of the Army Authorities and Sports Authority of India with a view to leveraging the excellent infrastructure, efficient administration and disciplined environment for sports training available in the various Army Regimental Centres. Boys in the age group of 8-16 years of age are inducted under the scheme. After attaining the required age, the trainees are also offered job in the Army.

At present, there are 15 Centres in which 1206 Boys are being trained.

**(3) SAI Training Centres (STC) Scheme**

The main objective of the scheme is to train meritorious sportspersons in the age group of 14-21 years. Relaxation in age is given in meritorious cases and also in disciplines of Gymnastics and Swimming. Under the scheme, the Centres are set up in joint collaboration with State Governments /UT Administrations and SAI. The following facilities are provided by the State Government and Sports Authority of India:

- a) Facilities to be provided by the State Govt.:
  - i) A suitable building for hostel with facilities for catering, library, recreation and family accommodation for in-charge of the Hostel and the coaches.
  - ii) Playfields/ Indoor Hall/ Swimming Pool depending on the disciplines identified.
  - iii) Maintenance of playfields for day to day training.
  - iv) Annual maintenance of the hostel building.
- b) Facilities to be provided by SAI:
  - i) Furniture for hostel and catering equipment.
  - ii) Nutritious and balanced diet.

- iii) Sports kit.
- iv) Coaches.
- v) Sports equipment.
- vi) Medical assistance and insurance.
- vii) Administrative and catering staff.
- viii) Electricity, water and administrative staff.

At present, there are 58 Centres in which 7658 (5453 Boys & 2205 Girls) are being trained

#### **(4) Special Area Games (SAG) Scheme**

The main objective of the scheme is to scout natural talent for modern competitive games and sports from tribal, rural, coastal and hilly areas of the country and also from regions having genetic/geographic advantage and nurture them scientifically for achieving excellence in modern competitive games and sports. The trainees are adopted in the age group of 14-21 years.

The Special Area Games Centres are started in consultation with the State Govts. / UT Administrations. The State Government has to provide requisite land with infrastructure. However, in case of non-availability of infrastructure, the State Government has to provide developed land on long-term lease basis to SAI enabling it to create the required facilities. Before the start of the Centre, an Agreement has to be signed between SAI and the State/UT Govt.

At present, there are 21 Centres in which 2019 trainees (1207 Boys & 812 Girls) are being trained.

Extension Centres of STC/SAG Centres to cover schools/colleges for wider coverage:

The basic concept of the scheme is to develop sports standard in schools and colleges who organize specific sports and have shown commendable results. The trainees in the age group of 14-21 years are adopted under the scheme.

### **SELECTION OF THE INSTITUTION**

Schools and colleges actively involved in sports and having adequate infrastructure are eligible under this scheme. The institution should have a past history of producing national and international sports persons. The Schools and Colleges should also agreeable to the norms laid down by the Sports Authority of India from time to time.

### **SELECTION OF TRAINEES & AGE GROUP:**

There will not be more than 20 trainees in a School/College between the age group of 14 to 21. The students of nearby schools/colleges can also be admitted. The selection of trainees is done by a duly constituted committee consisting of (1) Regional Director or his representative (2) The Head of the College/Institute or his representative (3)

Experts/Coaches from the school/college of the concerned discipline (4) Outstanding sports persons of the area. The recommendation of the Committee will be sent to Head Office for final approval. Age can be relaxed in exceptional cases only with the recommendation of above committee and approval of the Head Office.

## **MONITORING:**

These Extension Centres would be monitored by the nearest STC/SAG and the Regional Centre Head under which it falls. The power to sanction such centres would rest with the Director General, SAI which would be put up to the Finance Committee for information.

The services of coaches are provided to these Schools/Colleges on requirement basis.

At present, there are 82 Extension Centres in which 1439 (839 Boys & 600 Girls) are being trained.

### **(5) Centre of Excellence (COE) Scheme**

The scheme envisages advance training of elite sports persons in particular disciplines and also to provide competition exposure. The trainees in the age group of 17-25 years are selected under the scheme who have shown promising performance in the senior national competitions.

These Centres of Excellence operate as regular coaching camps for the best available talent in India and provide two or possibly three concurrent layers of highly skilled sportspersons giving a wider choice of talent and continuity for later selection to National Teams and provide alternative second and third options for the National Teams.

## **SELECTION CRITERIA:**

- 1) Best six in Sr. National Competitions or Jr. International Competitions provided they have the potential to continue in competitive sports for at least 2 to 3 years.
- 2) Trainees showing excellent performance in the Schemes of SAI as well as talented sports persons scouted collectively by the SAI and National Sports Federations for advance training.

At present, there are 12 Centres in which 325 trainees (208 Boys & 117 Girls) are being trained.

## **CONSOLIDATION OF STC/SAG SCHEMES**

As per the approval of the Governing Body in its meeting held on 24th July, 2009, the committee constituted for consolidation of SAI Training Centres/Special Area Games Schemes has been notified.

## REGIONAL CENTRES/SUB-CENTRES OF SAI

### (1) Netaji Subhas Eastern Centre, Kolkata

The SAI Eastern Centre was established on 23rd January 1983 on 42 acres of land at Salt Lake City, Kolkata and covers the States of Bihar, Jharkhand, Orissa, West Bengal, Tripura and Andaman & Nicobar Islands. This Centre has sports infrastructure facilities, residential facilities for the trainees including medical facilities and scientific set-up. The Centre has extensive talent scouting programmes for identifying talented sports persons to induct them in various sports promotional schemes being implemented in the region and also conducts national coaching camps. Academic programmes (Diploma Courses in Sports Coaching) in the disciplines of Archery, Athletics, Boxing and Football are also conducted in which 54 students were awarded Diploma during the year.

### (2) SAI Netaji Subhas Southern Centre, Bangalore

The Southern Centre was established on 13th April, 1974 at Sree Kanteerava Stadium, Bangalore and later on shifted to Jnanabharathi Campus, Bangalore University, Mysore Road, Bangalore, spread over 101.2 acres of land. The Centre covers the States of Karnataka, Kerala, Andhra Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Pondicherry and Lakshadweep.

This Centre also conducts various academic programmes as detailed below :-

- (i) Diploma Course in Sports Coaching in the disciplines of (1) Athletics, (2) Badminton, (3) Hockey, (4) Kabaddi, (5) Lawn Tennis, (6) Swimming, (7) Taekwondo, and (8) Volleyball. (Total 93 students were awarded Diploma).
- (ii) Certificate Course for the in-service Physical Education teachers from 18th May to 26th June, 2009 in the disciplines of (1) Badminton, (2) Kho-Kho, (3) Tennis, and (4) Volleyball.

### (3) SAI Netaji Subhas Western Centre, Gandhinagar

The Western Centre, Gandhinagar was established on 29th August, 1987 on 63 acres of land and covers the States of Gujarat, Maharashtra, Goa, Rajasthan and UT of Daman & Diu and Dadar & Nagar Haveli.

### (4) SAI Ch. Devi Lal Northern Regional Centre, Sonapat

The Northern Centre of SAI was set up on 15th October, 1991 at Chandigarh to implement the schemes of SAI as well as of the MYAS in the States of Northern region. The Govt. of Haryana allotted 83 acres of land at Sonapat for establishment of Regional Centre and creation of sports infrastructure/playing facilities. The Governing Body of SAI at its meeting held on 12th Nov., 2001 approved the shifting of Regional Centre from Chandigarh to Sonapat and also naming the Centre after Late Ch. Devi Lal, former Deputy Prime Minister of India.

Presently, the Centre covers the States of Haryana and Delhi.

**(5) SAI Centre at Chandigarh**

In pursuance to the decision taken by the Governing Body in its 36th meeting held on 23rd Feb. '09, one SAI Centre has been established at Chandigarh w.e.f. 25th Feb. '09 which covers the States of Jammu & Kashmir, Punjab, Himachal Pradesh and U.T. of Chandigarh.

**6. SAI Udhav Das Mehta (Bhai ji) Central Centre, Bhopal**

The SAI Central Centre was established at Delhi in April, 1988. Subsequently, the Centre was shifted to Bhopal in 2001 and has been renamed as Udhav Das Mehta (Bhai ji) Central Regional Centre. Presently, the Centre is functioning in 100 acres of land, allotted by Govt. of Madhya Pradesh, at Gram Gora, Bishen Kheri, Bhopal and covers the States of Madhya Pradesh and Chhattisgarh.

**7. SAI Netaji Subhas Sub-Centre, Lucknow:**

SAI Netaji Subhas Sub-Centre, Lucknow was inaugurated on 23rd Feb., 2004 on 52 acres of land and covers the States of Uttar Pradesh and Uttarakhand.

**(8) SAI Netaji Subhas North-East Regional Centre, Imphal**

The North-Eastern Regional Centre was established at Takyel, Imphal on 15th September, 1986 on 64 acres of land and covers the States of Manipur, Mizoram and Nagaland.

**(9) SAI Netaji Subhas North-East Sub-Centre, Guwahati**

SAI North-Eastern Regional Sub Centre was established at Guwahati in the year 1987 on 7.5 acres of land and covers the States of Assam, Meghalaya, Arunachal Pradesh and Sikkim.

**(10) SAI High Altitude Training Centre, Shillaroo (H.P.)**

SAI High Altitude Training Centre, Shillaroo (H.P.) is functioning under SAI NSNIS, Patiala, on 39 acres of land.

## **ACADEMIC PROGRAMMES**

**(1) Netaji Subhas National Institute of Sports, Patiala**

The National Institute of Sports was inaugurated on 7th May 1961 to herald an era of systematic and scientific sports coaching in country. In the year 1973, the Institute was dedicated to the memory of Netaji Subhas Chander Bose. After the merger of SAI and SNIPES in 1987, the Institute became the Academic Wing of Sports Authority of India. It is considered as a premier sports Institute in Asia. The Institute is located at Moti Bagh Palace, Patiala (Punjab). The total area of the Institute is 268 Acres.

**Aims & Objectives of the Institute**

- To conduct short & long term academic courses in sports coaching, sports sciences and other related fields, including Refresher Courses for Coaches

- To provide assistance to the National Sports Federations for conducting the National Coaching Camps.
- To provide scientific back-up to the elite sports persons for achievement of high level performance
- To implement the sports promotional schemes of the SAI and MYA&S

## Programmes undertaken during 2009-10

- Diploma Course in Sports Coaching in 16 disciplines, i.e., Athletics, Basketball, Boxing, Cricket, Cycling, Fencing, Football, Gymnastics, Handball, Hockey, Judo, Table Tennis, Volleyball, Weightlifting, Wrestling and Wushu
- M.Sc. in Sports Coaching (2-year Degree Course) in 2 disciplines, i.e., Athletics and Basketball
- Refresher Course for coaches in 3 disciplines, i.e., Athletics, Table Tennis and Wrestling.
- Certificate Course in 7 disciplines, i.e., Cricket, Fencing, Swimming, Lawn Tennis, Wushu, Yoga and Health & Fitness Management\ Management of National Coaching Camps

Under the Long Term Development Plan, the Institute conducts national coaching camps for training of the elite sportspersons on its camps and the SAI High Altitude Training Centre at Shillaroo (H.P.).

### (2) Lakshmibai National College of Physical Education (LNCPE), Thiruvananthapuram

The Lakshmibai National College of Physical Education (LNCPE), Kariavattom, Thiruvananthapuram, came into existence on 17th August, 1985 under the auspices of the then Deptt. of Youth Affairs & Sports, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Govt. of India. With the amalgamation of the SNIPES with Sports Authority of India on 1st May, 1987, the college became a part of the academic wing of the Sports Authority of India. The College is affiliated to University of Kerala.

### Main Objectives:

- To prepare highly competent and skilled leaders, teachers, coaches, scholars and administrators in the field of physical education, sports and games as well as associated areas
- To serve as a Centre of Excellence for research in physical education and allied areas
- To provide technical, professional and academic leadership to other institutions of physical education elsewhere in India and abroad
- To provide vocational guidance and placement services to the people in the field

- To develop and promote programmes of mass physical education activity
- To provide infrastructure, boarding and lodging facilities for State and National level coaching camps as well as to make this College as reputed centre for on-going schemes of SAI.

### **Courses Offered:**

- (i) Bachelor of Physical Education (3 years)
- (ii) Master of Physical Education (2 years)
- (iii) Regular and Part-time Ph.D. Programme

### **Certificate Courses:**

During the year 2009-10, Certificate Courses were organized in 11 disciplines, i.e., Badminton, Basketball, Cricket, Gymnastics, Handball, Kabaddi, Lawn Tennis, Swimming, Taekwondo, Yoga and Health & Fitness Management.



### **Introduction:**

The Lakshmibai National University of Physical Education was established initially as a College on 17th August 1957, the centenary year of the war of India's Independence. The Institute is located at Gwalior, where Rani Lakshmibai of Jhansi had laid down her life for the country's freedom struggle. In recognition of the services rendered by the Institute in the field of physical education and sports, it had been upgraded to "Deemed University status" in 1995. The Institute is an autonomous organization under administrative control of Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Government of India and registered under the M.P. societies Registration Act, 1973.

### **Objectives :**

The objectives of the University are :

- (i) To prepare highly qualified teachers and leaders in the field of Physical Education and Sports.
- (ii) To serve as a Center of Excellence and Innovation in Physical Education and to undertake, promote and disseminate research in this field.
- (iii) To provide professional and academic leadership to other institutes in the field of Physical Education,
- (iv) To provide vocational guidance and placement services to the professionals in this field.
- (v) To promote mass-participation in Physical Education and Sports.
- (vi) To develop and promote programmes of Physical Education and Sports in the country.
- (vii) To encourage and produce scientific contemporary literature in the field of Physical Education and Sports.
- (viii) To provide community services in the field of Physical Education and Sports.

## Departments:

The University has the following seven functional Departments:

- (ii) Department of Research Development and Advance Studies.
- (iii) Department of Coaching and Fitness.
- (iv) Department of Sports Management and Sports Journalism.

## Board of Management

The Union Minister for Youth Affairs and Sports is the President of the Institute. The apex body of the Institute is the Board of Management and the Secretary (Sports) is its Chairperson (Ex-officio).

### North East Regional Centre:

As part of the XI Five Year Plan proposals and as an item included in the 100 days' Action Plan, the North East Campus of LNUPE, Gwalior has come into existence from the current academic year (i.e., 2009-10). Pending approval of Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the State Govt. of Assam for setting up of North East Campus at Guwahati, the NER campus has started functioning from Gwalior with a strength of 30 students (23 males & 7 females) in first year of the four year integrated B. PEd (graduation degree). The standards and methods of selection of candidates for admission to the NER campus are the same as those being adopted for selection to the seats in the main Gwalior campus of LNUPE. They will be moving to their campus at Guwahati from next academic year. Within next four years the total strength of this programme will rise up to 200 with a strength of 50 students in each year.

### Infrastructural facilities

The Institute is co-educational and fully residential ever since its inception and well equipped with the infrastructural facilities. The following major facilities have been added during the year 2009-2010:

**Mahatma Gandhi International Hostel:** Mahatma Gandhi International Hostel which can accommodate 150 persons was inaugurated by Dr. M S Gill, Hon'ble Minister, Youth Affairs & Sports, Government of India on 21st Dec'09. This hostel has been constructed within 15 months.



**Modernized Multipurpose Hall:** Multipurpose Hall (40 mtr. x 54 mtr.) fully modernized was inaugurated by Dr. M S Gill, Hon'ble Minister, Youth Affairs & Sports, Government of India which has been recently completed with the synthetic flooring as also a indoor climbing wall.

**Old Gymnasium building:** The old Gymnasium building which was constructed and being used since 1969 has been completely renovated and fully upgraded to the international standards in December 2009. The All India Inter University Gymnastic (Men & Women) Championship was held in this Complex from 7th January to 11th January 2010.

**Central Library :** Central Library building which was inaugurated by Dr. MS Gill, Hon'ble Minister of Youth Affairs & Sports, Government of India on 4th Oct '08. During this year the building have been fully furnished and the library has been digitalized, internet connectivity provided and transactions being carried out electronically.



**State of the art Fitness Centre:** The Institute had three conventional fitness centers which were created decades ago. A state of the art fitness centre was opened during August 2008 which was found to be of great help. Considering the demand and also to give practical training facility to students of Post Graduate diploma in Fitness Management, another state of the art facility specific to various rehabilitation programmes was installed on 17th August 2009.

**Renovation and modernization of boys Mess:** Boys Mess got the long outstanding modernization and facelift through a complete renovation programme in Nov'09. In addition to a well-lit hygienic dining hall, the cook house has also been modernized with automatic chapatti making machine, steam cooking system, dish washing machine etc.

**Girls hostel "Mrignayani" :** A Post Graduate 100 boarders capacity girls hostel with all modern facilities have been built in the girls hostel complex, which was inaugurated by Shri Rahul Gandhi, Hon'ble Member of Parliament on 18th January 2010.

**Laying of the foundation of 400 mtrs. Synthetic Athletic track:** The Institute had only a 400 mtrs cinder track, laid more than five decades ago. A project for construction of 400 mtrs Synthetic track has been approved and the foundation for the same was laid by Shri Rahul Gandhi, Hon'ble Member of Parliament on 18th January 2010. This will be the first synthetic track in Gwalior.

**Cricket Pavilion:** A state-of-the-art Cricket Pavilion has been completed in the campus which will give enhanced facilities to students of the Institute. This Pavilion also has the facility of a Gym for regular workout, a small cafeteria and few other essential facilities.

**Laying of Foundation of Administrative Building:** Presently the administration of the University is being carried out from the academic building. A project for construction of Administrative Building at a cost of Rs. 9.81 Crores has been sanctioned on 14.9.2009. The foundation of the Administrative Building was laid by Smt. Yashodhara Raje Scindia, Hon'ble member of Parliament of Gwalior on 29th January, 2010.



## PANCHYAT YUVA KRIDA AUR KHEL ABHIYAN (PYKKA)

### Chapter-14

The Government has launched a national programme titled 'Panchayat Yuva Krida Aur Khel Abhiyan'( PYKKA) in 2008-09 for the creation of basic sports infrastructure in all village and block panchayats of the country over a period of 10 years and organizing sports competitions at block, district, state and national levels. All the 2,50,000 village and block panchayats and equivalent units will be covered during the period. The scheme will not only contribute to public health and social inclusiveness, but also stimulate the economic activities within the sports sector, as it would lead to an exponential growth in the demand for sports instructors, coaches, sports equipment and consumables and sports events and related support services. Promotion of indigenous games and the expansion of the talent pool through the identification and nurturing of rural sports talent, are some of the major benefits of the scheme.

Under the programme financial assistance shall be given to a village/block panchayat for the following purpose:

**One-time Seed Capital Grant:** For development of sports infrastructure, Rs. 1 lakh to each village panchayat having minimum 4,600 populations (national average) with additional funding on prorata basis for additional population size beyond the national average. This is contributed on 75:25 basis between the Central Government and State Governments for normal States and on 90:10 basis for Special Category States.

**For block panchayats,** grant of Rs. 5 lakh is to each block panchayat is provided for development of sports infrastructure. The sharing pattern between the Central Government and State Governments is 75:25 for normal States and 90:10 for Special Category States.

**Annual Acquisition Grant:** for a period of five years for acquisition of sports equipment, accessories, support fixtures, consumables and repair and maintenance. Beyond five year it will be the responsibility of the State Government/local body to fund this component. The grant is hundred per cent central grant and a sum Rs. 10,000 per annum to each village panchayat and Rs. 20,000 per annum to each block panchayat is given.

**Annual Operational Grant:** for a period of five years to meeting the operational expenses of non competition activities including to honorarium to Kridashrees maintenance of infrastructure etc. Beyond five years it will be the responsibility of the State government to fund this component. This grant is also hundred per cent and a sum Rs. 12,000 per annum to each village panchayat and Rs. 24,000 per annum to each block panchayat is granted.

**Annual Competition Grant:** for organizing tournaments at block, district, state and national levels as per details given below:

- a) Rs. 50,000 per annum to each block panchayat for organizing block level competitions;
- b) Rs. 3 Lakh per annum to each to each district for holding district level competitions;
- c) Rs. 10 Lakh per annum to each State and Rs. 5 Lakh to each UT per annum for holding State/UT levels competition.
- d) Rs. 70 Lakh per annum for holding national level competitions.

Annual competition grant is a 100 per cent central grant.

Prize money at Rs. 25,000, Rs. 15,000 and Rs. 5,000 as 100% Central Grant to first three village panchayats at the block level tournaments (all 6373 blocks) and at Rs. 50,000, Rs. 30,000 and Rs. 10,000 as 100% Central Grant to the first three block panchayats at the district level tournament (all 607 districts)

## MISSION OUTLAY

The Mission outlay for the Eleventh Plan is more or less restricted to the allocation of Rs. 1,500 crore made by the Planning Commission. The requirement of funds for the Eleventh Plan is projected at Rs. 1,567 crore. The requirement of funds for the Twelfth Five Year Plan has been projected at Rs. 2,887 crore without any inflation indexing. The total for the two plan periods comes to around Rs. 4,455 crore.

Budget allocation in 2009-10 is Rs. 160.00 Crore which has now been reduced at RE stage to Rs. 135 Crore. Besides releasing grants against approved projects last year, proposals of 5 States were approved by the Executive Committee meeting held on 29th October, 2009 with sanction of Rs. 14.64 Crore for covering 1234 village panchayats and 53 block panchayats for 2009-10.

## FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE SANCTIONED/RELEASED TO STATES/UTS

A sum of Rs. 125 crore was provided for PYKKA during the year 2008-09. But owing to cut in the overall budget of Ministry, it was reduced to Rs 92 crore. Out of the total of 35 States/UTs, proposals from 26 States/UTs were received. Proposals of 24 States/UTs were approved. A total number of 22854 Village Panchayat and 601 Block Panchayat have been covered. A sum of Rs. 250.78 crore has been sanctioned, out of which, a sum of Rs. 83.87 crore has been released towards first installment to 19 States which have fulfilled the conditions. Out of total sum of Rs. 92.00 crore released, as sum of Rs. 8.15 crore has also been released to Sports Authority of India to hold competitions.

During the current financial year (2009-10) allocation of Rs. 160 crore has been provided. Financial assistance of Rs. 14.61 crore has been sanctioned to five States/UTs covering 1261 village panchayats and 53 block panchayats. Funds amounting to Rs. 106.56 crore have been utilized so far.

A Statement showing the details of financial assistance approved and funds released to States/UTs under PYKKA scheme during 2008-09 and 2009-10 is given in Annex-XI.

## **NORTH EAST SPORTS FESTIVAL (NORTH EAST GAMES).**

The North East Games will continue to be organized as before by SAI NS NIS Patiala and the funds for the same will be provided as per the existing norms from the PYKKA Scheme.

For conducting lower level competitions, financial assistance to the states is admissible as under:

During the year 2009-10 a sum of Rs. 24,91,21,250/- has been released to 18 States/UTs being the competition grant for holding competition. North East games 2009-2010 have been allotted to Meghalaya, for which financial assistance of Rs. 55,90,000/- has been approved.

## **TRAINING OF MASTER TRAINERS AND KRIDASHREES**

There are total 2,50,000 panchayats in the country out of which there are panchayats which have very less number and there are panchayats with the large number. In order to have good number in each panchayat, smaller panchayats have been clubbed which has large number. Accordingly 2,00,000 panchayats, have been identified by through out the country. Each panchayats will have 3 to 5 disciplines which will be identified by the states and on an average in all 2 lakh kridashrees will be trained in a phased manner. During the current financial year 20,000 kridashrees will be trained by the master trainers. These kridashrees will be trained for a period of 15 days at the identified centers by the State Governments.

Special training material has been developed in 20 different games and sports identified throughout the country. As mentioned above each panchayat will have 3 to 5 disciplines, there will be 120 discipline at block level and 20 discipline at the state level. The discipline at panchayat and block level will be selected depending on the popularity and achievement in the identified disciplines.

For training the kridashree, training materials have been prepared by the experts from the sports Authority of India, National Institute of Sports, Patiala and LUNPE, Gwalior. The compilation of training material has been done at the Mission Directorate, PYKKA

**Competitions:** In terms of PYKKA scheme, the erstwhile All India Rural Sports Programme has now been merged with the Panchayat Yuva Krida Aur Khel Abhiyan (PYKKA). However the conduct of competitions under PYKKA will continue to be implemented by the Sports Authority of India through State governments/Union territories. Annual Competitions at block, district, state level were conducted in 25 states across the country with admissible central grant of Rs. 65.87 Crore. An amount of Rs. 30.00 Crore has been released to SAI NS NIS, Patiala for onward transmission to 16 states for this purpose. National level competitions were held in Tamil Nadu, Punjab, Bhopal and the participants were estimated to be 1.6 million.

## **NATIONAL LEVEL WORKING GROUPS:**

Six National Level Working Groups have been constituted to give their recommendations on the following issues:

1. Finalization of training manual /module for Kridashrees.
2. Holding PYKKA competitions.
3. Setting up an IT cell in the PYKKA Resource Centre at Laxmibai National University of Physical Education (LNUPE), Gwalior.
4. Involving village panchayats in the effective implementation of PYKKA scheme.
5. Procurement of sports equipment and consumables for use of rural youth in village panchayats playing sports/games under PYKKA scheme.
6. Development of playfields in village panchayats, construction of mini stadia in selected districts and convergence of PYKKA scheme with other schemes of Government like NREGA administered by the Ministry of Rural Development.

# SCHEMES RELATING TO PROMOTION OF EXCELLENCE IN SPORTS

## Chapter-15

### SCHEME OF ASSISTANCE TO NATIONAL SPORTS FEDERATIONS:

Under this scheme, the Government of India provides assistance to National Sports Federations (NSFs) for conducting National Championships and International Tournaments in India, participation in International tournaments abroad, organizing coaching camps, procuring sports equipment, engagement of foreign coaches and disbursement of salaries of the paid Joint/Assistant Secretaries engaged by NSFs.

During the year 2009-10, Government has already incurred an expenditure of Rs. 41 crore under Plan and Rs 3 Crore under Non-Plan on account of proposals received from NSFs for foreign exposure and for holding International Tournaments/National Championships. The expenditure also includes funds released for Coaching camps, providing equipment, engaging foreign coaches and salaries of Joint/Assistant Secretaries of the NSFs.

Apart from this, many proposals have also been approved at No Cost to the Government for foreign exposure and for holding International Tournaments in India.

The details of financial assistance released during the last 3 years i.e., 2007-08, 2008-09 and 2009-10 to various recognized NSFs is given at **Annex-XII**.

The details of foreign Coaches engaged during the year 2009-10 on contract basis have been given in the statement at **Annex-XIII**.

### SCHEME RELATING TO SEARCH & TRAINING:

Under this scheme, assistance is provided to promising sportspersons for training and training-cum-competitions in India and abroad, for purchase of equipment and for scientific support. Supporting personnel such as coaches, sports scientists, doctors masseurs etc. are also assisted for undergoing specialized training and for attending seminars/conferences and major international sports events and for appearing in qualifying examinations. This scheme is implemented through Sports Authority of India (SAI).

During 2009-10, assistance of Rs. 25 lakh has been sanctioned for 5 sportspersons as per list enclosed at **Annex-XIV**.

### NATIONAL SPORTS DEVELOPMENT FUND

National Sports Development Fund was instituted by the Central Government in 1998 with a view to mobilizing resources from the Government as well as non-governmental

sources, including the private/corporate sector and non-resident Indians, for promotion of sports and games in the country. In order to make contributions to the Fund attractive, 100% exemption from income tax is available on all contributions to the Fund. To begin with, the Government made a contribution of Rs. 2.00 crore during the year 1998-99. Further Government contribution is on matching basis to the contributions received from other sources. The corpus of the Fund was Rs 63.70 crore as on 31.12.09.

The Fund is managed by a Council constituted by the Central Government with Union Minister for Youth Affairs and Sports as Chairperson. The day to day working of the Fund is managed by an Executive Committee of ten members headed by Secretary, Department of Sports.

The BCCI has made major contribution of Rs 50.00 crore in two instalments in 2007-08 and 2008-09.

For the purpose of administration of the funds donated by BCCI, a separate BCCI - NSDF Implementation Committee (BNIC) has been constituted under the Chairpersonship of the Chairman, NSDF Executive Committee with 4 nominated Members each from the BCCI and the NSDF Executive Council and one representative each of the identified National Sports Federations. The BNIC will also have the option to co-opt experts

## **FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FROM NSDF:**

NSDF has given financial assistance to outstanding sportspersons, Sports Federations and other organizations. Top level sportspersons, who are medal winning prospects in Olympics, Commonwealth Games, Asian Games and other international competitions, are selected for financial assistance from NSDF. The assistance is given for their customized training, both in India and abroad, to prepare them for winning medals at international events.

Reputed Organizations/Institutes, engaged in promotion of sports and games, can also get financial assistance for specific projects like creation of infrastructure, procurement of state of the art equipments etc provided a large population of the area/region get the benefits derived out of such projects.

The details of beneficiaries assisted from National Sports Development Fund till date is given in **Annex-XV**.

# SCHEMES RELATING TO INCENTIVES TO SPORTSPERSONS

## Chapter-16

The Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports implements various schemes for giving incentives to sports persons to take up sports:

### RAJIV GANDHI KHEL RATNA AWARD

The scheme was launched in the year 1991-92 to honour outstanding sportspersons. During the year 2009, following sportspersons were awarded Rajiv Gandhi Khel Ratna Award:

Normally, the Rajiv Gandhi Khel Ratna Award is given to only one sportsperson in a year. However, taking into consideration the spectacular performance of Shri Vijender in Boxing and Shri Sushil Kumar in Wrestling, both Bronze Medalists in Beijing Olympics, 2008, the Government accepted the recommendation of the Selection Committee to confer the Rajiv Gandhi Khel Ratna Award on both of them, as a special case, in addition to Smt. M. C. Marykom.

Awardees are given a medal and award money of Rs. 7.5 lakh, which was enhanced from 5 lakh to Rs. 7.5 lakh during 2009.

22 sportspersons have been given this award since the inception of the scheme.

### ARJUNA AWARDS

The Arjuna Awards were instituted in 1961. To be eligible for the Award, a sportsperson should have had not only good performance consistently for the previous three years at the international level with excellence for the year for which Award is recommended, but also shown qualities of leadership, sportsmanship and a sense of discipline. The awardees are given a statuette, a scroll of honour, ceremonial dress and award money of Rs. 5.00 lakh, which was enhanced from Rs. 3.00 lakh to Rs. 5.00 lakh during 2009.

A small replica of the MAKA Trophy is also awarded for retention by the University.

Punjabi University, Patiala, was awarded the MAKA Trophy for the year 2007-08 by Her Excellency the President of India on National Sports Day i.e., 29th August 2009. Winner University gets the Rolling Trophy and award money of Rs. 10 lakh, 2nd and 3rd position universities get award money of Rs. 5 lakh and Rs. 3 lakh respectively.

## **Rashtriya Khel Protsahan Puruskar**

With a view to recognizing the contribution made to sports development by entities other than sportspersons and coaches, Government has instituted from 2009 a new award entitled Rashtriya Khel Protsahan Puruskar, which has four categories, namely, community sports development, promotion of sports academies of excellence, support to elite sportspersons and employment to sportspersons. Following entities were conferred the Rashtriya Khel Protsahan Puruskar for the year 2009 by Her Excellency the President of India on National Sports Day i.e., 29th August 2009.

## Rashtriya Khel Protsahan Puruskar

This scheme was introduced in the year 1986 to encourage and motivate outstanding sportspersons for higher achievements and to attract the younger generation to take sports as a career. Under the scheme, special awards are given to sportspersons and their coaches for winning medals in recognized international sports events held in a year. The amounts of cash awards given for winning medals in various international events are given in the following table:

Cash award is also given to coaches. The coaches who have trained the medal winners for at least 240 days immediately preceding the game are eligible for cash award under the scheme. Award money to a coach is 50% of the award money given to the sportsperson whom he had coached. In case, there is more than one coach associated with a coach the award money is distributed between / among them equally.

The Scheme of Special Cash Awards to winners of medals in international sports events and their coaches was reviewed during 2009 particularly in the context cutting the delay in sanction of cash awards to medal winners. Earlier applications used to be invited by the Ministry only once in a year for the medals won in the preceding year. The procedure for submission of applications has now been streamlined to ensure timely sanction and release of cash awards. The revised instructions have been issued in August 2009. Now, the concerned Federations can submit the applications for cash awards within one month of the completion of the relevant sport event. Further, verification of achievements of the medal winners will be done in the Ministry itself in

a meeting of the Departmental Committee wherein representatives of SAI will verify the achievements

An amount of Rs. 4.21 crore was released during the financial year 2009-10 upto December 2009 towards special cash awards to sportspersons and coaches for winning medals in various international sports events. A list of sportspersons/coaches given cash awards during the year 2008-09 is at Annex-XVII.

## **SCHEME OF SPORTS FUND FOR PENSION TO MERITORIOUS SPORTS PERSONS**

This scheme was launched in the year 1994. Under this scheme, those sportspersons who are Indian citizens and have won gold, silver and bronze medals in Olympic Games, World Cup/World Championships, Asian Games, Commonwealth Games and Paralympic games and have attained the age of 30 years and have retired from active sports career are eligible for life pension under this Scheme.

At present, 525 sportspersons are receiving pension under this scheme.

## **NATIONAL WELFARE FUND FOR SPORTS PERSONS**

The National Welfare Fund for sports persons was set up in March, 1982 with a view to assisting outstanding sportspersons of yesteryears, living in indigent circumstances who had brought glory for the country in sports. Scheme has been reviewed in July 2009 to provide for lump sum ex-gratia assistance to outstanding sportspersons of yesteryears. Provision of pension has been done way with as there is already a Scheme of Pension for Meritorious Sportspersons. Now, lump sum ex-gratia assistance will be given to the sportspersons or their families for medical treatment etc.

During the current financial year, apart from disbursement of pension to existing 29 beneficiaries, lump sum assistance from the Fund has been provided to the following:

- (ii) Rs. 3 lakh to Ms. Sulinder Kaur widow of late Shri Makkhan Singh, after Ministry came to know that his family was living in miserable condition. Late Shri Makkhan Singh was Gold Medalist in 4 x 400 mtrs relay race and also won Silver medal in 400 mtrs in 1962 Jakarta Asian Games.
- (iii) Rs. 1.5 lakh each to widows of six members of the Indian football Team that took part in Melbourne Olympics, 1956 and reached up to semi-finals. In February, this year, nine surviving members of the Indian Football Team, had also been given financial assistance of Rs. 1.5 lakh each.
- (iv) Rs. 3 lakh to Shri J. Sreedharan, Boxing coach, for his medical treatment as he has been paralyzed since last 2 years.
- (v) Rs. 20 lakh to the Subroto Mukherjee Sports Education Society for conduct of Golden Jubilee Edition of the Subroto Mukherjee Cup Football Tournament.

### **The promotion of sports among person with disabilities:**

The Ministry formulated a scheme for promotion of sports and games among disabled during 2009. The objective of the Scheme is broad-basing participative sports among the disabled. The Scheme of Sports & Games for the Disabled has the following components:-

- (i) Grant for sports coaching and purchase of consumables & non-consumable sports equipment for Schools
- (ii) Grant for Training of Coaches
- (iii) Grant for holding District, State & National level competitions for the disabled.

The successful implementation of the Scheme will go a long way in integration of the disabled in the mainstream of the society.

### **National Championships for Women (Non-Plan)**

The scheme started in 1975, aims at promoting sports amongst women. Under the scheme, national level competitions are preceded by holding of lower level competitions (Block, District & State level) for which States/ UTs are provided financial assistance as per norms. Under this scheme, assistance is being provided to hold annual National Championships for Women in various sports disciplines.



## ANTI-DOPING MEASURES

### Chapter-18

#### Objective:-

Anti-Doping programmes seek to preserve intrinsic value about sport which is often referred to as 'the spirit of sports'. Doping is fundamentally contrary to this spirit of sport. Government of India is fully committed to the idea of doping free sport environment in the country.

For anti-doping programmes, financial assistance is extended to the National Anti-Doping Agency and National Dope Testing Laboratory to carry out their respective activities.

#### National Anti Doping Agency (NADA):

NADA is the national organization responsible for promoting, coordinating, and monitoring the doping control programme in sports in all its forms in the country. The Anti Doping rules of NADA which are compliant with the Anti Doping Code of World Anti Doping Agency (WADA) have been finalized after wide consultation with the Indian Olympic Association and National Sports Federations and have now come into effect from 1st January, 2009. Prohibited list of International Standards brought out by WADA has also been accepted by NADA and the revised list came into effect from 1st January, 2010. The various Committees, as required under the Anti Doping Rules, i.e. the Anti Doping Disciplinary Panel, the Anti Doping Appeal Panel and the therapeutic Use Exemption committee have been constituted in 2009 and have become totally functional. A total number of 49 cases has been referred to the Anti Doping Disciplinary Panel and after elaborate hearings, in 28 cases orders for penalty has been issued by the Panel and the hearing of remaining cases is in progress. One case has been received by the Appeal Panel and the hearing will take place shortly. The Therapeutic Use Exemption Committee has issued exemption certificates in 5 cases so far.

NADA has taken up a major step in sample collection process of athletes and wide dissemination of information. During the year, NADA has organized collection of about 1600 samples in and out of competition by deputing its officers to various places. Education programme of athletes and coaches have been conducted in camps about the ill effects of doping and nature of banned substances as well as implications involved for anti doping violations in the light of the NADA Anti Doping Rules.

In October, 2009 WADA delegation visited NADA for a day and fruit-full inter active discussions were held in regard to the implementations of WADA Code as well as the progress made by NADA in removal of doping in sports.

Director General NADA represented India in October, 2009 in the Conference on the Parties to the International Convention against Doping in Sports held in UNESCO headquarters Paris. India was elected from the Asia Pacific Region as member of the 'Approval Committee' for projects to be approved under the Fund for Elimination of Doping in Sports. The progress of India in regard to the activities related to Anti Doping as contained in the convention was reviewed in this meeting and India was rated highly satisfactory.

## **National Dope Testing Laboratory (NDTL):**

NDTL is responsible for testing dope samples and for conducting advance research on the subject by maintaining close association with the World Anti Doping Agency (WADA) and WADA accredited laboratories. As a member of WADA, the payment of annual contribution is also made. India has ratified the UNESCO convention against doping in sport.

NDTL achieved WADA accreditation on Sept. 21, 2008 after being in the probationary phase since October, 2006. The NDTL has been registered as Society under Societies Registration Act, 1860 on 8th October, 2008. WADA accredits a laboratory every year on the basis of proficiency testing (PT) passed by a particular Lab. For the year 2009, NDTL successfully participated in the PT rounds of WADA and the performance of NDTL has been appreciated by WADA. Further they have also extended the accreditation w.e.f. 1.1.2010 to December, 2010.

**New Building of NDTL:** The new building of NDTL was inaugurated by Dr. M.S. Gill, Hon'ble Minister of YA&S on 20th February 2009. Shifting of Lab from old site to new building was done in a very systematic way in the month of May-June, 2009. The shifting of NDTL was completed in a time bound manner and all the equipments were re-installed, calibrated by the concerned maintenance agencies.

**Meeting of Governing Body/General Body - NDTL:** The Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports constituted the General Body & Governing Body of NDTL. The first meeting of Governing Body & General Body of NDTL was held on 5th January 2009 in which Recruitment Rules of NDTL, Tariff for CWG Games 2010 and Action Plan for CWG, 2010 were approved.

**Drug Testing:** A total number of 4525 samples of various sportsperson were testing in NDTL during 2009.

- (i) **Routine Samples:** 2340 samples urine samples of competition and out of competitions were tested in NDTL.
- (ii) **Proficiency Testing:** Proficiency Testing helps to monitor the performance of the Lab and to take corrective measures in time. Participation in PT programmes is mandatory for ISO:IEC:17025:2005 accreditation which in turn is a prerequisite for applying for WADA Accreditation. The purpose of PT Programmes is also to establish traceability of results in all WADA accredited Labs. DCC participated successfully in the following PT Programmes:-

- World Association of Anti-Doping Scientists (WAADS)
- College of American Pathologists (CAP)
- Proficiency Testing of WADA

A total of 58 urine samples were tested received from above mentioned agencies and a letter of appreciation was received from WADA for performance in External Quality Assurance Scheme (EQAS) of NDTL in 2009.

- (iii) Research: A total of 1700 samples were tested for various research projects and method development.
- (iv) International Drug Testing: After getting WADA Accreditation, the tariff of testing of samples is approved as US\$ 160 for competition testing of international samples, which is less than any other WADA accredited Lab. After obtaining accreditation, 245 samples were tested as part of international testing.

**Quality Management System:** The NDTL is maintaining Quality Management System as per ISO:IEC:17025:2005 and WADA International Standard of Laboratories V.05. To maintain these accreditations the surveillance audit and re-assessment audits are conducted as per time schedule prescribed by these agencies.

### Collaboration with WADA Accredited Labs for CWG 2010:

NDTL has geared up for testing of the forthcoming CWG 2010 to be held in Delhi in October, 2010 and have interacted with various WADA Accredited labs in order to test samples for such mega events. Efforts were made to get various intricacies of testing of such mega events being conducted by other WADA Accredited Labs. In this regard, NDTL has initiated efforts for having bilateral cooperation in the field of anti-doping with other Labs, details of which are as under:

- (i) Bilateral cooperation agreement signed between NDTL and Drug Control Centre (DCC) London in January 2010 to provide support in testing of samples for the CWG 2010 and to have possibility of entering in long terms cooperation during visit of Prof. David Cowan, Director, DCC and Head Department of Forensic Sciences & Drug Monitoring Kings College, London
- (ii) Dr. Tongtavuch Anukarahanonta, Scientific Director, NDCC, Bangkok (Malaysia) along with two scientists visited NDTL in September. Various issues like Chain of Custody, Quality Management System, Data Management System were discussed.
- (iii) A three member delegation from Cologne Doping Lab (Germany) visited NDTL, India from 7th-13th November, 2009. The visit of delegation was under collaborative project funded by German Olympic committee.
- (iv) Chief of Bahrain Anti-Doping Lab visited NDTL on 10.12.09 to oversee the facilities available in NDTL.
- (v) Scientists of Sri Lanka Lab visited NDTL in the month of December, 2009 and discussed the various intricacies of testing in the field of anti-doping.

## Website of NDTL

The website of NDTL, India ([www.ndtlindia.com](http://www.ndtlindia.com)) has been launched on 6th January, 2010 which was prepared by Trademart In (Linxsmart Technologies Pvt.Ltd.) in consultation with Scientists of NDTL.

## Installation and training on new Equipment

New equipments viz., GC-NPD/MS and LC-MS/MS were installed. Scientists of the Lab have also been imparted training by engineers of the companies from which these equipments have been procured.

## New Test Methods:

- (i) **Erythropoietin:** Order placed for the equipment for the testing of erythropoietin. It is planned to complete method development by Mar 2010.
- (ii) **Human growth hormone:** The Method validation is near completion after procuring the equipment and training of scientists in Kings College, London. The External Quality Assurance Scheme samples for evaluating the efficacy of the method developed have been received from WADA. After completing the testing of these samples, the method would be part of the ISO 17025:2005 scope of NDTL.
- (iii) **Blood Parameters:** Order placed for the testing of blood parameters. After receiving the equipment required for testing of blood parameters in December 2009, the method would be ready by March 2010.

### PREPARATIONS FOR COMMONWEALTH GAMES 2010

1. The Commonwealth Games is a mega sporting event in which about 71 countries participate. The XIX Commonwealth Games (CWG) 2010 are scheduled to be held in Delhi from 3rd to 14th October, 2010. In this 7 disciplines have been included. Besides, competitions for the elite disabled athletes will take place in four sub-disciplines viz. Athletics, Powerlifting, Swimming and Table Tennis. The medals under this category are also included in the overall medals' tally of a participating country.
2. For the 17 disciplines of CWG-2010, construction/upgradation work on most of the "Competition Venues" and "Training Venues" is in advance stage of completion. Time lines, against monitorable parameters are being monitored, on a web based monitoring system developed by the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports. All concerned departments and agencies are working in tandem and the progress is being closely monitored at highest levels to ensure that various activities associated with the conduct of the Games are completed well before the Games.
3. The Organizing Committee (OC) has the responsibility to successfully deliver the Games. The Government has approved revised estimates of Rs.1620 crore, as loan to the Organizing Committee. In order to ensure transparency, reasonableness of expenditure, and public financial accountability in the functioning of OC, they have been advised by the Government to strengthen its institutional mechanism by constituting a Standing Finance Committee (SFC). A Sub-Finance-Committee consisting of Secretary (Urban Development); Secretary (Sports); Special Secretary (Finance) and Chief Executive Officer (OC, CWG) has also been constituted. The Comptroller & Auditor General (CAG) is also undertaking concurrent audit of the accounts of the OC. The OC has been declared a 'Public Authority' under RTI Act to ensure full transparency & facilitate easy flow of information to the general public.
4. In order to prepare Indian Sportspersons for the CWG-2010, a Scheme titled 'Preparation of Indian Team for Commonwealth Games, 2010' is already under implementation. Under this Scheme, comprehensive and intensive training and exposure both in India and abroad is being provided to elite sportspersons (medal probables) with full scientific and medical back up facilities.

Details of Financial Assistance provided to National Sports Federations under the Scheme are given at **Annexure-XVIII**.

5. The development and up-gradation work of the city infrastructure and civic amenities has also been taken up appropriately to ensure that players and tourists do not feel any inconvenience and go back with a positive image of the country. The work, related to improvement in Health and Medical facilities, Augmentation of Hotel accommodation, Transportation & Communication, Security arrangements during the Games and the Conduct of the Games by the OC, is also progressing satisfactorily.

# INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE OF SPORTS AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION TEAMS/EXPERTS

## Chapter-20

International cooperation in the field of Sports and Physical Education has been given importance for providing the much-needed opportunities to the Indian teams /experts for foreign exposure and for coaching/training abroad and for obtaining the services of coaches /experts from abroad.

A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) on cooperation in the field of sports with Belarus was signed in Minsk (Belarus) on 17.9.2009.

An MOU on cooperation in the field of sports was signed with Argentina in New Delhi on 14.10.2009.



## NATIONAL PLAYING FIELDS ASSOCIATION OF INDIA

### Chapter-21

There used to be enough open spaces and playing fields in villages and towns all over the country. But over a period of time, with developmental activities, such facilities have come down and there is hardly any space left for sports and games and recreational activities in many parts of the country. Concerned at the shortage of open spaces and playing fields in the country and diversion of some existing fields to other activities, it was considered necessary to evolve an institutional arrangement to protect open spaces and playing fields. With a view to addressing the problem of dwindling playing fields, the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports has looked at various models of protecting, preserving and promoting playing fields in the country and found the National Playing Association of the United Kingdom, which was set up in 1925, to be the most appropriate approach for this purpose. Accordingly, the National Playing Fields Association of India was set up as a Society under the Societies Registration Act 1860 on 24th February 2009 with Union Minister for Youth Affairs and Sports as the chairperson and eminent persons such as Shri F S Nariman, Shri Bishen Singh Bedi, Smt P T Usha, Smt Indu puri, Cdr Nandy Singh and Shri Bhaichung Butia among others as members of the Society. The NPFAI was formally launched on 26th February, 2009.

The main focus of the NPFAI would be on protecting and preserving existing playfields and promoting new ones, apart from developing standards and norms process, for making available playing fields and open spaces.

While the NPFAI will be the apexbody, all State Governments would be encouraged to set up similar societies at the state level, which would be affiliated with the national society. This initiative is expected to create a national awareness of the social benefits that flow out of playing fields, playgrounds and open green spaces in terms of quality of life and social inclusiveness. All the State Governments have already been requested to set up such bodies.

The NPFAI has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the National playing Fields Association of the UK (its operational name is 'Fields in Trust') on 18th August 2009. The objective of the MoU is 'to establish a strategic partnership that involves collaborative arrangements and cooperation between the parties'.

Consequent upon signing the MoU, a two member delegation headed by the Chief Executive of the Fields in Trust (FIT) visited Delhi from September 15 to 18, 2009. The purpose of the visit was to make site visit to various playfields across the city to make on the spot assessment and identify 2-3 sites to develop them as model playgrounds. The team visited some sports complexes and playgrounds in the city maintained by various agencies like DDA, MCD, NDMC, Civil Services sports control Board and Kendriya Vidyalaya. The team held detailed discussions with representatives of the various agencies. A detailed report is awaited from the FIT team.

The NPFAI intend to conduct a workshop to address the various issues concerning playing fields and open spaces and finalize action plan to further its aims.

The NPFAI has received Rs 50.00 lacs as seed money from the National Sport Development Fund in July 2009.

**Enhancement in assistance to Subroto Mukherjee Sports Education Society:** The Subroto Mukherjee Cup Football Tournaments are being held in India since 1958 and are organized by Subroto Mukherjee Sports Education Society, which is being managed by the Air Force Sports Control Board. This year the Society is celebrating Golden Jubilee Edition of the Tournament. The Ministry has been providing assistance of Rs. 5 lakh every year to the Society under the Scheme of Assistance to National Sports Federations. The Society requested the Ministry for additional funds to meet the deficit between the expected revenue and expected expenditure. Taking into consideration the popularity of the game of football and the Society's efforts for organizing the Subroto Cup Tournaments year after year successfully involving inter-school teams, the Ministry sanctioned additional assistance of Rs. 20 lakh from the National Welfare Fund for Sportspersons. Further, it has been decided to enhance the annual support to this event to Rs. 25 lakh from the earlier level of assistance of Rs. 5 lakh.

**Grant of Additional Central Assistance of Rs. 110 crore to Kerala Government for conduct of 35th National Games:** The Government of Kerala has requested for financial assistance from the Government of India for conduct of 35th National Games, scheduled to be held in May, 2010. The Ministry deputed a Central Team, led by Joint Secretary (Sports), Department of Sports and consisting of representatives from Planning Commission, Sports Authority of India and Indian Olympic Association, which visited Kerala in May 2009, to evaluate the State Government's proposal for conduct of 35th National Games. The Central Team evaluated the requirement of funds at Rs. 220 crore for creation and upgradation of sports infrastructure and facilities and conduct of games and recommended that since it may not be possible for the State Government to bear the entire cost of Rs. 220 crore from its own resources because of resource constraint, Planning Commission may consider Additional Central Allocation (ACA) of Rs. 110 crore (50% of the project cost of Rs. 220 crore) to the Government of Kerala for hosting 35th National Games. As a result of Ministry's efforts, Planning Commission approved ACA of Rs. 110 crore in September 2009 to the State of Kerala for 35th National Games.

**Review of the Scheme of National Welfare Fund for Sportspersons:** Scheme of National Welfare Fund for Sportspersons has been reviewed in July 2009 to provide for lump sum ex-gratia assistance to outstanding sportspersons of yesteryears, who brought glory to the nation, but are now living in indigent circumstances. Provision of pension has been done way with as there is already a Scheme of Pension for Meritorious Sportspersons. Now, lump sum ex-gratia assistance will be given to the sportspersons or their families for medical treatment etc.

**Revision in procedure for Special Cash Awards to avoid delays:** The Scheme of Special Cash Awards to winners of medals in international sports events and their coaches was reviewed particularly in the context cutting the delay in sanction of cash awards to medal winners. Earlier applications used to be invited by the Ministry only once in a year for the medals won in the preceding year. The procedure for submission of applications has now been streamlined to ensure timely sanction and release of cash awards. The revised instructions have been issued in August 2009. Now, the concerned Federations can submit the applications for cash awards within one month of the completion of the relevant sport event. Further, verification of achievements of the medal winners will be done in the Ministry itself in a meeting of the Departmental Committee wherein representatives of SAI will verify the achievements

#### **Re-designing of the Statuettes and Trophies for National Sports Awards:**

During the Awards Presentation Ceremony last year held on 29th August 2008 at Rashtrapati Bhawan, the Minister observed that the statuettes being presented to awardees are shabbily designed and it was very awkward for the President to present them. Then, the Ministry took an initiative to redesign the statuettes/trophies/medals presented to the National Sports and Adventure awardees.

The statuettes have been redesigned completely to depict the human aspiration for excellence and achievement embodied in the sporting endeavor. Statuettes and trophies of Arjuna Award, Dronacharya Award, Dhyan Chand Award and Tenzing Norgay Adventure Award have been designed by Shri Gajendra Sahu, a senior faculty member at the B.K. College of Government Arts and Crafts College at Bhubaneswar. The artiste, while retaining the traditional symbolism, has given the statuettes a new look, which is both aesthetic and contemporary. The medal for Rajiv Gandhi Khel Ratna Award has also been redesigned by enhancement of the elements using the medallion as a source of inspiration. The new medal is gilt-edged to highlight the unique achievements and attempts to bring forth the prestige and honour associated with the award. The Trophy for Rashtriya Khel Protsahan Puruskar, introduced from 2009 with a view to recognizing the contribution made to sports development by entities other than sportspersons and coaches, has been designed as a torch which is a celebration of Life and continuous human endeavour for higher achievements in Sports.

The designer of the Rajiv Gandhi Khel Ratna medal and the Rashtriya Khel Protsahan Puruskar, Sh Mukul Goyal, is an alumni of IIT Kanpur, National Institute of Design, Ahemdabad and Domus Academy, Milan. Shri Mukul Goyal is a leading Product Designer.

The re-designed statuettes, trophies and medals were conferred upon the awardees by Her Excellency the President of India on 29th August 2009.

**Formulation of the Scheme for Sports and Games for the Disabled:** The Ministry has for the first time formulated a scheme for promotion of sports and games among disabled. The objective of the Scheme is broad-basing participative sports among the disabled. The successful implementation of the Scheme will go a long way in integration of the disabled in the mainstream of the society.

**Rationalisation of Selection Procedure for MAKA Trophy Award:** The Ministry has revised the guidelines for selection procedure for award of 'Maulana Abul Kalam Azad (MAKA) Trophy' on 2.12.2009 for bringing in more transparency and accountability and for promoting dope free sporting culture in Inter-University sports. Main features of the revised guidelines include: rationalization of marking system based on prioritization and the level of competitions giving due weightage of marks for international sports competitions/tournaments; negative marks for wrong claims and false complaints; enforcement of NADA anti-doping code and penalty of marks for number of athletes found doping positive; inclusion of only those disciplines whose NSFs have IOA or MYAS recognition; scrutiny of applications for MAKA trophy by Scrutiny Committee at AIU well in time and putting the marks online; constitution of Selection Committee for MAKA Trophy by Sports Ministry as in the case of other National Sports Awards; requirement of prior approval of Sports Ministry on any addition or deletion in the final list of tournaments, including inter-university tournaments considered for the purpose of the MAKA Trophy selection; presenting miniature replica of MAKA Trophy to Winner University for retention etc.

**Enhancement in Award Money of National Sports & Adventure Awards:** The matter regarding award money of awardees for the National Sports & Adventure Awards has been reviewed in the Ministry. After careful consideration, the Ministry decided to enhance the award money to Rs. 7.5.lakh from Rs. 5 lakh in case of Rajiv Gandhi Khel Ratna Award and to Rs. 5 lakh from Rs. 3 lakh in case of Arjuna Award, Dronacharya Award, Dhyan Chand Award and Tenzing Norgay National Adventure Award.

**Engagement of coaches in SAI:** There has been acute shortage of the coaches in the Sports Authority of India as no recruitment of coaches has been done since 1998. Since recruitment of regular coaches in terms of the provisions of the Ministry of Personnel & Training and the Ministry of Finance could have taken a very long time and the requirement of coaches is urgent in view of the preparations for the forthcoming international sports competitions viz, Commonwealth Games, 2010, Asian Games 2010 and London Olympics, 2012, the Ministry gave approval to SAI to engage 100 coaches on contract basis immediately.

**Infrastructure proposals:** The exercise of prioritization of the infrastructure projects was undertaken and a decision was taken to re-appropriate funds to the synthetic hockey Turf at Punjab Armed Police at Jalandhar (at an estimated cost of Rs. 3.35 crore) and laying of synthetic track at Taran Taran (at an estimated cost of Rs. 4.93 crore). Further the play fields at Guru Nanak University have also been funded by this Ministry.

**Rationalization of SAI Schemes:** For rationalization of existing SAI Schemes viz., National Sports Talent Contest (NSTC), Army Boys Sports Company (ABSC), SAI Training Centre (STC), Special Area Games (SAG), Extension Centre of STC/SAG for wider coverage and Centre of Excellence (COE), a Review Committee has been constituted under the chairmanship of Joint Secretary (Sports) and consisting of Secretary, SAI, Director (Operations), SAI, Consultant, PYKKA and Director (Coordination), SAI to review the existing schemes and make recommendations for their further strengthening and rationalization.

**Transaction Advisor for Legacy Planning of SAI Stadia on PPP mode:** For proper utilization of the sports infrastructure being created for CWG 2010 after Games are over, SAI has engaged M/s. Feedback Ventures Pvt. Ltd as Transaction Adviser at a cost of Rs.84 lakhs to assist SAI in identifying a private partner (Concessionaire) for advising on

- (i) making incremental up-gradation in the SAI stadia in Delhi and providing additional facilities for Commonwealth Games 2010,
- (ii) working out the modalities for operations during the Games, and
- (iii) for maintenance of the Stadia through commercial exploitation of the identified space on a revenue sharing basis during post-Games period.

**Opening of North East Campus of LNUPE, Gwalior:** As part of the XI Five Year Plan proposals and as an item included in the 100 days' Action Plan, the North East Campus of LNUPE, Gwalior has come into existence from the current academic year (i.e., 2009-10). Pending approval of MOU with the State Government of Assam for setting up of North East Campus at Guwahati, the NER campus has started functioning from Gwalior with a strength of 30 students (23 males & 7 females) in first year of the four year integrated B. PEd (graduation degree).

**Financial assistance to Dibrugarh University for one college one sport concept:** The Ministry has sanctioned a financial assistance of Rs 2.27 crore to Dibrugarh University from National Sports Development Fund as a pioneer project on the concept of 'One College-One Sports' project. The facilities proposed to be created will be utilized to provide coaching programme and to organize sports competitions and the facilities created with the funds of the Ministry will also be accessible to general public and local players of the neighboring areas, besides students of the affiliated colleges. The expenditure on maintenance of facilities will be met out of contributions to be generated by the University from various sources.

**Financial assistance to Department of Mountaineering and Allied Sports, Manali for promotion of Sports Tourism and Training of Athletes:** The Ministry has sanctioned a financial assistance of Rs 1.00 crore from National Sports Development Fund to the Department of Mountaineering and Allied Sports, Manali (DMAS) Himachal Pradesh for procurement of Alpine Skiing and Grass Skiing equipments. The procurement of these equipments will help in providing better training facilities to professional sportspersons in skiing. Such facilities will also boost adventure tourism in the region. 75% of the estimated cost for procurement of the aforesaid equipments, i.e., Rs. 75 lakh has already been released to the DMAS on 23.11.09.

**MOU between the National Playing Fields Association of India (NPFAI) and Fields in Trust (FIT) UK:** The Ministry has formed National Playing Fields Association of India (NPFAI), as a registered society in February 2009, with the main objective to develop, promote and protect playing fields and open spaces in the country. With the objective of establishing a strategic partnership involving collaborative arrangements and benefitting from the experience of a body which has been in existence for more than 80 years and has been quite successful in meeting with its objectives, MOU was signed

between the NPFAI and the National Playing Fields Association of the United Kingdom on 18th August 2009. The NPFAUK is now known as Fields in Trust (FIT), which has over 80 years of history during which it has lobbied to improve the planning system to give greater statutory protection to playing fields and outdoor recreational land.

**Establishment of community sports facilities as part of Legacy Plan under Commonwealth Games, 2010:** With the objective of establishing community sports facilities in schools, colleges and government managed sports institutions in the National Capital Region (NCR), the Ministry has earmarked Rs. 15 crore under Legacy Plan of Commonwealth Games, 2010. Fund earmarked would be utilized for creation/upgradation of sports infrastructure in 10 schools of Kendriya Vidyalaya Sangathan, 2 schools of Navodaya Vidyalaya Samiti, 5 Government schools, 13 Colleges of Delhi University, 10 Grih Kalyan Kendras and 2 Sports Complexes in and around Delhi. These facilities include laying of synthetic surface for Tennis, Basketball courts, Hockey fields, construction of Swimming pools and procurement of fitness equipment etc. All the beneficiary organizations/institutions have initiated appropriate action to execute these projects.

### **Management of Records of National Sports Federations (NSFs) - Issue of Annual Recognition of NSFs**

With the objective of bringing in transparency and fairness in functioning of NSFs that receive financial assistance from the Government, the Ministry has introduced a system of annual recognition of NSFs based on submission of required documentation. Under this system introduced from 2010, all NSFs are required to submit, in the first instance, documents such as their registration certificate, accreditation letters from Asian and international federations, names and addresses of office bearers, details of state affiliates and their office bearers, last three years' annual reports and audited accounts, details of championships conducted, selection criteria, composition of the selection committee and details of technical officials. Once annual recognition is granted, the federations have to submit limited number of documents, annually, to avail themselves of automatic renewal.

Response to the new procedure introduced by the Ministry has been quite encouraging. As of now, 53 NSFs have applied for annual recognition. Out of this, 39 have qualified for annual recognition. Out of these, 33 have fulfilled all requirements and have been accorded annual recognition for the calendar year 2010 and 6 federation, which have partially fulfilled the requirements, have been granted provisional recognition.

**Out of Pocket Allowance:** Till recently Government was providing out of pocket allowance to the players for participating in major multidisciplinary events only. Taking into account the demands of National Sports Federations for providing the out of pocket allowance to all members of the contingents including coaches, officials etc going abroad for participation in international sports events, the Government has decided to provide out of pocket allowance upto US \$ 25 per day per players and other members of the Indian Contingent for participation in major international sports events aboard.

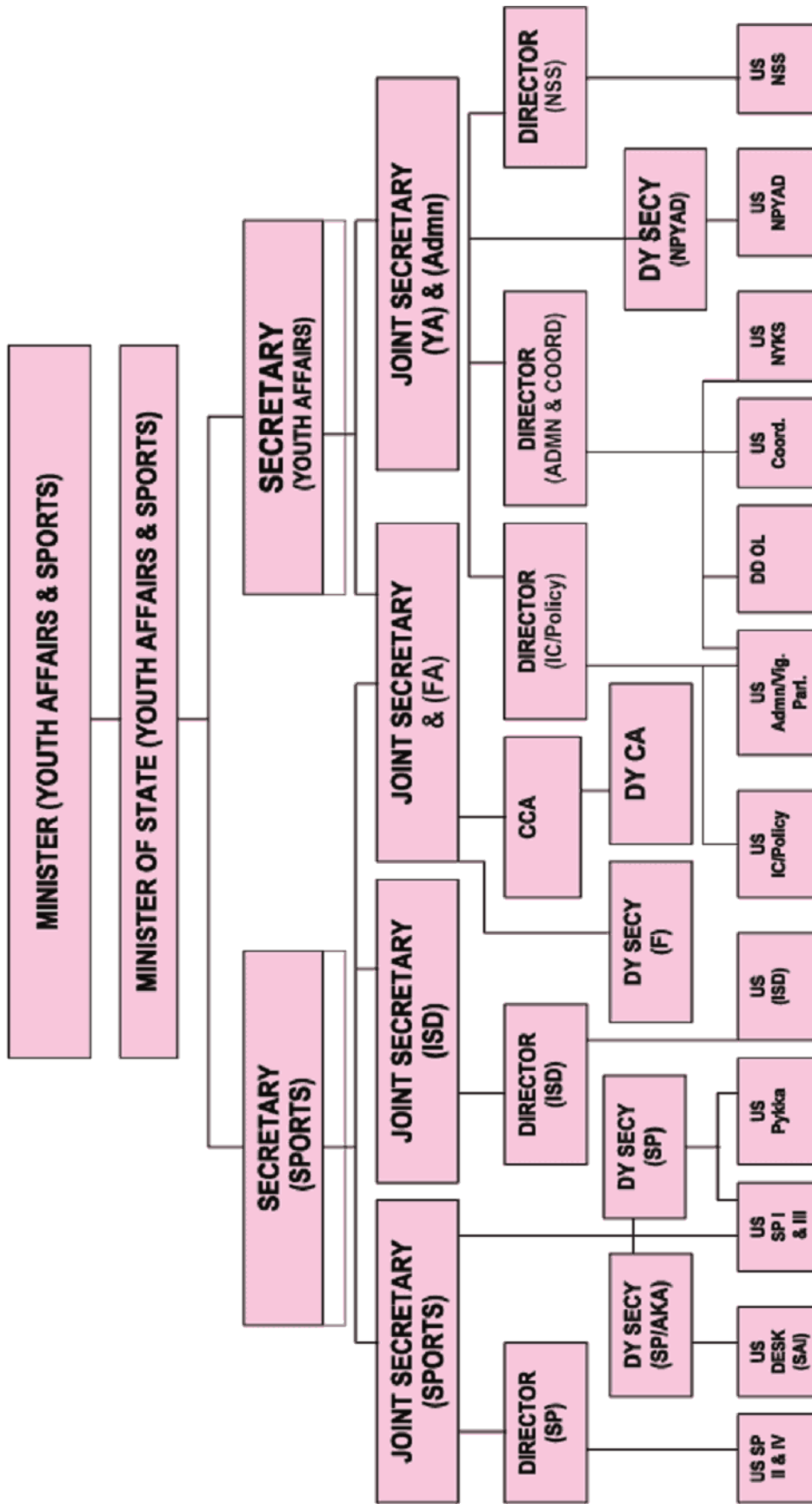
**Issue of instructions relating to fraud in age of players:** After taking note of incidents of age fraud committed by athletes and to ensure fair play, Government has decided that all National Sports Federations (NSFs) should take appropriate measures to check age fraud on the same lines as anti-doping measures, as both amount to cheating, which is violative of the basic spirit of sport. Henceforth, the NSFs are required to issue identity cards to national athletes, draw a clear policy with regard to submission of documents in support of age proof and medical procedure for verification in case of doubt and appeal therefor.

**Preparation of Indian Contingent for Asian Games, 2010:** In order to ensure a level playing field to all national disciplines in which the country will be required to participate in Asian Games, 2010, it has been decided to adopt the norms of Scheme of Preparation of Indian Team for Commonwealth Games, 2010 for the Scheme of Assistance to National Sports Federations as the ceiling for assistance for such sports disciplines. For this purpose action plan has been drawn after having consultation with concerned National Sports Federation and Sports Authority of India. As such Government is providing enhanced assistance for following items of expenditure: (a) Coaching Camps, (b) Equipments, (c) Engagement Indian Coaches, foreign coaches and supporting personnel, (c) Participation in international competition and training abroad, (d) Holding of National and International events in India.

## Initiatives through information Technology during the year 2009-10 by the Ministry.

**PYKKA-MIS** : It is a web-based management information system that captures the complete life cycle of the implementation of the PYKKA scheme starting from proposal submission and approval to, fund management and finally competition management. PYKKA-MIS has been launched with the URL <http://pykka.gov.in>. In addition to covering all aspects of the PYKKA scheme, the competition module of PYKKA also captures the details of competitions held under Women Competitions and Inter-school Competitions held in rural areas. The users whom the PYKKA-MIS targets include Citizens, Gram Panchayat, Block Panchayat, Districts, State Sports Departments, Sports Authority of India and Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports.

**PRIMES (Performance Review Indicators Monitoring & Evaluation of Sportspersons)**: It is web based monitoring system for monitoring the performance of Indian Players for ensuing Commonwealth Games and future national and international events.

Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports (MYAS), Sports Authority of India (SAI), National Sports Federations, Government Observer, Camp Coordinator, Coaches, Players, Sports Scientist and Supporting Personnel are various stakeholders of this system.

**SAI Portal** : SAI portal has been launched with URL <http://sportsauthorityofindia.nic.in> in November 2009 . The objective of development of SAI portal is to disseminate various facets of SAI functioning, schemes being implemented by SAI for promotion of sports and games, it's performance in various competition in India and abroad, facilities being provided by SAI to the sportspersons/citizens etc. The whole site is being dynamically managed to have latest and up-to-date information to the public.

**NPFAI application** : For preservation, protection and promotion of playing fields in India , National Playing Fields Association of India (NPFAI) has been setup by the Govt. of India. NPFAI application has been developed by NIC that provides information pertaining to playing fields across the country and allied facilities available in these fields. The application also provides for public participation wherein general public would be able to provide information pertaining to playfields, Ministry would take appropriate action for its preservation, protection and promotion. A discussion forum enables visitors to be able to share their views over policies and means to protect playfields. There will be basically a database of basic level Sports Facilities in the country right up to village level. The application has been launched with URL <http://npfai.nic.in>

Monitoring financial assistance to National Sports Federations and Pension to meritorious sportspersons : The development of an application software for monitoring of financial assistance to National Sports Federations (NSFs) and Pension to Meritorious Sportspersons has been completed. The application has been launched with URL <http://nsf.nic.in>. The software developed by NIC is a web-based application which facilitates online submission of proposals/applications by the NSFs. The secretariat staff of the Ministry processes the proposals online and provide the up-to-date status on the web for the information of the NSFs and sportspersons.

NADA website : National Anti-doping Agency (NADA) website has been launched with the URL <http://nada.nic.in> . Government of India has set up NADA as an autonomous body with the mandate to take all measures in conjunction with sports bodies and other stakeholders to rid sports of doping. This website gives details of anti-doping code, therapeutic use exemption and prohibited list substances and side effects of prohibited method for the benefit of sportspersons thereby creating a clean and healthy environment for sports in India.

**Others :**

Local Area Network(LAN) has been updated.

Software patches have been installed in CompDDO server to add new features in the payroll. Website of the Ministry is being updated on day to day basis.

Parliament Questions and Answers are transmitted to the Rajyasabha and Lok Sabha Secretariat electronically on regular basis.

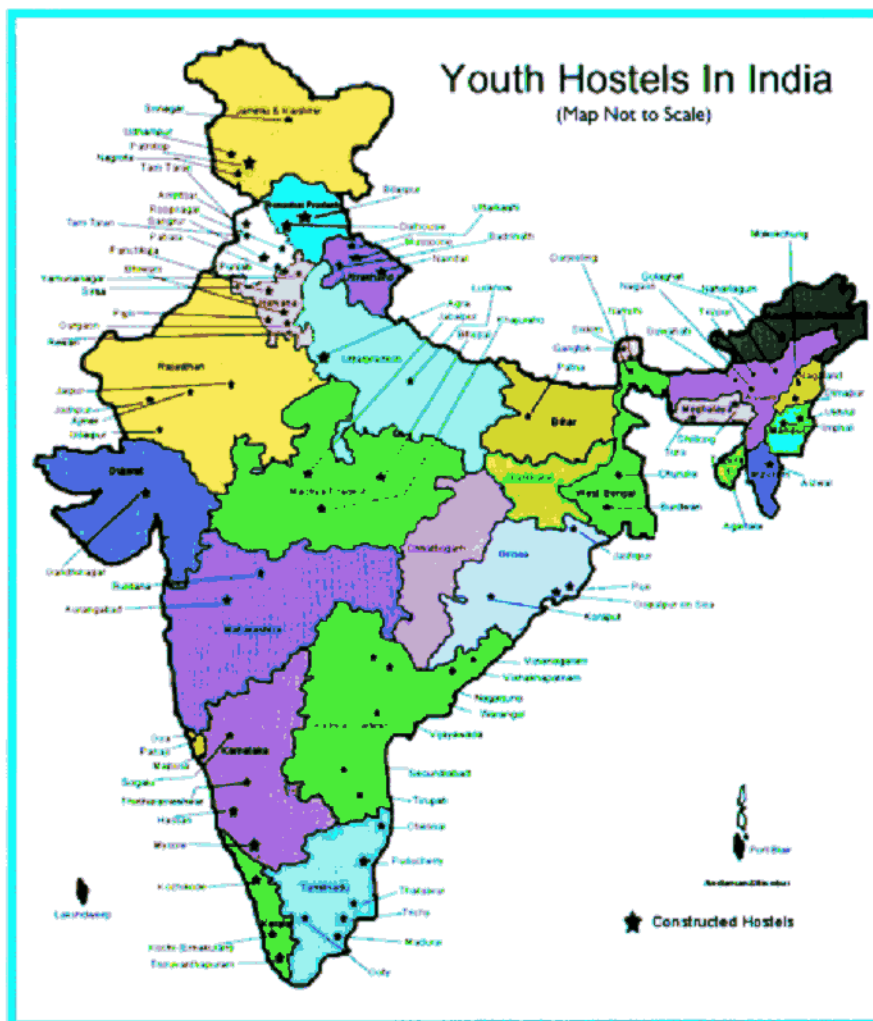
